## STATE TAX ON NOTES TO STOP OCTOBER FIRST

Eastland county folks will pay one less tax—starting October 1—than they have been accustomed to pay for the past five years. That is the state levy on notes and other instruments filed for public record in the county clerk's office. Word from the state treasurer's office in Austin says the tax was repealed by the last legislature and will be discontinued in 90 days after July 3. That date falls on October 1. The levy, 10 cents on every \$100 value or fraction thereof above \$200 was enacted October 1, 1936, to supply funds for old age pensions. Not affected by the Texas legislature's action is the federal tax on notes, and instruments filed in the county clerk's office. The federal rate is 55 cents on every \$500, or fraction thereof, beginning with \$200.

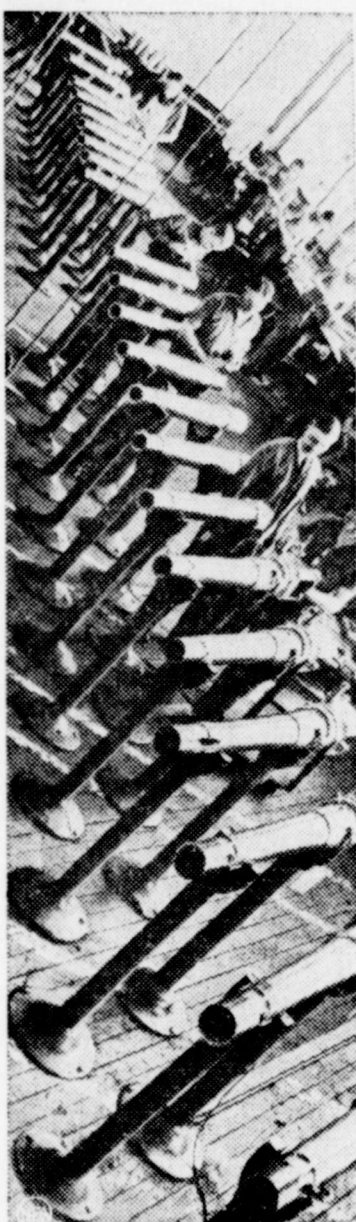
## TRAFFIC LAW ENFORCEMENT IS PLEASING

"Enforcement of the traffic laws against speeding, and violating light signals are getting results that are salutary," said Mayor G. P. Mitcham at the commission meeting Tuesday night. "We can see a decline in complaints of violating the traffic ordinances of the city, as well as the state law against driving in incorporated cities faster than 30 miles an hour. The city has collected 22 fines, and eight others have not yet reported. We hope and believe there will be complete observance of the traffic laws as soon as our people understand we mean business and that these laws must be observed," the mayor said.

## "STAB IN THE BACK" NAZIS SAY OF U. S.

(By United Press)

American naval cooperation with Great Britain in the "shooting zone" of the North Atlantic, was viewed as increasingly important in both London and Berlin today, while Russia and Germany both reported military gains on the eastern front. As Moscow reported the Germans hurled back on central and southern fronts, and the Nazis claimed capture of the key town of Ostrov, the British prime minister told the house of commons that the American occupation of Iceland is expected to help protect the delivery of war goods to Great Britain. Berlin and Rome described the occupation of Iceland by U. S. forces as a "stab in the back" and warned that the United States is now in a dangerous "shooting zone." On the main war front, the Russians appear to be making a strong stand and striking back at the Germans in two sectors. However, a Nazi advance is reported on the Baltic front.

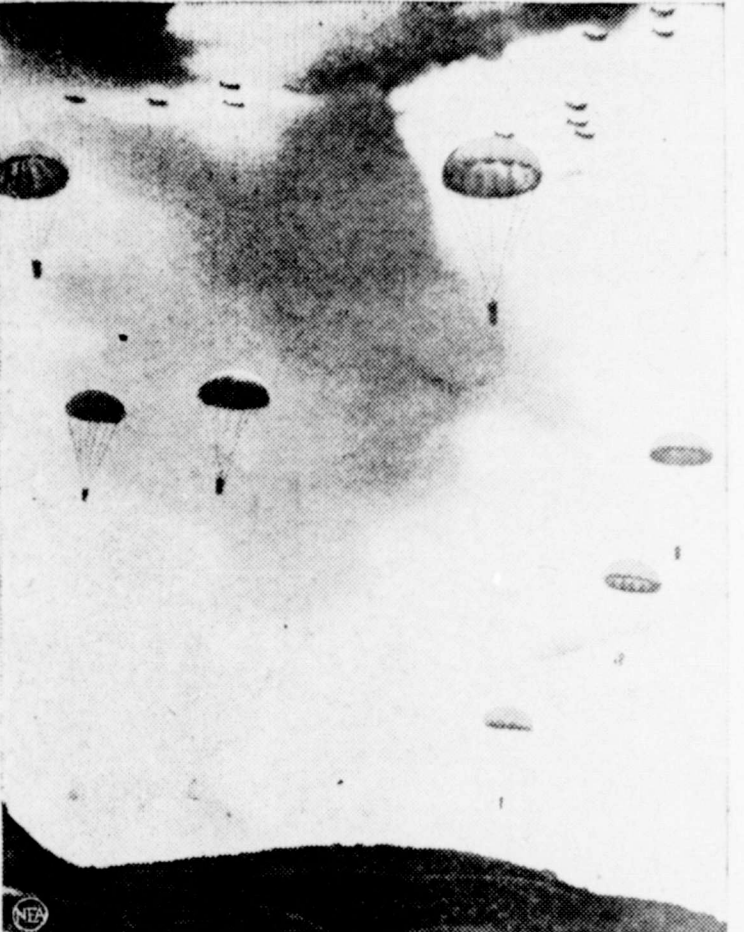
## NAZARENES ARE PLEASED; MAY COME BACK '42

The Nazarene encampment at the Presbyterian camp grounds, Lake Cisco, which started out Monday with a large attendance, has grown steadily and many of the visitors are now being housed in Cisco. The meeting will come to a close with the Sunday night services. Every official of the Abilene district, as well as every speaker, has highly praised the beautiful camp grounds and their facilities. If arrangements can be made with the Presbyterians, the Nazarenes are almost certain to vote for a return here in 1942. Dr. James B. Chapman, a general superintendent of the church, and who was to have made the opening address of the gathering, was delayed in arrival but is expected here in time to speak to-night. The large tabernacle has been seated to overflowing each night and additional seating to care for at least 200 people has been arranged just outside. The Rev. J. F. Penn, a Nazarene missionary from Africa, is here. He has been touring the United States in the interest of missions. The business manager of Bethany Penial college, a Nazarene institution and Rev. John L. Peters, an instructor, are visiting the camp. Dr. S. T. Ludwig, general secretary of the Nazarene Young People's Society and editor of the Young People's Journal, spoke Tuesday night and again this morning at the 6:30 service, "the sermon on the mount," from the mountain overlooking Lake Cisco and surrounding country.

## STEWART OIL CO. HOPES FOR NEW OIL FIELD IN SW. PART OF EASTLAND COUNTY; RIG IS UP

What many hope and believe will lead to a new oil pool will soon be tested out in the southwestern part of Eastland county by the Stewart Oil company. The initial well will be drilled on the Oscar Schaefer 394-acre tract in block 4, Moses Allen survey, being four miles north of the old Hilburn field, and about six miles west of the Pioneer field, both of which once brought in many good producers. ## UTILITIES MUST PAY 2 PERCENT ON GROSS SALES FOR THE USE OF STREETS AND ALLEYS OF CISCO

With Mayor G. P. Mitcham presiding and Commissioners Charles J. Kleiner, A. V. Clark, Edward Lee, Neil Lane and George Boyd present, the city commission met in regular session Tuesday night in the mayor's office in city hall. Other than routine business was the passage of an ordinance regarding rentals of the city streets and alleys by utility companies. This is a new state statute and requires a special ordinance, which was adopted by the commission and provides that the city shall charge a rental of two per cent on the gross sales of the utility companies. Mr. Byrd of the Community Natural Gas Co. was before the commission at a previous meeting, when he rather insisted upon a rental of 1 1/2 per cent. After full consideration the commission made the rate 2 per cent. This rate was previously suggested to Mayor Mitcham by a representative of the telephone company. H. H. Monk of the West Texas Utilities Co. was before the commission Tuesday night when the matter was gone into extensively. The commission instructed acting City Attorney F. D. Wright to meet with Mr. Monk and the two frame a new franchise, or amendments, covering this phase of the franchise.

## Cisco's Airport

Mayor Mitcham reported that the city airport would be maintained on the present basis until the end of the present session of the flying school, after which there would be some minor changes. This statement was brought out in explanation of rumors that the federal government would not sponsor the air school after an indefinite date, which the mayor explained was a mistake, as the federal authorities were still favorable to maintaining the airport. H. H. Monk was named as chairman of the Cisco airport committee, which was confirmed by the commission. **Should Be Guarded** At a previous meeting the mayor was requested to contact the war department in an effort to have a permanent guard placed at Williamson dam at Lake Cisco. He reported that he had not heard from the war department, and until this information was available there would be no guard at the dam. **Weeds to Be Cut** The matter of cutting weeds and cleaning up vacant lots in Cisco came in for considerable discussion. A Mr. Terry, living near Cisco, proposed to the commission to cut the weeds and grass from vacant property for a remuneration of \$7 per day, which he later reduced to \$6. The commission took the matter under advisement, and later authorized the sanitary committee to make a contract with Terry for eight days at \$5 per day, and if satisfactory the time would be extended. Terry to furnish a man, team and mowing machine. Commissioner Kleiner discussed the grass and weeds matter from a fire hazard point. He said the drying vegetation could become a real menace to property and prove a danger hazard to the lives of Cisco people. The matter of paying ad valorem taxes by work was brought to the attention of the commission. Mayor Mitcham stated he had been contacted by delinquent taxpayers who wished to pay their taxes in this manner. It was the decision of the commission that this may be done, provided the delinquent could pay half in cash and half in work. **Payment Auto Tax** The mayor stated that the city has pending eight suits against owners for delinquent auto tax, but had no city attorney to prosecute these suits, which are set for hearing next Monday. Attorney Wright, being present, was asked if he would represent the city in these suits. Mr. Wright agreed to do so provided there would be no discrimination in filing against those delinquent. The matter was referred to the tax committee with authority to contract with Mr. Wright to represent the city in the prosecution of these and similar cases and to force collection of the taxes due to the city from car owners. ## TEXAS VICTOR \$906,138 SUIT HUMBLE OIL CO.

The state of Texas yesterday won a district court judgment of \$906,138 against the Humble Oil and Refining company for chain store taxes. The company's attorneys immediately gave notice of exception and appeal after Judge J. Harris Gardner, Austin, had ruled on an agreed stipulation of facts. A request for a jury trial had been withdrawn. Exemption from chain store taxes on grounds that their 280 service stations sold only petroleum products and service was claimed by the oil company's attorneys. The state contended that sales of tires and accessories were not service but merchandising. Ruling for the state, the court also supported a state contention that the tax was due for 1941 despite arguments the legislature had amended the act to exempt service stations if 75 per cent of their business was in petroleum products sales.

## O'DANIEL AND JOHNSON GIVE ELECTION EXP.

**WASHINGTON, July 9.**—Governor O'Daniel of Texas, who won a special election to the senate, spent \$1,783.30 for campaign expenses, while his closest opponent, Representative Lyndon B. Johnson, spent \$11,818.53, according to statements filed Tuesday. The temporary reports, made out on June 18, and June 17, showed also that O'Daniel's campaign contributions totaled \$3,224.65, while Johnson's were \$9,645. Mrs. O'Daniel, the records show, contributed \$2,333.13 to her husband's campaign. Those who contributed to Johnson's campaign included: Miss Lucinda Rayburn, \$500; Mrs. Ladybird Taylor Jackson, \$2,500, and E. S. Fentress, \$2,500.

**LEGAL NOTICE**

**AN ORDINANCE FIXING RENTALS TO BE PAID BY TELEGRAPH, TELEPHONE, ELECTRIC AND GAS COMPANIES FOR THE PRIVILEGE OF USING WITH THEIR POLES, WIRES, CONDUITS, PIPES, AND FIXTURES THE STREETS, EASEMENTS, AND ALLEYS AND OTHER PUBLIC WAYS WITHIN THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS, PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION, AND PROVIDING AN EMERGENCY.**

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Cisco, Texas:

Section 1. That all persons, associations, organizations, and corporations using or maintaining any telegraph, telephone, electric light or other poles, gas pipe lines, pipes, and other fixtures in any of the streets, highways, easements, alleys, parks, or other places within the corporate limits of the City of Cisco, Texas, shall make quarterly, on the first day of January, April, July and October of each year, a sworn report to the City Secretary, showing the gross receipts from the business conducted by such persons, associations, organizations and corporations within the corporate limits of the said city for the preceding three months.

Section 2. The City Commission when it may see fit, may have the books and records of the person, association, organization, or corporation, rendering the statement required in Section 1 of this Ordinance examined by a representative of the City to ascertain whether such statement is accurate, but nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to prevent the City from ascertaining the facts by any other method.

Section 3. That upon the 1st day of January, April, July and October of each and every year every person, association, organization, or corporation occupying or using the streets, highways, easements, alleys, parks, or other public places in the City of Cisco, Texas, with poles, pipes and for other fixtures shall as a condition to such further occupancy pay to the City annually for such privilege a rental equal to two (2%) percent of the gross receipts received by such persons, association, organization, or corporation from its business conducted in the corporate limits of the City of Cisco, Texas, for the preceding three months, which sums shall be paid to the City of Cisco, Texas.

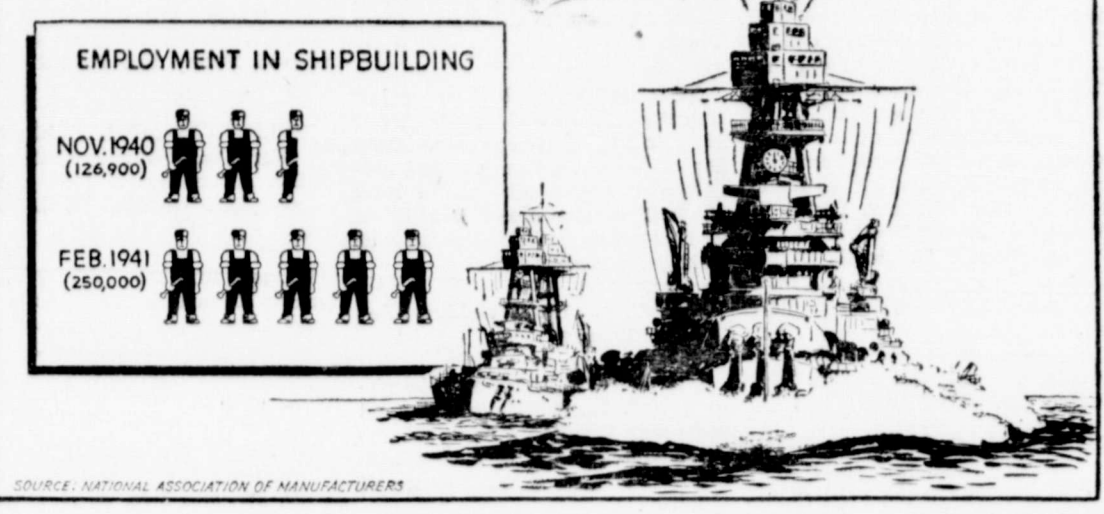
Section 4. That the rental for the privilege of using the streets, alleys, highways, easements and public places of the City of Cisco provided for in this ordinance is not charged as a tax, but is made for the privilege now enjoyed and to be enjoyed by such persons, associations, organizations, and corporations of using the streets, easements, alleys, and other public ways of the City in the conduct of their respective businesses; and such charges are additional to all ad valorem and franchise taxes and to all taxes of every nature whatsoever against the persons, associations, organizations, or corporations mentioned herein.

Section 5. That nothing herein is intended to relieve any person, association, organization, or corporation of any condition, restriction or requirement, imposed by any law or ordinance of the said City of Cisco, Texas.

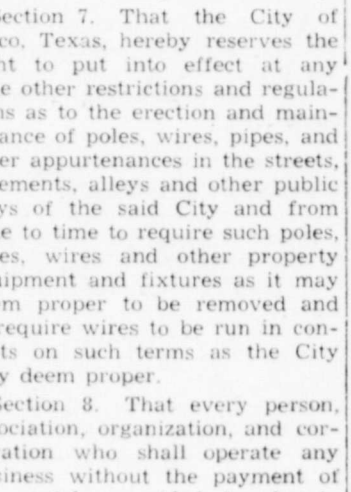
Section 6. That this ordinance does not grant a franchise to any utility or person, association, organization or corporation to use the streets, easements, alleys and other public ways and shall never be construed by the Courts or

a safe and suitable condition.

Section 11. If any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or held unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole or any part or provisions thereof other than the part so decided to be invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 12. That the fact that telegraph, telephone, electric and gas companies have been occupying and using the streets, easements, alleys and other public ways of the City of Cisco, Texas, for many years without the payment of rent for such use creates an emergency, and this Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage, approval and publication as required by law.

Section 13. The amount of the first payment made hereunder shall be based on the number of days remaining in the quarter year during which this Ordinance becomes effective, after the effective date hereof.

**GET PROOFS IN SHAPE IF NEARING 65**



ABILENE, July 9.—The nearest field office of the Social Security board has the forms used in applying for any of the kinds of benefits paid under old-age and survivors insurance, according to W. O. King, manager of the Abilene office. "Any worker, or members of a worker's family, can get the proper forms by writing or visiting that office. The person applying for benefits will be given, free of charge, any help he may need in filling in the proper forms."

King explained that before the social security field office sends the application for benefits to Washington, it must have certain kinds of proof. For instance, the law does not provide for payment of monthly retirement benefits to a worker until he reaches 65 years of age. "Therefore," King continued, "it is necessary for the Social Security board to have proof that the worker is that old before it can be sure he is entitled under the law."

"Workers and members of their families can get their benefits quicker if they will get the proofs that will be needed when they are ready to apply for benefits. For instance, when a worker is nearing age 65, he knows he will need to have some proof of his date of birth. It may take some time to get this, so he should not wait until he is ready to retire to retire and claim benefits before getting the necessary proof.

"When benefits are claimed by a worker aged 65 or over, a wife or widow who has reached 65, or for a child under 18, some proof of the age of the claimant is needed. If no birth certificate can be obtained, other types of proof will be acceptable. The Social Security board field office will tell claimants about other kinds of proof they should obtain. When benefits are claimed by a wife or widow, a wedding certificate, or some other proof of marriage to the worker, will be needed; where benefits are claimed after the worker's death, it will be necessary to have the death certificate, or some other proof of death."

**TEXAS TO PAY FREE SCHOOLS GIGANTIC SUM**

AUSTIN, July 9.—Texas public schools will receive a contribution of approximately \$33,750,000 from the state during 1941-42 on the basis of a \$22.50 per capita scholastic apportionment.

The State Board of Education has fixed the apportionment at the limit set by law and unchanged from the current figure. All but a small amount of this year's apportionment has been paid and education department officials said there would be sufficient revenue to provide a balance.

Census figures show the state has approximately 1,500,000 scholastics between the eligibility ages of 6 and 18.

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**NUDISTS WIPED OUT**

PANAMA, Panama, July 9.—Ten persons were killed and eight wounded in a gun fight between police and a colony of "Swiss German" nudists at Cotito, in Panama, 20 miles below the Costa Rican border, the ministry of government and justice announced. In a lengthy communique, the ministry said a police detachment led by Capt. Antonio E. Hoff went to the colony to require the members to register and comply with other Panama immigration regulations. They were met by gunfire which wounded their guide, the announcement said, and replied with a devastating volley which caused the deaths of seven men and three women colonists and the wounding of six women and a child.

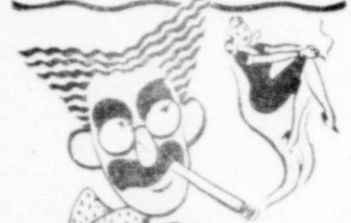

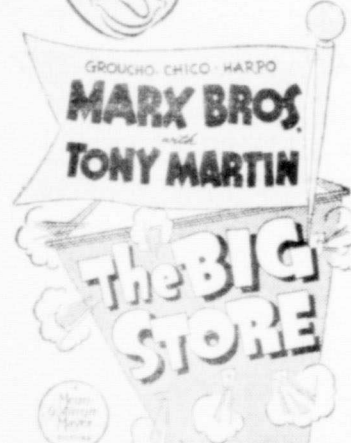
