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Do You Remember? (From Files of Cisco Daily News, November, 1937.)

J. W. Shepard, father of Floyd and Fleet Shepard, has been nursing a black eye since Armistice week. No, this esteemed citizen did not get this black eye during the Armistice celebration. In fact, just how it was received has been worrying him for the past several days. The first he knew of his discolored optic was early last Friday when Mrs. Shepard noticed that one of his eyes was not only discolored but showed evidence of a blow that had brought blood from his nose. When asked what was the matter, Mr. Shepard said, "Nothing." But Mrs. Shepard told him to look in the mirror. Then it was realized that in some manner unknown to him, he had been rather badly wounded. There was a laceration near the eye and further inspection revealed a blood spot on the carpet in his sleeping room. The only solution he could give was that he fell out of bed, his face coming in contact with the floor. Evidently he resumed his place in bed without awakening.

## AL NOTICE

Cisco, Texas, for the preceding three months, which sums shall be paid to the City of Cisco, Texas.

Section 4. That the rental for the privilege of using the streets, alleys, highways, easements and public places of the City of Cisco provided for in this ordinance is not charged as a tax, but is made for the privilege now enjoyed and to be enjoyed by such persons, associations, organizations, and corporations of using the streets, easements, alleys, and other public ways of the City in the conduct of their respective businesses; and such charges are additional to all ad valorem and franchise taxes and to all taxes of every nature whatsoever against the persons, associations, organizations, or corporations mentioned herein.

Section 5. That nothing herein is intended to relieve any person, association, organization, or corporation of any condition, restriction or requirement, imposed by any law or ordinance of the said City of Cisco, Texas.

Section 6. That this ordinance does not grant a franchise to any utility or person, association, organization or corporation to use the streets, easements, alleys and other public ways and shall never be so construed by the Courts or otherwise, and the city reserves the right to cancel the privileges granted hereunder and refund the unearned rentals paid to the city.

Section 7. That the City of Cisco, Texas, hereby reserves the right to put into effect at any time other restrictions and regulations as to the erection and maintenance of poles, wires, pipes, and other appurtenances in the streets, easements, alleys and other public ways of the said City and from time to time to require such poles, pipes, wires and other property equipment and fixtures as it may deem proper to be removed and to require wires to be run in conduits on such terms as the City may deem proper.

Section 8. That every person, association, organization, and corporation who shall operate any business without the payment of the rentals provided for herein shall be subject to a penalty of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for each and every day that such person, association, organization or corporation shall conduct such business using and occupying the streets, easements, alleys, or other public ways of the City of Cisco, Texas, without the payment of the said rentals which said sum may be recovered by the City of Cisco in a court of competent jurisdiction by a suit filed therein.

Section 9. That every person, association, organization or corporation and the local manager or agent of every such person, organization or corporation failing or refusing to make the report required by Section 1 of this Ordinance, or failing or refusing to allow the examination provided for in Section 2 herein shall upon conviction in the Corporation Court of the City of Cisco, Texas, be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars and every day's failure or refusal, as mentioned in this Section, shall be deemed a separate offense.

Section 10. The City fire marshal, building inspector, electrical inspector, city's police officers, and such other persons designated by the City, shall have power and it shall be their duty to examine and inspect from time to time all telegraph, telephone, electric light or other poles, gas pipe lines, pipes and other fixtures in the public places within the City for the purpose of seeing that all of same are in a safe and suitable condition, and whenever any such item is found to be unsafe, or unsuitable for the purpose for which it is used, the person using, possessing, or maintaining same shall be notified and required to place same in a safe and suitable condition.

Section 11. If any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or held unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole or any part or provisions thereof other than the part so decided to be invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 12. That the fact that telegraph, telephone, electric and gas companies have been occupying the streets, easements, alleys, and other public ways of the City of Cisco, Texas, for many years without the payment of rent for such use creates an emergency, and this Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage, approval and publication as required by law.

Section 13. The amount of the first payment made hereunder shall be based on the number of days remaining in the quarter year during which the Ordinance becomes effective, after the effective date hereof.

Passed and approved this 8th day of July, A. D. 1941.

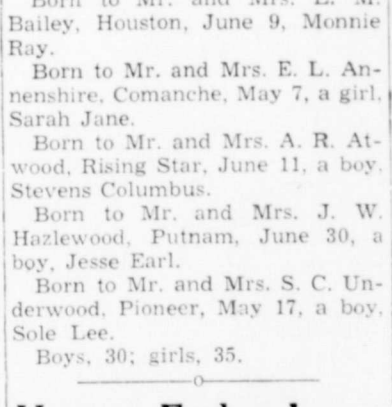
