KEEPS SINKERS FROM SLIPPING-If you use split-shot sinkers here's a good way to keep them from slipping. Insert a short piece of rubber band into the slot in the sinker, along with the line. Then crimp the shot over the rubber band.

Solon Lists Main Points Of Farm Bill

By Sen. Ralph Yarborough (D-Texas)

Dear Fellow Texan:

The 1968 agriculture appropriations bill has been approved by the United States Senate. That bill sets aside nearly \$7 billion to finance the Johnson Administration farm program for the current fiscal year.

THIS IS one of the most important pieces of legislation that the 90th Congress will consider because agriculture and the hundreds of related programs touch every American. It is expecially vital to Texas, which is one of the nation's biggest farm states. We have over 300,000 farm families. Texas farmers and ranchers are expected to market more than 21/2 billion dollars worth of farm products during 1958.

It would take hundreds of words to analyze this huge piece of legislation thoroughly, but I will hit some high spots that are of special interest to Texas.

The bill makes more than \$158 million available for agricultural research programs, and agricultural research is the foundation stone of our state's farm and ranch program. Agricultural research projects dealing with new and improved livestock breeding are watershed planning are important factors in our being the most productive agricultural nation on earth.

(This bill is not yet in its final form. It still must go to a House-Senate conference committee.)

The Senate-passed bill provides mcre than \$70 million for watershed protection, funds to be used for loans and on a shared-cost basis for local projects.

OUR BILL provides \$157 millicn for the entire nation to continue the federal assistance to the states for a school lunch program. Texas received \$61/2 million under this program to assure that needy children in the public schools receive the balanced meals they must have to grow and develop. This program helped pay for lunches for 836,221 youngsters in cur state. In addition, Texas received another four millien dellars to help schools and institutions serve 124.8 million rints of milk under the school

The agriculture appropriations bill includes \$172 million for the feed stamp program. This new program enables impoverished families to purchase groceries rarticipating in this program, but last year those 10 counties - El speth, Jeff Davis, Pecos, Presidic, Red River, Tarrant and Terrell - got a total of \$294,000 to help feed their poor families. The feed stamp program is a great program if used.

Texas is the largest beneficiary of the rural electrification act program, and this year's REA apprepriation of \$324 million for REA lcans is a substantial increase that will he'r Texas rural

THERE WAS lengthy debate over the commedity payment program, and we were successful in defeating an attempt to wreck that important program. I will review the commedity program in detail in a future report.



bill recently passed by the House - I was one of its co-sponsors and investigations already underway by both House and Senate committees, the House is now debating the Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice Assistance Act of 1967.

Properly amended, this bill could be an important step in the establishment of a federal program to provide assistance to local law enforcement agencies.

Unfortunately, the administration bill that was originally submitted contained the standard Great Society formula. It would stifle local initiative and direction and place maximum federal control in the hands of the attorney general.

IN AN EFFORT to improve the bill, the Republican members of the Judiciary Committee were able to obtain several amendments including:

A. An appropriate judicial review provided in cases where the attorney general cuts off funds. B. Congressional oversight on

the operation of the data bank. C. The open-end authorization was eliminated, thereby insuring essential legislative review of

the act. D. The direct federal payment of regular police salaries was banned.

THE PRESENT emergency demands that meaningful and appropriate federal assistance be given to state and local law enforcement agencies.

However, this crisis must not be used as a vehicle to place federal control over state and local police administration and to lay the foundation for a centralized federal police force. Therefore, additional and essential saleguards on the broad powers of the federal administrator shoul be adopted.

Law enforcement and criminal justice administration are primarily local responsibilities. Crime is essentially a local problem that must be dealt with by state and local governments. Even the attorney general has stated, "We would hope to have all the States really working for a fully comprehensive plan for the State." Any provision or measure that would upset or reverse this historic concept must be avoided.

THE RECENT riots have reemphasized the basic fact that the state and its designated agencies must have the primary responsibility for coordinating the law enforcement effort within a state. Certainly, experience under the "poverty" program has demonstrated that failure to coordinate federal activities with state activities creates serious financial and administrative problemn.

Another amendment I will support is one to provide essential state coordination and eliminate the federal government's power to dominate and control local law enforcement. I cannot agree with the contention that the attorney general should have authority to promulgate regulations and make other determinations as to population size for participation.

And I will support adoption of an appropriate allocation formula for a statutory assurance of the availability of meaningful funds for every state. The only such requirement in the bill now is

Under a new Federal Reserve Bank ruling, effective Sept. 1, banks are required to have their Federal Reserve System number encoded on all their checks in magnetic-ink IBM numerals.

This is to allow the computerized sorting of the millions of checks and drafts that are processed through Federal Reserve branches, clearing houses, and banks that are "on computer."
