WASHINGTON. July 18. --- President Roosevelt announced today that he will send a special message to congress next week supporting the army's drive for legislation that will retain selectees, guardsmen and reserves in service for duration of the national emergency.

The president told his press conference, however, that his message will not deal with another army suggestion to permit use of citizen-soldiers outside the western hemisphere or United States possessions.

Mr. Roosevelt added that his message would be general, since the burden of passing the necessary legislation rests upon congress.
