The bonds are being voted against the tax refund granted the city by an act of the legislature in June following the June 10th flood.

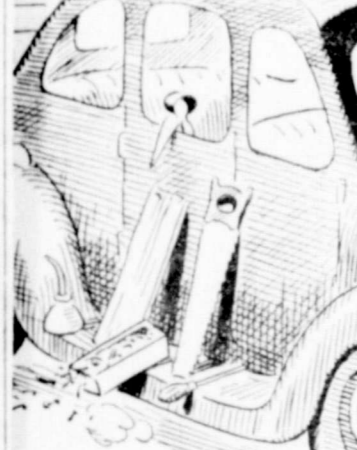
This refund will be half of the ad valorem taxes of Shuckelford county for a period of 10 years, amounting to \$100,000 in 10 years.

The president told his press conference, however, that his message will not deal with another army suggestion to permit use of citizen-soldiers outside the western hemisphere or United States possessions.

Mr. Roosevelt added that his message would be general, since the burden of passing the necessary legislation rests upon congress.

A half dozen registered tully goats of the Angora breed were being shown on Main street Monday afternoon by Edward Lee of the Lee farm. The goats were selected last week by R. G. 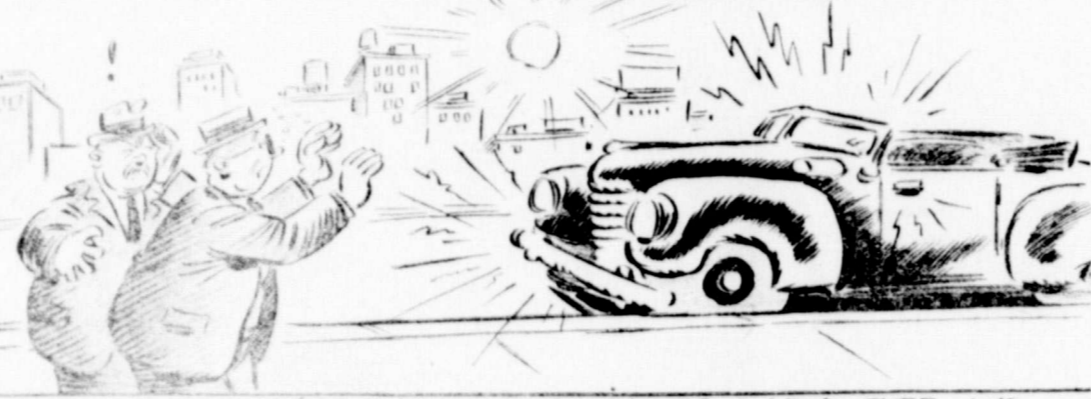

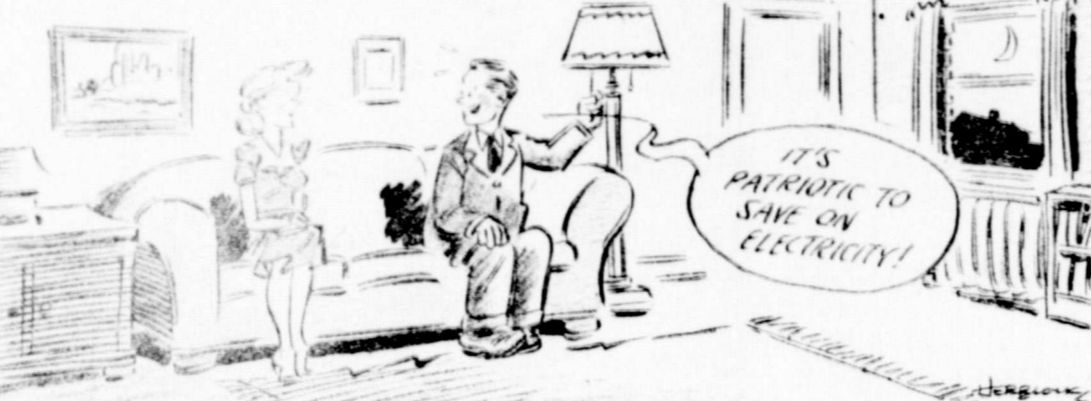

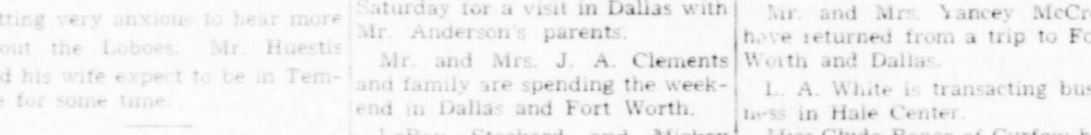

Fortunes of War See-Saw in Libya

Nowhere have the fortunes of war shown themselves to be so fickle as in the campaigns that have taken place in Libya. British and axis forces have jostled for positions in this Northern African colony since last winter. The stamp above, showing a Roman legionary, was issued by Italy for the colonies in 1921, nine years after the territory now comprising Libya was conquered from the Turks and welded into one large state. Gen. Sir Archibald Wavell's British troops last winter swept across Libya in a spectacular drive. Opposing Italian forces were hurled back wherever they were encountered. With many of his troops dispatched to Greece to fight the Nazi invasion of Greece and Yugoslavia, General Wavell was compelled to abandon his Libyan positions and British forces were driven back to the Egyptian border by axis troops. Recently, however, British strength in Northern Africa has been reestablished and the Empire's troops opened a new offensive against axis forces in Libya.

EDSON'S WASHINGTON COLUMN

There'll Be No More Leering at General Lear, Girl Golfers in Shorts or Army Discipline

WASHINGTON.—The Case of Lieut.-Gen. Ben Lear and his disciplining of 350 soldiers by making them do a 15-mile march because one detachment yoo-hooed at girls in shorts on a Memphis golf course is settled as far as General Lear is concerned. Although the War Department has asked for a report and is investigating, nothing much will come of it.

The talk of a congressional investigation of the incident is merely evidence that the silly season is here, and if Rep. Paul Kilday of San Antonio carries his demands any further he is probably leading with his neck.

The good gentleman from Texas worked his way through college and law school and is serving his second term in Congress though he has just turned 41. He is considered an asset to the House Military Affairs Committee, but he never served a day of his life in military service, not even in an R. O. T. C. unit in high school or college, and all he knows about the Army he has learned from the upholstered and air-conditioned halls and offices of Congress.

GENERAL LEAR, on the other hand, had all the traditional Army demand for strict discipline behind his action, and military folklore is replete with incidents in which mass punishment has been meted out to whole companies or even larger units for breach of orders.

At West Point, it is traditional that any cadet who can't keep his eyes straight ahead will get demerits. And it's no uncommon occurrence for parading units to receive mass demerits if they let their eyes stray as their column or line passes a pretty girl standing at the side of the drill ground.

The idea behind all this insistence on strict observance of courtesy to women is obvious. The way Army officers figure it, if they permit the yoo-hos, one thing leads to another and pretty soon the civilian population in the vicinity of an Army post is yelling against the menace of the soldiers to the nice girls of the community—it isn't safe for women to walk alone on the streets any more, and all that. And if there is one thing an Army command dreads worse than actual war, it's getting in bed with the taxpayers.

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RUSHING SAYS HE LIKES THE EASY EGG WAY

Now that eggs are bringing good prices, hens are going on rest vacations, according to farmers who keep large flocks of hens and depend upon them for a big portion of their weekly income. Hot weather and the approaching time for moulting has had a decided influence on the egg market.

J. T. Rushing, who lives southeast of Cisco, says he has been getting about 20 dozen eggs per week, but the output now is only about half that amount. He keeps white leghorns for laying purposes and some of the heavier breeds for hatching during the spring months.

When asked if he had tried growing fryers for the market, he said he had not. With leghorn-laying breeds it would be necessary to buy baby chicks and that would make it necessary to have brooders and devote lots of time attending to them. He said he did not like the idea of playing mother to several hundred little chicks. He admitted he wanted to be in the poultry business the easy way—let the hens do the work.

TO PRESERVE DEMOCRACY?

**LEGAL NOTICE**

**AN ORDINANCE FIXING RENTALS TO BE PAID BY TELEGRAPH, TELEPHONE, ELECTRIC AND GAS COMPANIES FOR THE PRIVILEGE OF USING WITH THEIR POLES, WIRES, CONDUITS, PIPES AND FIXTURES THE STREETS, EASEMENTS, AND ALLEYS AND OTHER PUBLIC WAYS WITHIN THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS, PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION, AND PROVIDING AN EMERGENCY.**

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Cisco, Texas:

Section 1. That all persons, associations, organizations, and corporations using or maintaining any telegraph, telephone, electric light or other poles, gas pipe lines, pipes, and other fixtures in any of the streets, highways, easements, alleys, parks or other places within the corporate limits of the City of Cisco, Texas, shall make quarterly, on the first day of January, April, July and October of each year, a sworn report to the City Secretary, showing the gross receipts from the business conducted by such persons, associations, organizations and corporations within the corporate limits of the said city for the preceding three months.

Section 2. The City Commission when it may see fit, may have the books and records of the person, association, organization, or corporation rendering the statement required in Section 1 of this

Ordinance examined by a representative of the City to ascertain whether such statement is accurate, but nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to prevent the City from ascertaining the facts by any other method.

Section 3. That upon the 1st day of January, April, July and October of each and every year every person, association, organization, or corporation occupying or using the streets, highways, easements, alleys, parks, or other public places in the City of Cisco, Texas, with poles, pipes and for other fixtures shall as a condition to such further occupancy pay to the City annually for such privileges a rental equal of two (2%) percent of the gross receipts received by such persons, association, organization, or corporation from its business conducted in the corporate limits of the City of Cisco, Texas, for the preceding three months, which sums shall be paid to the City of Cisco, Texas.

Section 4. That the rental for the privilege of using the streets, alleys, highways, easements and public places of the City of Cisco provided for in this ordinance is not charged as a tax, but is made for the privilege now enjoyed and to be enjoyed by such persons, associations, organizations, and corporations of using the streets, easements, alleys, and other public ways of the City in the conduct of their respective businesses; and such charges are additional to all ad valorem and franchise taxes and to all taxes of every nature whatsoever against the persons, associations, organizations, or corporations mentioned herein.

Section 5. That nothing herein is intended to relieve any person, association, organization, or corporation of any condition, restriction or requirement, imposed by any law or ordinance of the said City of Cisco, Texas.

Section 6. That this ordinance does not grant a franchise to any utility or person, association, organization or corporation to use the streets, easements, alleys and other public ways and shall never be so construed by the Courts or otherwise, and the city reserves the right to cancel the privileges granted hereunder and refund the unearned rentals paid to the city.

Section 7. That the City of Cisco, Texas, hereby reserves the right to put into effect at any time other restrictions and regulations as to the erection and maintenance of poles, wires, pipes, and other appurtenances in the streets, easements, alleys and other public ways of the said City and from time to time to require such poles, pipes, wires and other property equipment and fixtures as it may deem proper to be removed and to require wires to be run in conduits on such terms as the City may deem proper.

Section 8. That every person, association, organization, and corporation who shall operate any business without the payment of the rentals provided for herein shall be subject to a penalty of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for each and every day that such person, association, organization, or corporation shall conduct such business using and occupying the streets, easements, alleys, or other public ways of the City of Cisco, Texas, without the payment of the said rentals which said sum may be recovered by the City of Cisco in a court of competent jurisdiction by a suit filed therein.

Section 9. That every person, association, organization or corporation and the local manager or agent of every such person, organization or corporation failing or refusing to make the report required by Section 1 of this Ordinance, or failing or refusing to allow the examination provided for in Section 2 herein shall upon conviction in the Corporation Court of the City of Cisco, Texas, be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars and every day's failure or refusal, as mentioned in this Section, shall be deemed a separate offense.

Section 10. The City fire marshal, building inspector, electrical inspector, city's police officers, and such other persons designated by the City, shall have power and it shall be their duty to examine and inspect from time to time all telegraph, telephone, electric light or other poles, gas pipe lines, pipes and other fixtures in the public places within the City for the purpose of seeing that all of same are in a safe and suitable condition, and whenever any such item is found to be unsafe, or unsuitable for the purpose for which it is used, the person using, possessing or maintaining same shall be notified and required to place same in a safe and suitable condition.

Section 11. If any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or provision of this Ordinance

shall be adjudged invalid or held unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole or any part or provisions thereof other than the part so decided to be invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 12. That the fact that telegraph, telephone, electric and gas companies have been occupying and using the streets, easements, alleys and other public ways of the City of Cisco, Texas, for many years without the payment of rent for such use creates an emergency, and this Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage, approval and publication as required by law.

Section 13. The amount of the first payment made hereunder shall be based on the number of days remaining in the quarter year during which this Ordinance becomes effective, after the effective date hereof.

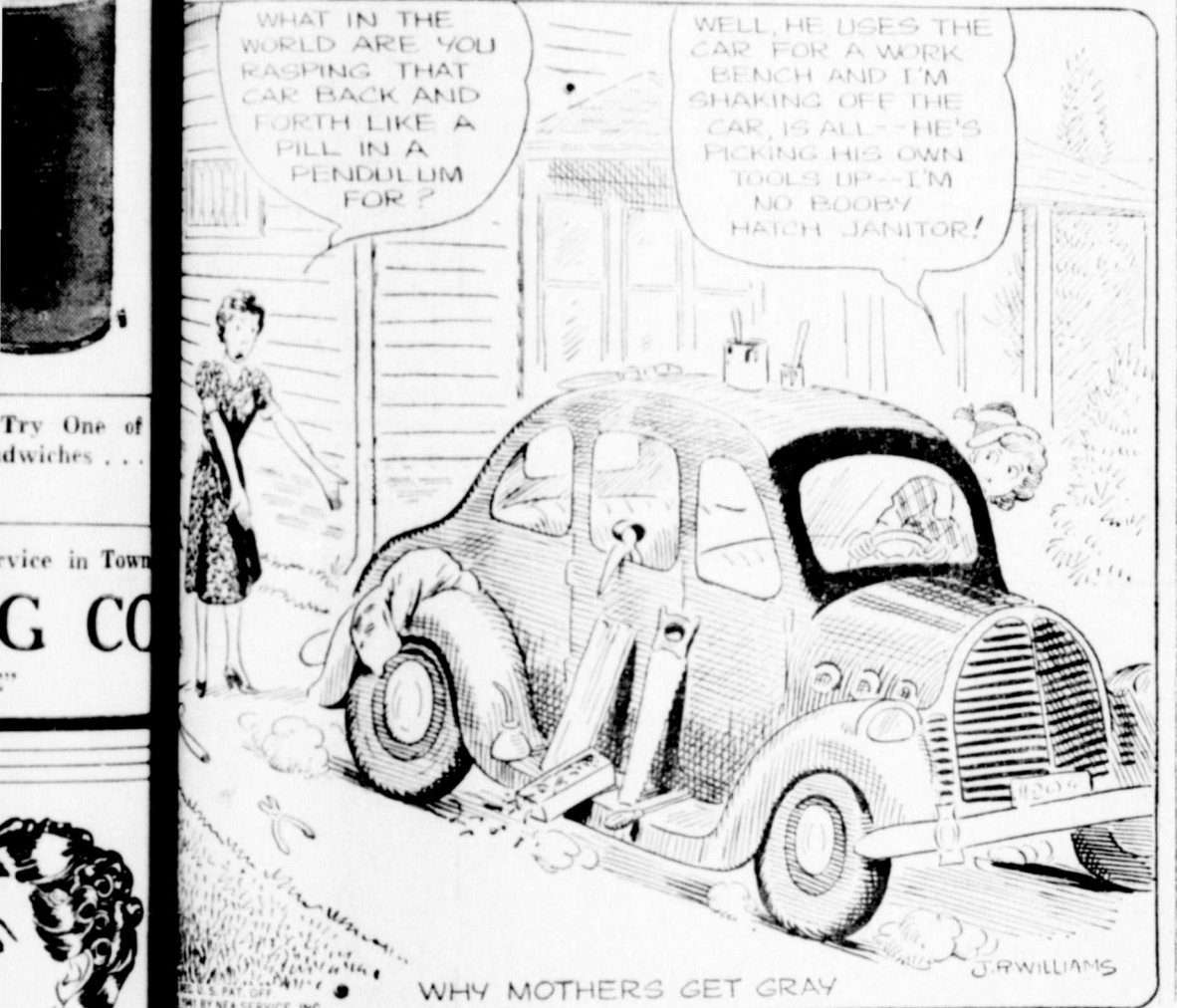

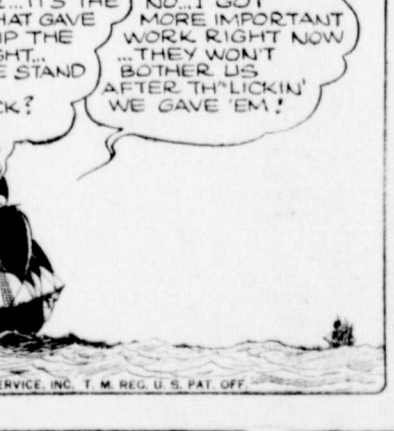

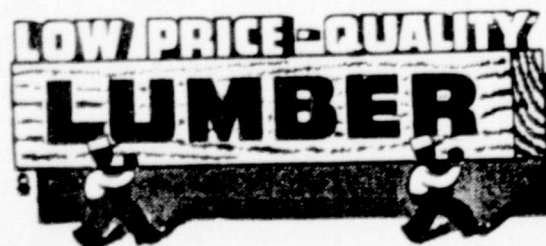

### STORIES IN STAMPS



#### Old Argentine Stamp Honors National Hero

LARGELY responsible for Argentina's present constitutional government was General Urquiza, whose portrait appears on the stamp above, issued by the Argentine government in 1888.

General Urquiza became first president under the constitution adopted in 1852. Urquiza paved the way for this distinction by eliminating his former superior, Juan Manuel Rosas, dictator in a war in which he enlisted the aid of Brazil and one of the Uruguayan factions. Rosas was compelled to flee to Europe.

Urquiza was elected by the president for a term of six years. Toward the end of his term of office, Buenos Aires declared war on the new federal government. Urquiza's forces vanquished the rebels, but the president's term ended before peace terms could be arranged.

Urquiza's end finally came when he was assassinated during an insurrection in Entre Rios where he was governor.
