## EDSON'S WASHINGTON COLUMN

High Rents in Capital Stir Up Storm in Congress With Bill Which May Control Landlords' Prices

WASHINGTON.—Everybody who pays rent and everybody who collects it—which takes in all classes except the people who own the unmortgaged parts of their own homes—should be interested in ning the experience of Washington, D. C., in trying to get and

Washington is particularly hard hit on the rent question now because of the influx of new government workers-55,000 of them in the last 18 months and from 1000 to 1250 more coming in every week. Nearly every one brings an average of one dependent with him, so Washington's population has gone

up 100,000 Although 25,000 new dwellings have been built in the District rea within the last 15 months, only 7000 of them have been for rent, and 4000 of these have been at \$50 a month or more. Thus, while general experience is that rents stay at normal levels when there are 5 per cent vacancies in rentable properties, the Washington

evel is less than 2 per cent, and the squeeze is on. Washington is worse off in this respect than any other large city n the country with the possible exception of Detroit, but there are 300 cities in the land with Army camps or production booms.

TO meet the situation in Washington, Congress is considering a bill introduced by Rep. Jennings Randolph of Elkins, W. Va., providing for the appointment by the President of a rent administrator to whom broad powers would be given to set standards, hold hearings and make decisions on fair rents. Appeal may be taken from the decisions to the United States Court of Appeals, and provisions are made to prevent injunctions or evictions, pending the appeal. Coninuation of undiminished services such as heat and light is made a

part of any rent contract and any curtailment is made a misdemeanor.

This is obviously a law in which the tenant gets the breaks, and while it would apply only to the District of Columbia, the important thing about it is that Washington will serve as a guinea pig for the rest of the country. 


