PLENTY MEAT SAYS PACKER, PEACE OR WAR

DALLAS, July 31.—There will be no meatless days in this country if we get into the war, in the opinion of D. V. Pinkerton of Chicago, official of the Institute of American meat packers.

"Production has maintained such a high level that we have ample meat supply for home consumption and any exporting we may be called on to ship," declared Pinkerton, who is on a tour of the southwest.

ARMY NEEDS 30,000 AIR MEN YEARLY

FORT WORTH, July 31.—Lieut. Col. Royden Williamson, publicity officer for the Eighth Corps Area, visiting in Fort Worth, declared the United States is in need of more and more youths to fly its pursuit and bombing ships that are rolling from production lines in ever-increasing numbers.

The officer, who is stationed in San Antonio, stopped here on a flying trip of the southwest in which he is discussing a radio series with stations in the interest of the Army Air Corps and planning an "invitation tour" of Randolph Field for young men interested in flying.

The one-time newspaperman, a captain in World War I, said "the thing we're trying to do is put enlistment on a man-to-man basis."

"We want the young men already training in aviation to say 'come on in, the water's fine,' rather than pitch the appeal on the basis that the army needs flying cadets."

The nation can use 30,000 flying cadets annually. Colonel Williamson, who left Wednesday, is traveling with Maj. Richard Montgomery. He will visit Oklahoma City, Tulsa, El Paso, Phoenix, Denver and Albuquerque.

NAZIS FACE GREAT NEW RED FORCE

Russian troops today reportedly made heavy counter-attacks east of Smolensk, while Britain staged an Arctic air attack to aid the Soviet and Harry Hopkins, personal representative of President Roosevelt, conferred in Moscow on Russian war needs.

In the Far East Japan hastily apologized for the bombing of the American gunboat *Tu-tuila*. However, Washington indicated that informal expressions of regret may not be considered sufficient.

The Russians are said to have issued a powerful reinforcement have been brought up to enable the Soviet to strike heavier blows at the Germans.

Russian counter-attacks have been acknowledged by the German news agency, which said, however, that these counter-attacks had been repulsed with heavy losses to the Red army.

British bombers struck severe blows at Kirkenes in northern Norway, and at Petsamo in northern Finland.

PRESIDENT TO CURB BUYING, INSTALLMENT

WASHINGTON, July 31.—The administration's decision to curb the public's installment buying today delayed introduction of a bill authorizing the president to fix maximum prices for commodities and rents in defense areas at June 30 levels.

Mr. Roosevelt conferred with Leon Henderson, price control administrator, and Chairman Mariner S. Eccles of the federal reserve board on installment-buying legislation.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—Chairman Martin Dies of the house committee investigating un-American activities, said today his agents had uncovered sensational evidence of an elaborate Japanese sabotage plot on the West coast.

NEW ORLEANS, July 31.—Jack D. Wraether, Jr., 23 years of age and bridegroom-to-be of Molly O'Daniel, 21, daughter of Gov. and Mrs. W. Lee O'Daniel, was today granted an honorable discharge by the navy department, in which he had enlisted as a reservist.

This action clears the path for the nuptials tonight at Austin, to which the governor has invited all Texas.

NEW BOMBERS HAVE 99-FOOT WINGSPREAD

LONDON, July 31.—Britain's big new Stirling bombers, it is permitted now to disclose, have a wingspread of 99 feet, are 87 feet and 3 inches long and many are powered by engines built in the United States.

Some have four 1,400-horsepower Bristol-Hercules engines, a British type, but others have four Wright double-row, 1,350 horsepower cyclones.

Their speed, bomb capacity and guns still are secrets, but British sources said their armament is "very heavy," including gun turrets both front and rear.

Attacked Waitress; Under \$5,000 Bond

LEVELLAND, July 31.—A young Sundown oil field worker was placed under \$5,000 bail after a complaint that he attacked a 15-year-old drive-in waitress.

Charges were filed in Justice of Peace A. D. Forehand's court at Sundown. District Attorney Burton S. Burks of Lubbock was here for the hearing, at which the girl and her mother testified.

Further action will be referred to a grand jury that will be impaneled in Seventy-second District court here in September.

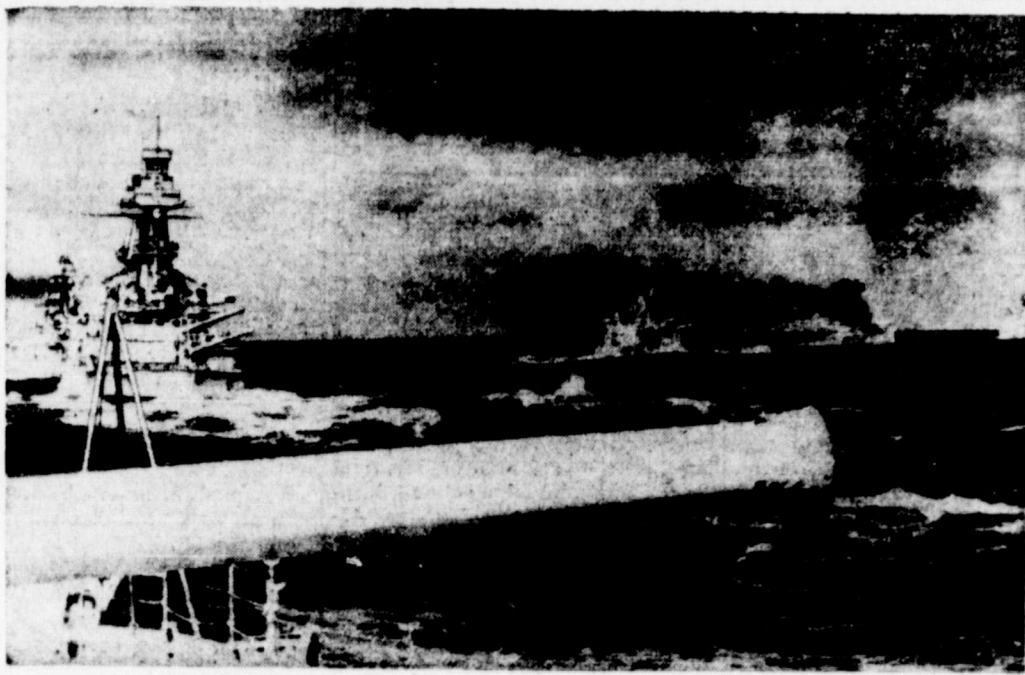

HEAD SOCIAL SECURITY BD. WARNS PUBLIC

ABILENE, July 31.—Employers were warned in a statement made by W. O. King, manager of the Abilene Social Security board field office, to demand proof of identification of any individual representing himself as a "social security tax collector."

In making this statement, King explained that in some sections of the country persons posing as representatives of the United States government and claiming to be employed as "tax collectors for the Social Security board," have gained the confidence of some employers, secured their wage records, and collected considerable sums of money which were never sent to the collector of internal revenue—the only agency having authority to collect such taxes.

It was pointed out that complaints regarding the operation of these so-called tax collectors have come from employers in small towns, oil field communities and operators of stores and shops near army camps and defense projects. In one town a woman who had one employ in a small shop paid four or five times the amount of her tax under the impression that it would be forwarded to the col-

lector of internal revenue and placed to her credit. After the employer has thus been victimized, King said, the matter is forgotten until he receives notice that his quarterly tax report is due.

"The only person authorized to collect taxes under the Social Security Act is a representative of the bureau of internal revenue. Each representative has an identification card which he will gladly present when requested to do so," King added.

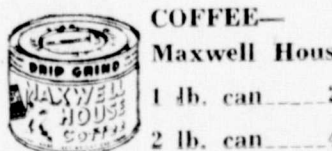

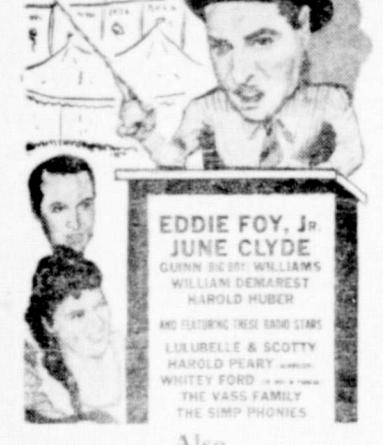

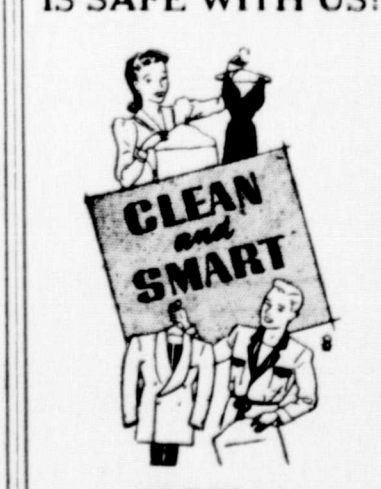

Ousted Nazi Will Like it in Japan

VINA DEL MAR, Chile, July 31.—A spokesman for Ernest Wendler, German minister expelled from Bolivia, said the minister will sail for Japan Friday on the Japanese ship Rakuyo Maru.

The minister, who is under instructions to leave Chile as soon as possible, expects to reside in Japan for a while instead of attempting to return to Germany via the Atlantic, the spokesman said.

Dallas Negroes Ask Roosevelt's Help

NEW YORK, July 31.—The American Civil Liberties union offered a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the imprisonment of persons responsible for the burning of some negro homes in Dallas.

The union said in a statement it had asked President Roosevelt and Acting Attorney General Francis Biddle to take immediate federal action.

Its letter to President Roosevelt urged him to call the Dallas situation to the attention of the committee on fair employment practices, recently appointed to abolish discrimination against negroes in defense industries.

The president was asked to urge the department of justice to proceed against those responsible for attacks on negro homes, on the grounds that "they are violating federal statutes guaranteeing all citizens the equal protection of the law."

UNCLE SAMMIE PUTS SEIZED SHIPS IN USE

WASHINGTON, July 31.—The first of 30 Axis ships seized by the United States went into active service yesterday, the maritime commission announced.

The Italian freighter, Clara, on which repairs have been completed under supervision of the commission, will start loading cargo at Norfolk, Va.

The Clara was the least damaged of 27 Italian and one German ships which were sabotaged by their crews before United States authorities took them into protective custody last March. It has not been determined whether the two other seized Axis vessels were damaged.

The commission estimated it would cost about \$6,000,000 to repair and put in active service all of the Axis ships.

The Clara, 6,131 gross tons, was repaired at Savannah, Ga., and drydocked at Newport News, Va. The commission did not disclose the nature of her cargo or her destination, but said the Clara had been chartered to the Waterman Steamship company and its regis-

try transferred to Panama. Transfer of registry from the United States would permit the vessel to operate in combat zones barred to United States ships.

The Italian tanker Colorado, being repaired at Galveston, is scheduled for delivery in the next few days. Repairs on seven other Axis ships will be completed in August, while 13 more will be completed in September. Work on the remaining six will be completed this year.
