Chilean Conservatives

Revolted Against Montt Manuel Month was elected president of Chile in 1851. The situation was full of alarming possibilities. Gen. Manuel Bulnes, his predecessor, had done a rather capable job, but liberal elements in the country were grumbling over the election of Montt, an arch

conservative. Economically, the country was prosperous and Mont! governed with a firm hand. The Chilean government has honored him philatelically with the 1911 stamp above.

Montt was re-elected in 1856 and two years later found his country embroiled in civil war. Paradoxically enough, the uprising did not spring from the dissatisfied liberals but from the conservative church elements which had supported him.

History is not very clear as to how the disagreement originated, but it is believed it started when Archbishop Valdivieso was not upheld by the Supreme Court in a

decision regarding certain priests. The revolt was quelled in 1859 and Montt served out his full term. Jose Joaquin Perez succeeded him in 1861. Montt subsequently president of the Supreme Court until his death in 1880.





WASHINGTON, July 31. - The ed this year. first of 30 Axis ships seized by the United States went into active service yesterday, the maritime commission announced.

The Italian freighter, Clara, on which repairs have been completed under supervision of the commission, will start loading cargo at Norfolk, Va.

The Clara was the least damaged of 27 Italian and one German ships which were sabotaged by their crews before United States authorities took them into protective custody last March. It has not been determined whether the two other seized Axis vessels were damaged.

The commission estimated it would cost about \$6,000,000 to repair and put in active service all of the Axis ships.

The Clara, 6,131 gross tons, was repaired at Savannah, Ga., and drydocked at Newport News, Va. The commission did not disclose the nature of her cargo or her destination, but said the Clara had been chartered to the Waterman Steamship company and its regis-

The president was asked to urge the department of justice to proceed against those responsible for attacks on negro homes, on the grounds that "they are violating federal statues guaranteeing all citizens the equal protection of the


