SPENCER TO HAVE 10,000 PEACH TREES

On his 320-acre farm in the Long Branch community—15 miles southeast of Cisco—J. E. Spencer of this city has approximately 3,500 peach trees. Only a few of these are bearing this year, but about 2,000 of them will be of bearing age next year.

There are apples, pears, and figs in the Spencer orchards, but peaches predominate and an additional 3,000 peach trees will be planted this fall. Mr. Spencer's goal is 10,000 peach trees. For general purposes he favors the freestone and cling variety.

Charlie Walker and family live on the Spencer farm and look after the 89-acre peach orchard.

WEDDINGTON CISCO HIGH RANCH UP TO GRADUATE IS IN THE MINUTE AIR CORPS

An early morning jaunt to the great Weddington ranch north-west of Cisco, in company with busy Bob Weddington, is a matter of some moment within itself, but when one views that big herd of registered cattle grazing on the special pastures provided for the calves, it would be a cold-blooded person indeed, who failed to get a thrill from the trip.

We say calves because Mr. Weddington called them calves. He pointed out one especially good looking giant of a heifer, saying, "Now, there is a good calf!" We located the animal he was speaking of and asked, in subdued voice, what he supposed she would weigh. His answer was: "About 900 pounds or better."

In the group shown there were animals all the way from three days old to 15-month-old calves, and every animal showed the fine breeding that went back many generations to its double and cross-breeding of master beef qualities that have gone into making these animals sell for phenomenally high prices for foundation stock purposes.

Mr. Weddington mentioned the fact that he was adding more milk qualities to his breeding.

"A calf must have milk if it is to grow into a sturdy beef animal and that's the purpose of beef breeding. There has never been found any better food for an infant or a calf than its own mother's milk. So, if we can develop better milkers without deterioration in beef qualities, we have gone a long step in arranging for better young beef stock to supply the world's markets," Mr. Weddington said.

"After an inspection of his large native-stone barn and sheds, together with the many feed bins filled with mixtures of grain and ground feeds grown and ground on this ranch, Mr. Weddington remarked that the first thing that was to teach the young calves to eat. It requires feed to put on flesh and the earlier a young animal learns to begin putting out that flesh, the earlier the calf can get to market. And the time element counts big in fattening any kind of market animal.

There are stalls and troughs for the larger animals and feed bins low on the ground for the younger animals. Bars are arranged so that the smaller animals may have

SPIDER BITE SERIOUS TO BOB WALKER

The condition of R. H. (Bob) Walker, patient at Graham sanitarium, was considerably improved this morning.

Mr. Walker is suffering from the poison of a black widow spider, W. Frank Walker, brother, stated. The spider contacted him at his home Sunday morning, August 3, but at first he gave the wound very little concern. He carried his family to church, and by that time was forced to see a physician, with the medical man attending him every day since. His condition grew steadily worse, as the poison spread through his system, and became quite serious Thursday, when he was removed to the sanitarium.

Frank Walker says the black widow's poison affects one much like that of rattlesnake poison. The part nearest the wound becomes numb and begin to ache, as the poison spreads, the whole body becomes affected, producing nausea and hiccoughing.

Mr. Walker was at his home on the Rising Star road, south of Cisco, when bitten by the spider.

MRS. D. HART IN HOSPITAL; CAR VICTIM

Suffering with facial and neck lacerations, hip and back injuries, Mrs. Donza Hart, a resident of Romney, is confined in Graham sanitarium where she is being treated for her injuries, and it was stated that she will have to remain there for some time yet for treatment and observation for more serious injuries than were apparent today.

George Stowe, of Long Branch, with whom Mrs. Hart was riding, received lesser injuries when Stowe's car was struck from the rear by a car in which were R. C. Baird, Bob Cook and Scott Miller, laundry workmen from Camp Bowie, Brownwood.

The crash occurred about 10 o'clock Saturday night, about one mile south of Romney. Both cars were traveling south when the Brownwood car crashed into Mr. Stowe's car. The impact, which was heard by Jack Carter, service station man at Romney, threw the Stowe car into the ditch on the right side of the highway, and the Brownwood car on the opposite side. Both cars were badly damaged, those who visited the scene, stated.

JAPS OBJECT TO SHIPMENT OF U. S. MATERIAL

(By United Press)
Nazi sources claimed the Russian Black sea port, Odessa, has been isolated, with German advance units driving through the Ukraine, both east and west of the city.

The Germans also asserted that another big victory had been scored on the central front, as Panzer units penetrated Viazma, only 140 miles from Moscow.

Meantime, American-built flying fortresses paced the deepest British daylight penetration of Germany and the biggest fighter offensive in smashing daylight attacks on industrial targets.

In Vichy, a shuffle of the French cabinet brought to power the anti-British admiral, Francois Darlan, but Marshal Philip Petain, titular head of state, attempted to reassure the United States that the "instinct for liberty still burns strong within us."

Russian reports indicated the Red Army is falling back slowly, but resisting strongly.

Japan made clear her opposition to American plans to ship war materials to Russia via Vladivostok.

7 AMERICANS KILLED WHEN PLANE FALLS

LONDON, August 12.—Twenty-two passengers, including seven Americans, were killed Sunday when a transatlantic plane crashed into a hillside shortly after taking off from a British air field, the air ministry announced.

The victims included Capt. H. B. Judy, of Dallas.

The plane is believed to have been a "ferry" plane, returning pilots to Canada to fly American-built planes to England.

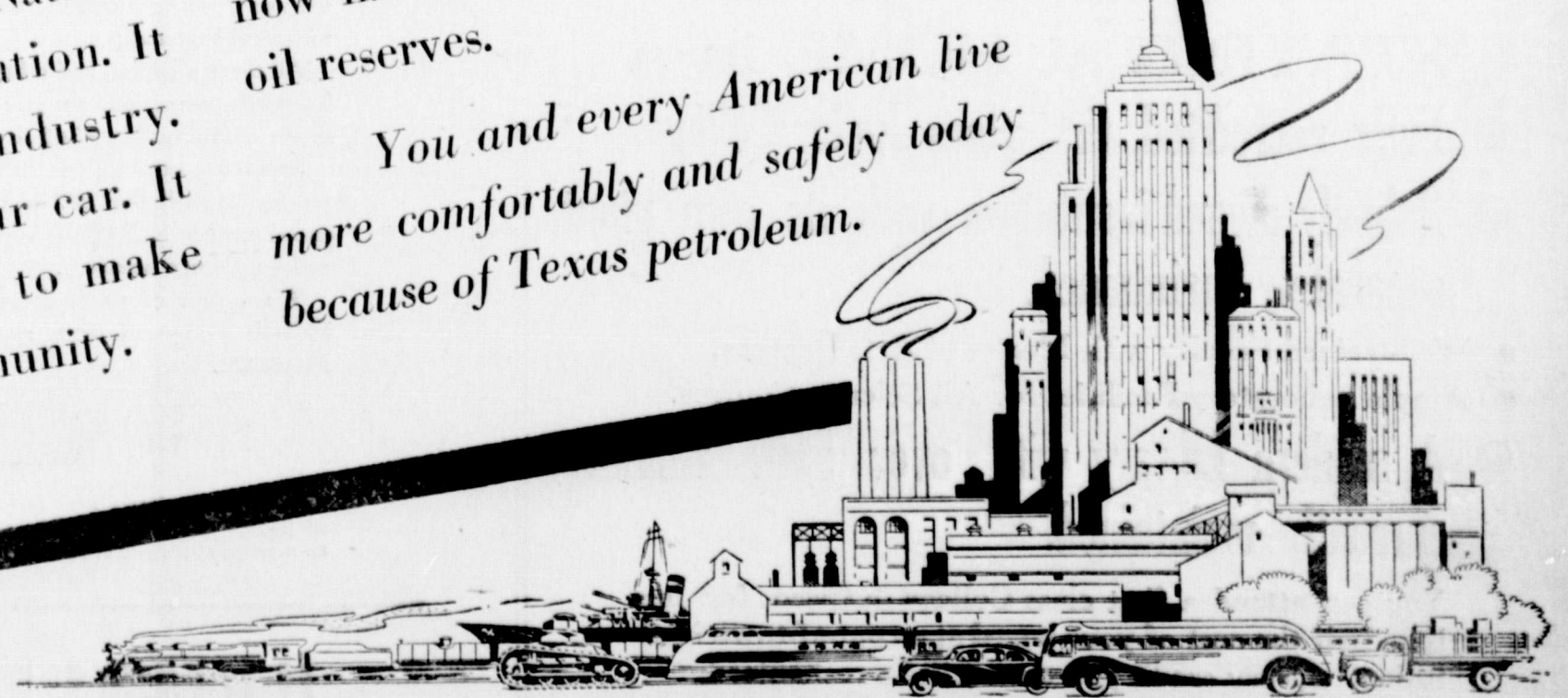
