WASHINGTON.—The whole U. S. Department of Labor for the Territory of Hawaii came to Washington on leave the other day, but before you conjure up any mental image of a boatload of bureaucrats on a junket, please be advised that the department in Hawaii consists of Mr. Howard Durham-which is a pleasing variation from the usual pattern of a govern

ment office holding anywhere from a couple of dozen to a couple of hundred. Durham, a young lawyer of 35, went to Honolulu from San Francisco a few years ago as an inspector for the wages and hours division of the department, but when he got there the department started shooting other problems at him. Before he knew it, he was representing not only the wages and hours division, the child labor division, and the conciliation service, but he was also administering the Walsh-Healy act covering construction projects for Army and Navy expansion, and starting an apprentice training program for defense industries. 
