Beauty of Guatemala Draws Many Tourists.

GUATEMALA, which borders Mexico on the south, is one of the most picturesque of the Latin American countries. There are Indian villages, ancient churches, relics of the conquistadores, roadside shrines and Mayan ruins.

The country is not large, as the 1936 map shows above clearly indicates. It has an area of 45,432 square miles. The country is bordered by British Honduras, Honduras, Salvador and the Pacific ocean besides Mexico.

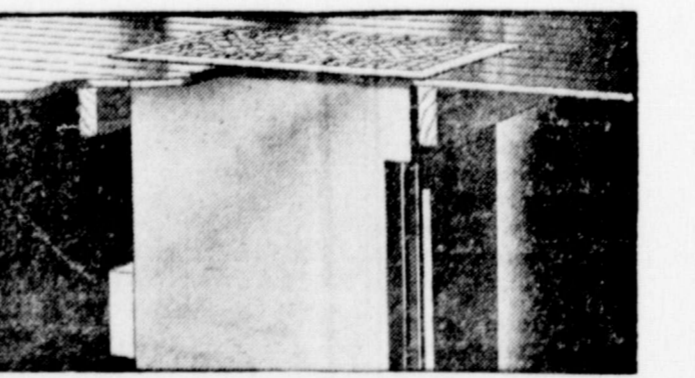

GAS CEILING TO BE SET; PROBE STARTS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—A plan of action against gasoline profiteering was drafted by the government Wednesday, and Thursday a senate investigating committee proposes to begin finding out whether the reported Eastern oil shortage is supported by facts.

Leon Henderson, price administrator, indicated he would proclaim forthwith a ceiling for motor fuel prices, to protect the 10,000,000 Atlantic Seaboard motorists against unwarranted price increases.

Secretary Ickes, the defense petroleum co-ordinator, was called as the first witness before a special subcommittee of the Sen-

ate Commerce Committee, Tuesday after Senator McClellan of Connecticut, had wanted to find out "if the actual shortage or if it is being pushed around for political reasons."

OIL ALLOWABLE.

AUSTIN, August 27.—A file in a district court here Tuesday for the second time attacked the railroad commission's allowable oil production order for the Gulf-McElroy of Crane and Upton counties.

Marrs of Kendall county appealed to the court from an order restricting the field's permit yield to 19,988 barrels gross 13,543 barrels net daily in October. Judge J. Harris Grant set September 2 for a hearing on application for a temporary injunction restraining the commission from enforcing the order issued August 23.
