Rains in county range from 1.07 to 5.27



The long, 51/2-month dry spell in the county was finally broken Saturday when the rains began to fall. They have continued to fall throughout this week and are expected to continue through next week due to hurricane activity off the Texas coast.

The average 3.14 inches of moisture received in the county during this rainy spell has almost doubled the amount of moisture received so far for 1984. Only 3.67 inches of moisture had been recorded in 1984 until last Thursday.



The recent rains have ranged from 5.27 inches for the City of Dimmitt down to 1.07 in Hart, as recorded by Farmers' Grain Co.

Although some wheat is laying down and harvest has been slowed a little, most area elevator operators say it doesn't look like it will hurt the wheat any, and it will certainly benefit crops in general.

KDHN Radio, official US Weather Observer, recorded a total of 2.50 inches of precipitation, while Jerry Wilhelm recorded 3.5 inches five miles north of Nazareth.

Eddie Matthews of Easter Grain, reporting 1.07 inches, said the precipitation will benefit the corn and milo crops this year. He added that the rains would help cure out the wheat and would help it a lot.

'The rains should prolong the wheat harvest," said Don Gregory at Castro County Grain. "The moisture will be a big help to farmers. They will be able to shut their wells off. It will give a tremendous boost to the corn.

According to Fred Bruegel of Bruegel and Sons Elevators, the wet weather will benefit all crops. "It will make big bolls out of little bolls of cotton, and it will also make big ears out of little ears of corn." Bruegel reported 51/2 inches at the. elevator and 11/2 inches at his home.

Sunnyside grain only reported 11/4 inches of rain over the last 10 days.

J.R. Brown of Flagg Grain reported 2.75 inches of rain with the biggest rain coming last Saturday when they received .80 inches. "The moisture won't hurt the wheat if it stops now," said Brown.

Charles Wales of Bethel reported 5.07 inches of moisture during the 10 day wet

Families can ease the move to a nursing home

into a nursing home can ings. produce a family crisis.

"Whether the move is initiated by the older person or the family members, it brings to the surface all the mixed feelings that characterize close human relationships," says Judith L. Warren, a family life education-aging specialist.

With the move to an institution, all family members become aware of the older person's declining health, and aware that it is probably the last move which he or she will make, says Warren, who is with the Texas A&M University Extension Service home economics program.

Families need to maintain close ties at this time in spite of feeling angry, hurt, afraid of rejection and deeply sorrowful. "The entire family may actually be grieving for the passing of an era,' she says.

In this difficult situation, many adult children may have the impulse to retreat, notes Warren.

Yet reseach indicates that the best thing families can do is to stay close during the first few weeks after the move while the older person



GI BILL 40TH ANNIVERSARY

President Franklin Roosevelt signed the World War II GI Bill on June 22, 1944. There was little realization, then, of the impact this legislation would have on life in America. According to Stephen Lemons, Director at the Waco Regional Office, "This single act is believed to have had more impact on the American way of life than any other law passed since the Homestead Act of 1862." Since June 22, 1944, America has had the greatest veterans program in history. No other country approaches America's generosity to its veterans in quality health care, education, job-training opportunities and a chance

for a decent home. More than 18 million per-

sons have received some form of training under the GI Bill. This includes 8 million World War II veterans, 2 and one-half million Korean Conflict veterans, and 8 million Post-Korean and Vietnam Era veterans have been the greatest participants in GI Bill training. More than 70% of those eligible have received training - compared with 50% for World War II and 43% for Korean veterans.

Amended and extended, the GI Bill changed the national concept of adult education. It also started the greatest home construction boom in history. The GI Bill transformed something as ephemeral as an American dream into something as solid as a house on a plot of land with a mortgage. By backing loans of \$224 billion



Public comment asked on proposals

Proposed 1984-85 Early Season Migratory Game Bird Regulations are being prepared by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for publication in the Texas Register for the required 30-day public comment period. Final Commission action is

scheduled for July 25. The early season regulations are for migratory game bird species which have hunting seasons that begin before Sept. 29. These species include doves, gallinules, rails and teal ducks. No changes are proposed for gallinules, rails, and teal ducks. However, changes required by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service as well as those recommended by TPWD, will necessitate some modification in dove regulations. The proposed changes will include:

-The names of the dove hunting zones (Panhandle, Central, and Rio Grande) would be changed to the North, Central and South Zones. These designations seem more acceptable to Texas dove hunters and should avoid the confusion that has resulted from the use of the names Panhandle and Rio Grande to describe parts of Texas not usually associated with these names. -Proposed statewide bag limits during the regular mourning dove hunting season would be: 12 mourning, white-winged, and whitetipped (white-fronted) doves in the aggregate including no more than two white-winged and two white-tipped doves per day; 24 mourning, whitewinged, and white-tipped doves in possession. This modification would permit a






