Shipments to France. Scottish Rite News Bureau: Earlier this year, the United States both directly and indirectly aided Franco's Spain with various supplies. This was done despite Franco's known pro-Axis leanings.

It was naturally assumed that this definite and official attitude of hostility toward the United States would cause the government to cut off all supplies to Spain. Such is not the case. If press reports are reliable, the United States still is sending large quantities of petroleum products to Franco in a final attempt to woo him away from the Axis.

Events move so fast in the present war, but it wasn't so long ago that England, France and a host of other countries tried the same game with Germany and Italy. France fell, England now fights for its life, and the lesser nations were destroyed. Those were the dividends of appeasement.

There is no doubt that Franco will enter the fight against the democratic nations at any time that Hitler really insists upon it. He is in no position to resist, even if he wanted to, and there is ample evidence that he is perfectly happy to play stooge to Hitler. The cards are stacked against appeasement and always have been.

Francisco is a much more dangerous enemy than he appears to be on the surface. It is his particular brand of Fascism that appeals to Latin Americans, many of whom still look to Spain for cultural and political leadership. Anything that strengthens Franco strengthens Fascism in Latin America.

The argument that oil or other supplies will not help Hitler just doesn't hold water. The same argument was used with Vichy, and we now know that oil destined for General Weygand in Africa actually went to the Germans and that food supplies sent to France resulted in the withdrawal of at least a like amount of other foodstuffs from the unoccupied territory to Germany.

The United States cooperated with Great Britain to appease Italy at the start of the war, with the result that Mussolini was in excellent shape to deliver a death blow to defeated France. United States attempts to appease Japan led to the recent Far Eastern crisis.

DO YOU REMEMBER?

(From Files of Cisco Daily News, September, 1928.)

Three of Cisco's earliest citizens, "Uncle" Tom Johnson, M. H. (Doc) McCanlies and George Huestis, were congregated, by chance on D avenue yesterday, and naturally with these old-timers, their conversation took on a reminiscent turn, and scenes of the early days were discussed. Many of the incidents recounted and the hardships those old pioneers endured to lay the foundation of the present Cisco, with its modern improvements and conveniences of living, it was thought, would be of interest to the present generation, so an interview was sought with Mr. Johnson. The venerable pioneer lives a rather retired life, and rarely comes down town. He was among the first to come to Cisco—was here in the days of Red Gap, before Cisco was founded, and has lived in Cisco ever since the townsite was platted, being one of the first to build in the new railroad town, as Cisco was located on lands owned by the old Texas Central railroad. Concerning those early days, Mr. Johnson said: "With the coming to my home recently of Minnie Davis, I got to thinking about some of the old-timers. Minnie is a daughter of John Davis, one of the pioneers who lived here before Cisco was founded. The Davis family left here about 40 years ago and went west. Stanford Cone, John Davis, George Huestis, M. H. (Doc) McCanlies, Albert Stevens, myself and a few other families just about constituted the population of Eastland county then. There was plenty of wild game here, upon which we relied for our meat supply. Buffalo, deer and wild turkeys were plentiful. John Davis owned an old shotgun which he named 'Sweet Betsy.' He could kill a gobbler 300 yards away, and he just about kept us supplied in meat. I remember one time Albert Stevens went over to John Davis' house

and Scranton. Citizens of these communities cooperated splendidly with the result two of the best community fairs ever held in Eastland county were conducted. Particularly instructive was the exhibit in one of the booths showing the value of cowpeas as a fertilizer and soil builder. In separate baskets was shown all the corn grown on two different rows, each of the same length, planted the same day in the same field and given the same cultivation. The corn from where cowpeas were grown last year weighed 38 pounds, while the corn from the row where no cowpeas were planted weighed only 23 pounds, an increase in yield of about 65 per cent in favor of the corn grown on the row fertilized by the peas. The exhibits shown at these two fairs were of such an excellent quality that much of the material is being saved to place in the Eastland county exhibit at the Dallas fair.

Getting his foot entangled in a rope and being dragged by a team of mules over a quarter of a mile at his ranch, north of Cisco, Friday morning, R. F. Weddington missed death as narrowly as in some of the battles in which he was engaged while following Robert E. Lee during the Civil war. Mr. Weddington is now at his home, 610 W. Sixth street, where he is being nursed back to health, suffering from many bruises and lacerations on his body, head and limbs. The accident that came near bringing death to the pioneer Cisco ranchman occurred while talking to his son, Robert Weddington, who was hitching a pair of mules to a wagon. The team was chained together, and the harness had been placed on one of the mules. As the harness was being placed on the other mule, Mr. Weddington stepped into a loop of the rope attached to the team just as the pair became frightened, jerking him to the ground. As he fell, the team made a break,

dragging him for a quarter of a mile. He would undoubtedly have been killed had not the rope broken as he was pulled over a small bluff, about eight feet, throwing him around a tree, which caused the rope to snap. Rushing to the aid of his parent, Robert Weddington found his father in an unconscious condition. He conveyed him to the ranch house, where he was given first aid treatment, and Friday afternoon was brought to his home, where Drs. J. E. Griffin and J. W. Howell were summoned. The doctors dressed his wounds and applied restoratives, as he was still in an unconscious condition.

"We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."

America has two documents which she holds sacred—the Declaration of Independence, struck off at white heat in the swirl of defiance; and the Constitution,

These Articles, despite their high-sounding title, left much to be desired. They held the states together merely in a "league of friendship," which might have been dissolved at any time. There was no president, vice president, or supreme court. Congress could make laws, but had no means of enforcing them. When the outlook seemed darkest, in September, 1786, commissioners from five states met to adjust a trade dispute between Virginia and Maryland, realizing that while the one dispute might be settled, others were sure to arise and there was urgent need of establishing some kind of federal authority if the new nation was to be preserved. A convention of all the states was called. The date was set for May 14 of the following year, and In-

dependence Hall, Philadelphia, the cradle of American Liberty, selected as the place.

Many delegates were delayed by storms, bad roads or lack of funds. Not until May 25 did a quorum of seven states respond to roll call. Washington was made chairman and Major William Jackson secretary. On May 28, with nine states represented, the doors were closed and members sworn to secrecy.

Line by line, and in face of bitter opposition, the great compact of and with the people was forged. On August 6 a detailed report on the first draft of the document was made, the final revision was submitted September 12 and on September 17, a little less than four months from the time of assembling, the work was over. Thirty-nine of the fifty-five delegates present at the end signed.

Washington, first to sign, said: "Should the states reject this excellent Constitution—the next will be drawn in blood." Franklin said he was astonished to find the system "approaching so near perfection as it does."

There was much heated opposition to the Constitution among the states, but on June 25, 1788, Virginia, the tenth state to ratify it made its adoption certain. For more than a century and a half, the Constitution has stood, except as modified by the amendments since added. This great document is the ever-watchful guardian of American liberty, the supreme law of our land, the bedrock of our civilization, the faith and hope of future generations yet to come.
