

WASHINGTON. Sept. 25. -- Senator Kenneth McKellar, Democrat, today introduced a bill to repeal the Neutrality Act, which he termed a "mistake."

McKellar told the senate he had two chief reasons for seeking repeal of the law, as follows:

"It has done us no good and has merely cluttered up a situation that was already bad.

"It is in direct conflict with our age-old policy of freedom of the seas which we have pursued for more than 100 years and for which we fought two wars."
