



Local Hance supporters kick in another \$10,000

DOUBLE DIP — Twins Jan and Jill Nelson serve two flavors of homemade ice cream Tuesday night to Beral Hance, mother of the US Senate candidate, during an old-fashioned ice cream supper and fund-raising rally for Hance in the

County Expo Building to help him finance his primary runoff campaign. Twenty members of the Youth for Kent Hance served 29 freezers of ice cream to more than 200 attending the event. The fund-raiser netted approximately \$10,000.

Congressman Kent Hance's "home folks" enjoyed homemade ice cream, listened to bluegrass and gospel music, and kicked in another \$10,000 toward his campaign for the US Senate Tuesday night. Contributions at the fund-raising ice cream supper brought to almost \$33,000 the amount Castro Countians have donated to the Hance for US Senate Campaign in two fund raisers. That's almost three times the amount that Hance's campaign workers had hoped to raise here. Tuesday night's total was "real good for a second time around," County Co-Chairman Carl King said. "The

people of Dimmitt and Castro County did more than their part Tuesday night in helping Kent's campaign." The money donated at the ice cream supper will help Hance continue his campaign for a June 2 primary runoff showdown against State Sen. Lloyd Doggett for the Democratic Party nomination. Hance, who started the race with only 5% name identification in key portions of South and East Texas, forged ahead to lead the six-man field in the May 5 primary as he and Doggett eliminated Bob Krueger and three other contenders. However, the primary race left Hance's campaign fund half a million dollars in debt going into the runoff stretch. Local ice cream makers donated 33 freezers full of all flavors and 20 teenage members of the Youth for Kent Hance served up the ice cream as the Flatland Bluegrass of Lubbock and Dimmitt and the Singing Farmers of Hart provided bluegrass, gospel and western music — all free gratis. Ysleta Ball, who coordinated the ice cream makers, reported that more than 200 were served and that four freezers went unopened. Although the crowd was smaller than Hance campaign workers had hoped for, the donations weren't. "Kent is elated over the

Democrats

'Let the voters decide'

The county's Democrats Saturday called for the state party to put the names of presidential candidates back on the primary election ballot and to send delegates to the state and national conventions whose presidential preferences are in the same ratio as the popular vote. This was one of 13 resolutions adopted at Saturday's county Democratic convention in the courthouse community room. Fifty-one delegates attended the county convention — "the best attendance we've had since I've been county chairman," Oscar Wylie reported. "It was a good convention, everyone got to have their say, and everything went along well," Wylie added. Delegates elected to the state convention were Ellis Mayberry, Era Heckerson, Don Vaughn, Doris Wylie

and Mark West. Alternates chosen were Wylie, Carl King, Doug Higgins, Joe Cowen and Ronnie Parker. Wylie reported that one delegate and two alternates prefer Walter Mondale for President, two delegates prefer Gary Hart and two delegates and three alternates will go to the state convention uncommitted. Of those signing in for the county convention Saturday, 23 declared they favored Hart, seven favored Mondale, four favored Rev. Jesse Jackson and 17 were uncommitted. In addition to calling for a change in the method of choosing among the party's candidates for President, the county's Democrats adopted resolutions calling for: — County delegates to the state convention to support all nominees of the Democratic Party.

- Establishment of a long-range supply management plan with mandatory acreage reduction in the federal farm program.
- Purchase of textbooks, public and school library books and media that will preserve and not undermine the traditional home and family or Judeo-Christian moral values and ethics.
- State and federal legislation "to preserve the rights of the elderly and the handicapped to live." (The convention voted to delete the inclusion of "the unborn" from the resolution, which would have been a call to outlaw abortion.)
- Restriction of high-level nuclear waste dumps to sites on federally owned land "that is non-productive and isolated from the food chain."
- Prohibiting county,

DHS to graduate 77 Friday

Seventy-seven graduates, including students from New Zealand, West Germany and Finland, will receive diplomas at Dimmitt High School's commencement exercises Friday night.

The ceremonies will begin in DHS auditorium at 8 p.m. with the processional, "Pomp and Circumstance," performed by pianist Zelda Ellison, organist Deanne Clark and the Bell Choir of the First United Methodist Church, directed by Jane O'Kelly.

Commencement speaker will be Gene Griffin, head football coach the past two years here, who now is the head coach and athletic director at Jacksboro High School. He will be introduced by one of his former players, Dwight McDonald.

Class speakers will be Chad Thompson, valedictorian, and Sandi Schinkus, salutatorian. Singers will be Karen Markley and Cindy Marsh, who will perform the class song, "Friends."

Other class members on the program are Brandon Cox, who will give the invocation, and Robby Hotel, who will give the benediction.

Supt. Robert Ryan will present the class for graduation, and School Board President Charles Wales will award diplomas.

While Thompson and Miss Schinkus head the Class of '84 scholastically, 14 other members of the class will graduate cum laude, with four-year averages of 90 or better. Republicans

The right to live and die

The county's Republicans adopted 14 resolutions Saturday ranging from a balanced federal budget to restriction of nuclear-waste dump sites to "the right to live and die naturally."

They also elected three delegates, three alternates and a team of pages to the State Republican Convention, and picked county GOP officers for the coming year. A good turnout of 20 party

members attended the county convention in the Dimmitt City Hall meeting room. Elected as delegates to the State Republican Convention in Fort Worth June 15 and 16 were Deanne Clark, Willie Faye Huseman and Linda Merritt. Alternates will be Rita Book, Aurelia Schoenberger and Ann Ethington.

Chosen as pages for the state convention were Becky Schroeder, Becky Benton, Debra Sava and Julie Reeve, with Carol Schroeder to serve as their chaperone.

Delegates to the county convention re-elected Deanne Clark as county party chairman for the coming year and picked Rev. Ed Freeman as vice-chairman and Marguerite McLain as secretary-treasurer.

The convention adopted resolutions to be forwarded

- to the state convention, calling on the appropriate levels of government or party to: — Preserve the rights to work, bear arms and assemble peacefully.
- Limit the budget of former Presidents.
- Eliminate the practice of attaching "riders" to appropriations bills and resolutions that are unrelated to the bill at hand.
- Elect all officials below the state level on a nonpartisan basis.
- Place nuclear waste storage sites only on non-productive, federally owned land where they will not endanger the production of food and fiber or the water supply.
- Restore the federal budget to deficit-free solvency within 18 years "before the children born in 1984 are eligible to vote," and reduce federal expenditures and personnel by at least 2% per year.
- Restore Daylight Saving Time year-round in Texas.
- Limit farm production and continue support prices.

Absentee voting is now underway

If you plan to vote absentee for the June 2 primary runoff, you have only today, (Thursday), Friday and Tuesday to cast your ballot.

The Memorial Day holiday Monday is cutting into the absentee balloting period. The County Clerk's Office, where absentee ballots are to be cast, is scheduled to be closed Monday — along with all other government offices.

If you did not vote in the May 5 primary, you can still vote in either party's runoff election.

Highlighting the Democratic primary runoff is the race between Kent Hance and Lloyd Doggett for the US Senate nomination, and the race between Don Richards and Thomas M. Richards for Representative in Congress, 19th District.

On the Republican ballot, the only runoff is between Larry Combest and Ron Fleming for Representative in Congress, 19th District.

All government offices in the county, as well as financial institutions, will be closed Monday in observance of the Memorial Day holiday.

Both drug stores in Dimmitt will be closed, along with many other businesses. The Castro County News (tomorrow) in honor of the holiday, but will be open Monday, with all deadlines remaining the same as usual.

Coffee will be available at the school cafeteria during a fellowship time between the

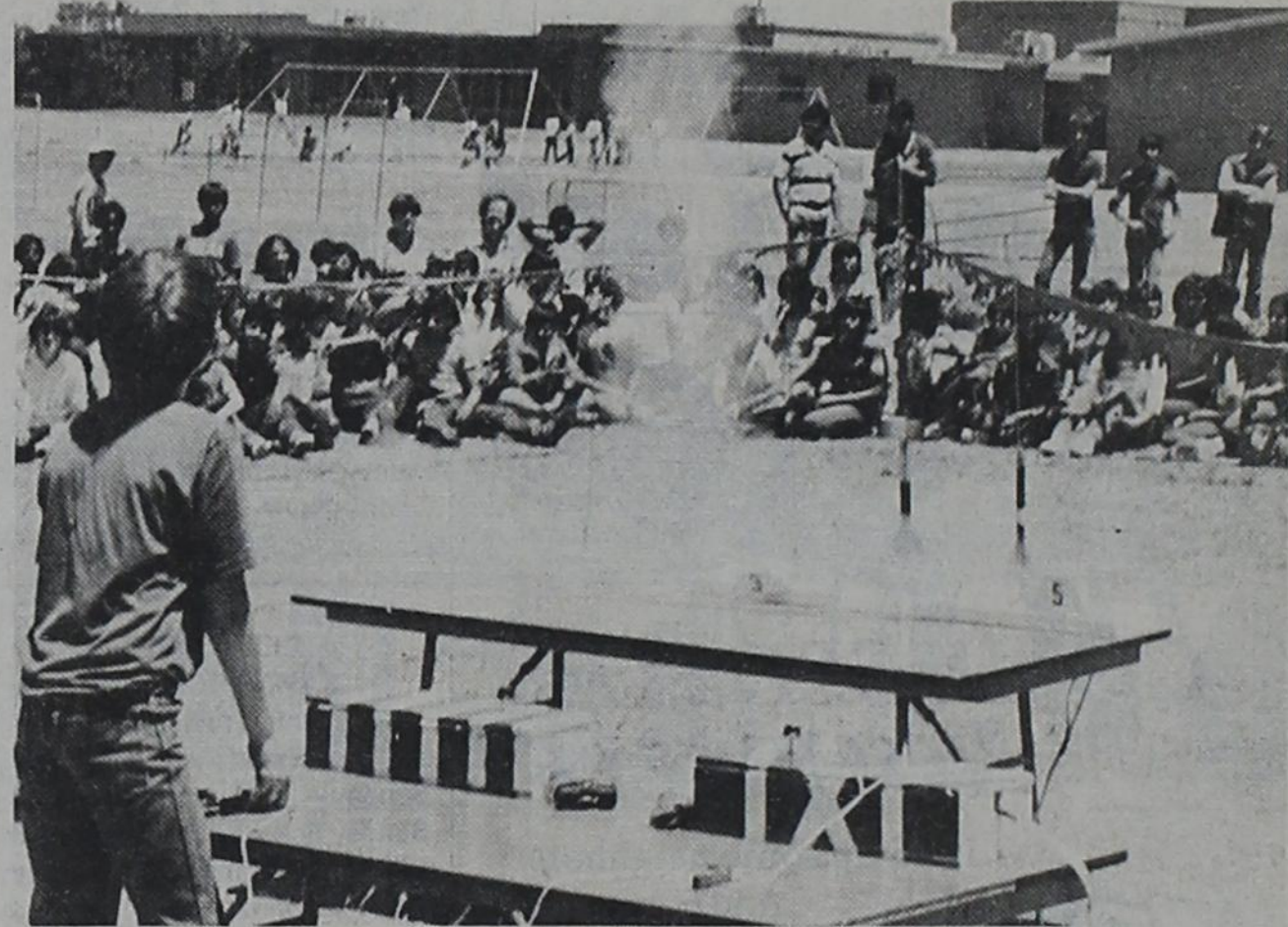
memorial service and the serving of the noon meal.

City paving

Assessment is set

The Dimmitt Board of Aldermen voted Monday night to pass an ordinance setting into motion an assessment paving project for the paving of 32 blocks of city streets.

The ordinance sets the assessment cost to property owners at \$23.50 per front foot at a width of 33 feet. The city proposes to pay 15% of the total \$455,399.22 cost of the project, which would amount to \$70,241.35 if all 32 blocks are paved.

A public hearing on the project is set for the June 25 meeting of the aldermen at 6:30 p.m., in accordance with law. All affected property owners will be notified that they may make their feelings on the project known at the meeting.

The ordinance allows for property owners to pay their

portion of the cost in four equal payments at 8% interest. Aldermen passed the ordinance subject to the approval of the city attorney, Jack Edwards.

In other action, the aldermen accepted bids on two vehicles for the city. A pickup for the city works department was selected from Stevens Chevrolet Olds of Hereford at the bid price of \$8,578.60 for a 1984 Chevrolet. A car for the police department was awarded to McGavock Pontiac GMC of Plainview at a price of \$9,797.07 for a 1984 Bonneville with immediate delivery.

Other car bids received were from Stan Byrnes Motor Co. for \$10,138 for a Crown Victoria and for \$10,036 for a Ford LTD. Other pickup bids received

were from McGavock for \$9,287.90 for a GMC pickup; Stan Byrnes Motor Co. for \$8,617 for a Dodge and \$8,678 for a Ford F 150; Kent Birdwell for \$9,750 for a 1983 Chevrolet with 9,000 miles on it; and Maggard Nall Motor Co. of Plainview for \$8,678.12 for a Dodge.

Joe Cowen, along with Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce manager Delores Heller and Chamber Director Calvin Marsh, spoke to the aldermen about the industrial fund proposal to which the city had donated \$5,000 of the \$10,000 requested from the city. Cowen asked that the aldermen reconsider giving the additional \$5,000 apportioned to the city, calling it "an investment in quality."

The aldermen took no action on the matter.

"There will be no exceptions to this new ruling," Stevens said. "Only one allotment will be given per family."

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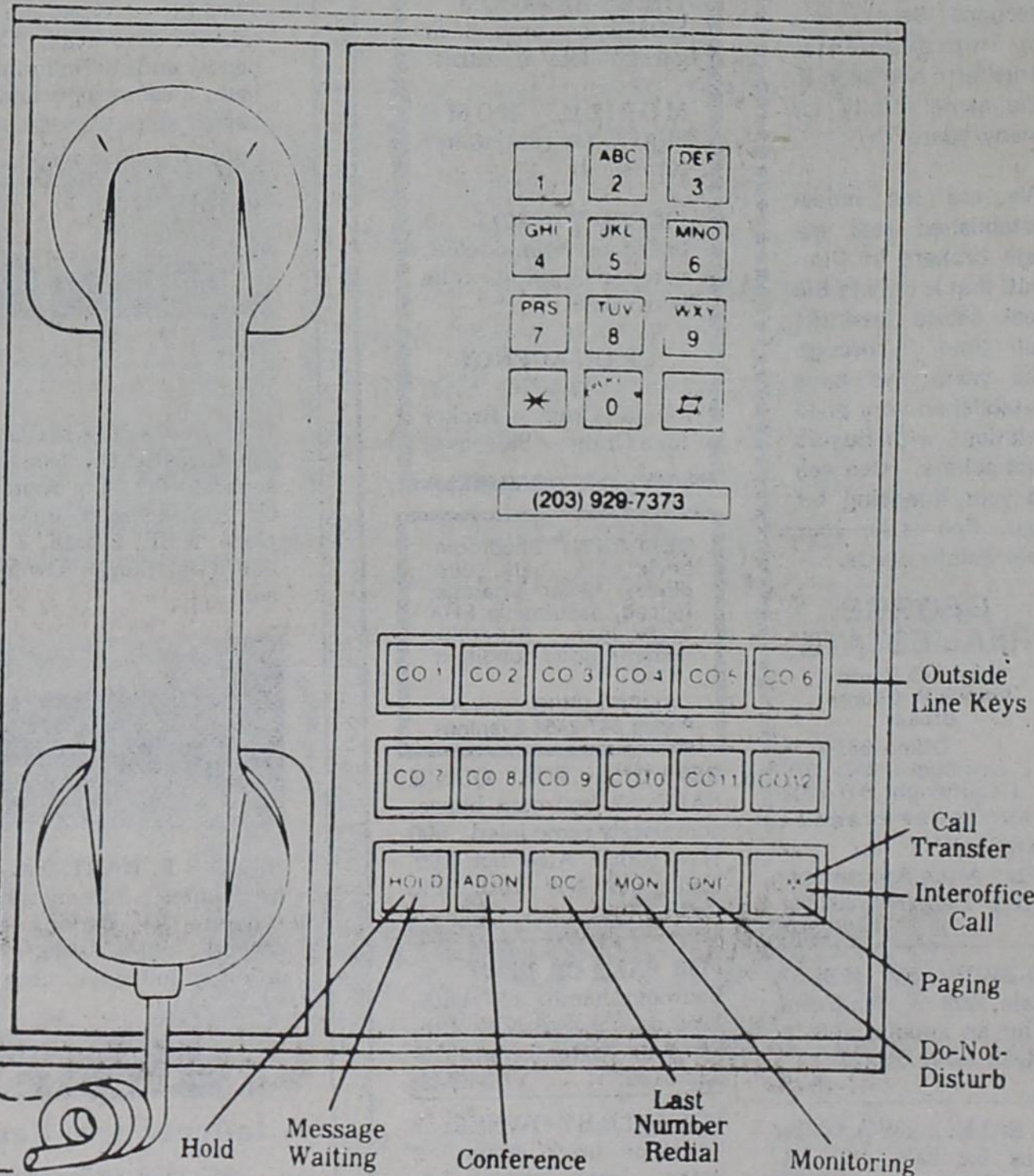

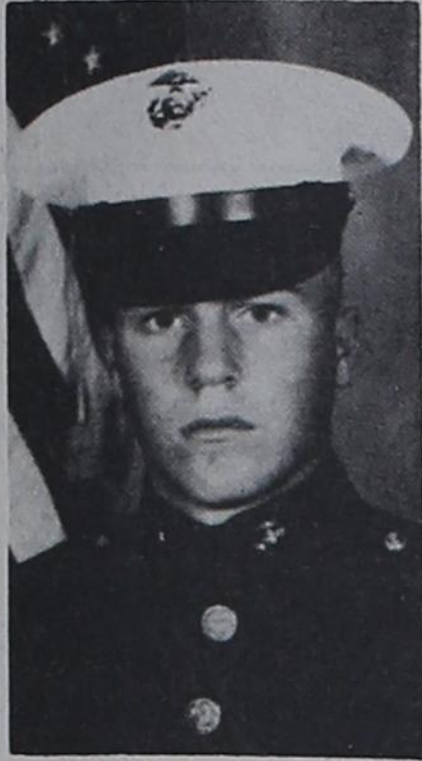

Memorial Day is a time for remembering someone held dear, and the American Cancer Society announced that it can also become a time for turning loss into victories.

According to Dale Wells, president for the Castro County Unit of the ACS, Memorial Day is an appropriate time to make memorial contributions in memory of a loved one lost to cancer. "We call them 'Living Memorials,'" said Wells. "A gift today may spare others tomorrow."

Contributions to the American Cancer Society are used to sponsor the organization's attack on cancer through balanced programs of research, education, patient services and rehabilitation.

The ACS is the largest source of non-government cancer research funds in the country. The current ACS research investment in Texas alone is more than \$4.2 million in grants at hospitals, universities and medical institutions throughout the state.

"The ACS is also very much a community-based organization, however," added Wells. "Our programs and materials are managed by local volunteers, and I think that's important for the people of Castro County to realize when they contribute to this important cause."

According to the latest figures released by the Society this spring, cancer survival rates are rising steadily. The 1984 edition of its annual "Cancer Facts and Figures" indicates 48% of all cancer patients will survive 5 years or more after diagnosis. This compares with 41% just 5 years ago in 1979.

"We are winning the fight," said Wells. "Progress is being made but we've still got to do more. I think our memorial program, which is chaired locally by Rhonda Powers, remains a convenient and dignified way of turning losses into victories."

Anyone wishing to contribute to the ACS through its memorial program may do so by sending their contributions to Rhonda Powers at First State Bank.

Contributors should include the name of the deceased in whose name the memorial is being made, along with the name and address of the individual who should receive acknowledgement of the contribution.

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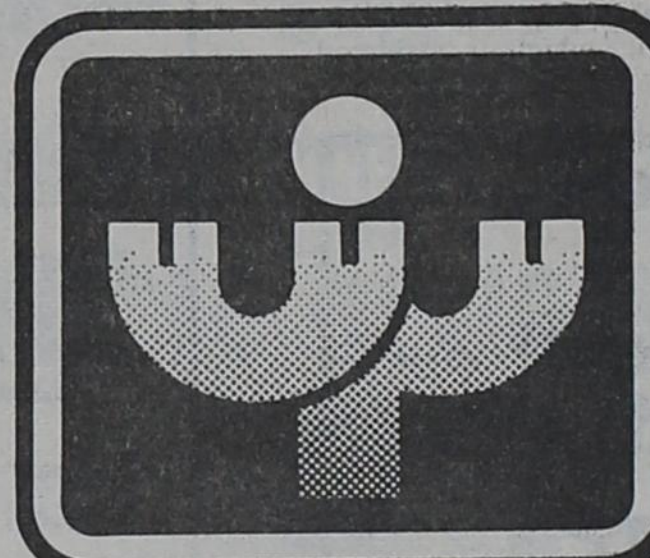
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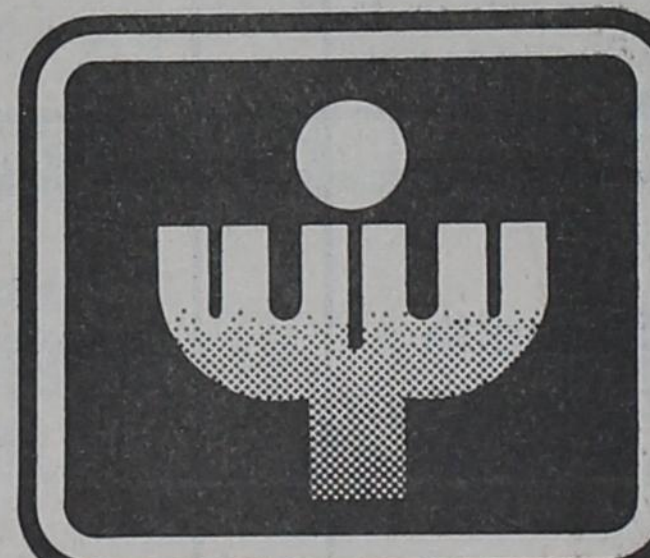

Soil Stewardship Week is May 27-June 3

The annual nationwide observance of Soil Stewardship Week will be May 27-June 3 this year, with the theme "Conservation: A Common Commitment."

"Commitment is what is needed from everyone to reduce the loss of our valuable soil and water resources," says Dr. B.L. Harris, a soils specialist.

Harris emphasizes that there is no time like the present to join the common commitment to soil and water conservation. "Our long-range food supply may depend on it. Our farmland is under a lot of pressure — from erosion, urbanization and pollution. Everyone can help conserve our natural resources."

"Let's keep America, the beautiful, the greatest agricultural country on this earth," says Harris. "Join in local conservation efforts to protect our soil and water resources."

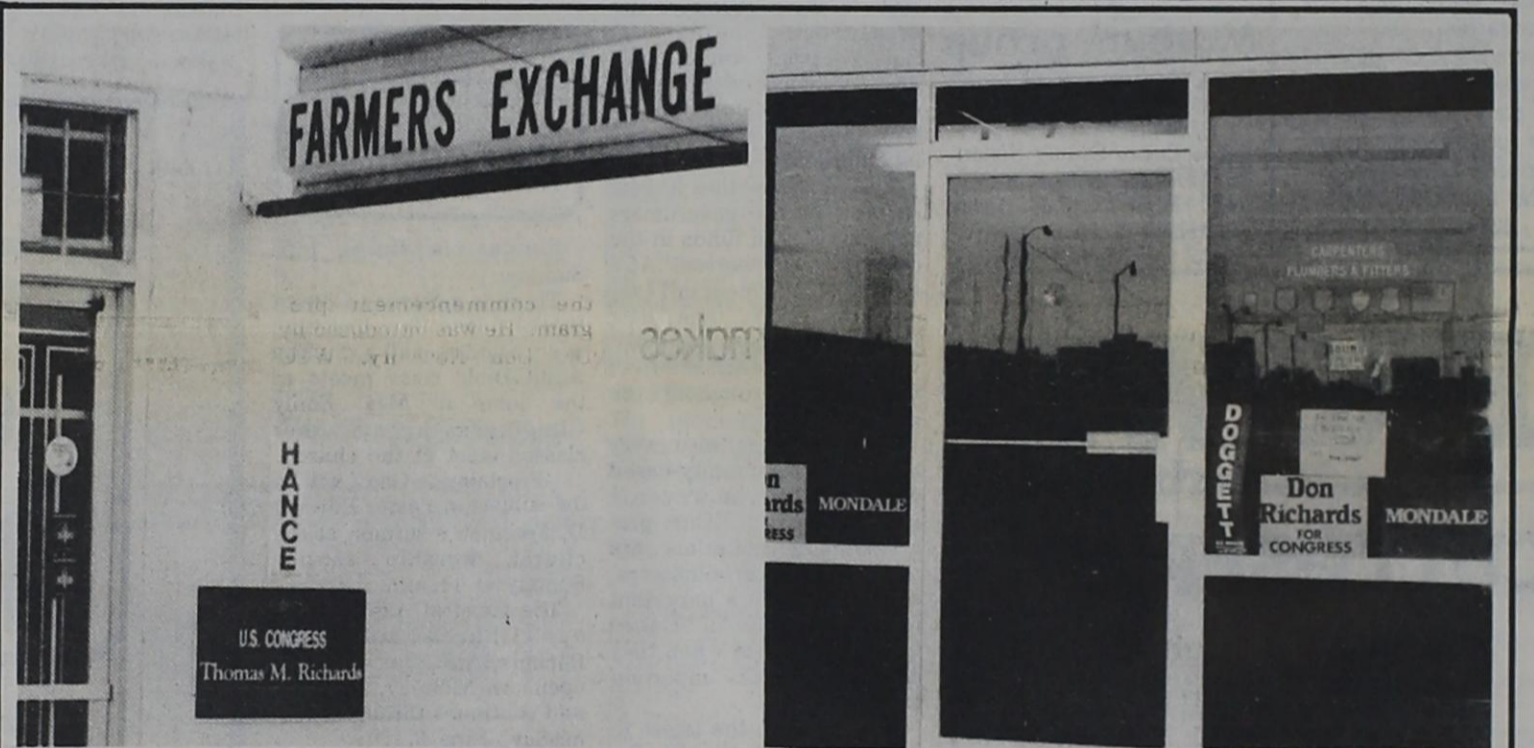

Three school retirees are honored

Receptions Sunday afternoon honored three women who are retiring from Dimmitt's schools after long careers here.

The Classroom Teachers Association held a reception at the First United Methodist Church for Curriculum Director Evie Froehner, who is retiring after 28 years in public education, and Home Economics Teacher Estella Hottel, who is hanging up her school apron after 25½ years.

And at the home of Mary Jo Brown, the faculty of Richardson Elementary School hosted a reception for Educational Secretary Elberta Dyer, who has been behind the school's front desk 18 years. Her retirement gift was a handmade quilt, toward which the entire Richardson Elementary faculty contributed material.

Mrs. Froehner started as a home economics teacher at East Mountain (Upshur County), in a little school

where a teacher was automatically dismissed when she got married. She also served as a home demonstration agent two years.

Twenty-four of her 28 school years have been with Dimmitt schools, starting as a fourth grade teacher in 1960. She handled the special reading program several years, and later moved into administration to work with Curriculum Director Weldon Skinner. She took over the CD duties when Skinner retired, and has been the curriculum director the past nine years.

In the meantime, she raised two sons, owned and operated a variety store with her husband, Nolan, earned her master of education degree from WTSU in the early 1960s, and helped in the Dimmitt schools' growth and expansion.

She is gratified with what she has accomplished.

"Any school teacher feels that any time a kiddo makes

progress, it's rewarding — especially those who are considered marginal," she said. "I've always enjoyed working with the slow learners especially."

"Also, I've enjoyed working with the parent advisory committees for the federal programs, meeting with and making friends with the parents of all races," she said.

About her retirement plans, she said, "I'm just gonna do what I want to do when I want to do it."

Mrs. Hottel described her career as a "very fulfilling experience," and quipped that in a quarter-century of teaching cooking and home management skills, "I've never had anything on fire... although the washing mashine runs over sometimes."

She and her husband, Charles, came here in 1958 when he was appointed county agent, and she taught sixth grade a year until a home economics position opened up in the high school.

R. S. Vestal was the superintendent then.

"I started in the old high school and moved over to the new one," she recalled. "In the old high school, we used to take the cup towels home to wash them. Joanne Snider and I helped some with the design of the home economics department and got to go to Lubbock and pick out the furniture."

Her most moving experience as a teacher happened on a November day in 1963, while her daughter, Julie, was sick at home.

"I went home to check on Julie, and when I came back, the school was real quiet," she said. "When I walked into my classroom, my students were praying. I didn't know what to think. Then it came over the loudspeaker that President Kennedy had been shot. It had just come over earlier that shots had been fired during the motorcade, and of course, later it came over that he was

dead."

She and her husband will move to Oklahoma in mid-June to begin their "second career" — farming their parents' land.

"We've already been farming it by phone for five years," she said.

Mrs. Dyer said her career as school secretary "has really been a rewarding experience," and added, "I really have enjoyed working in the school system. I'll have a lot of memories."

One of those memories is of the time she and Principal Helen Richardson rang the bells for a fire drill.

"She was punching the button, and I was in the hall, and no one came out, so she thought the bell hadn't rung. She punched the button again, and still no one came out. We went down the hall to see what was wrong, and when we looked into a classroom we found the kids crouching under their desks. We had been ringing the

tornado warning instead of the fire warning. At least we knew the kids knew the alarm system."

Although she's retiring from one job, Mrs. Dyer will continue as bookkeeper for her husband Harley's business, Dyer Well Service.

But she'll miss the school atmosphere. "There's just something about a school atmosphere — you get so involved with it," she said. "I enjoy the little children; they're so honest and open. There's no pretense about them."

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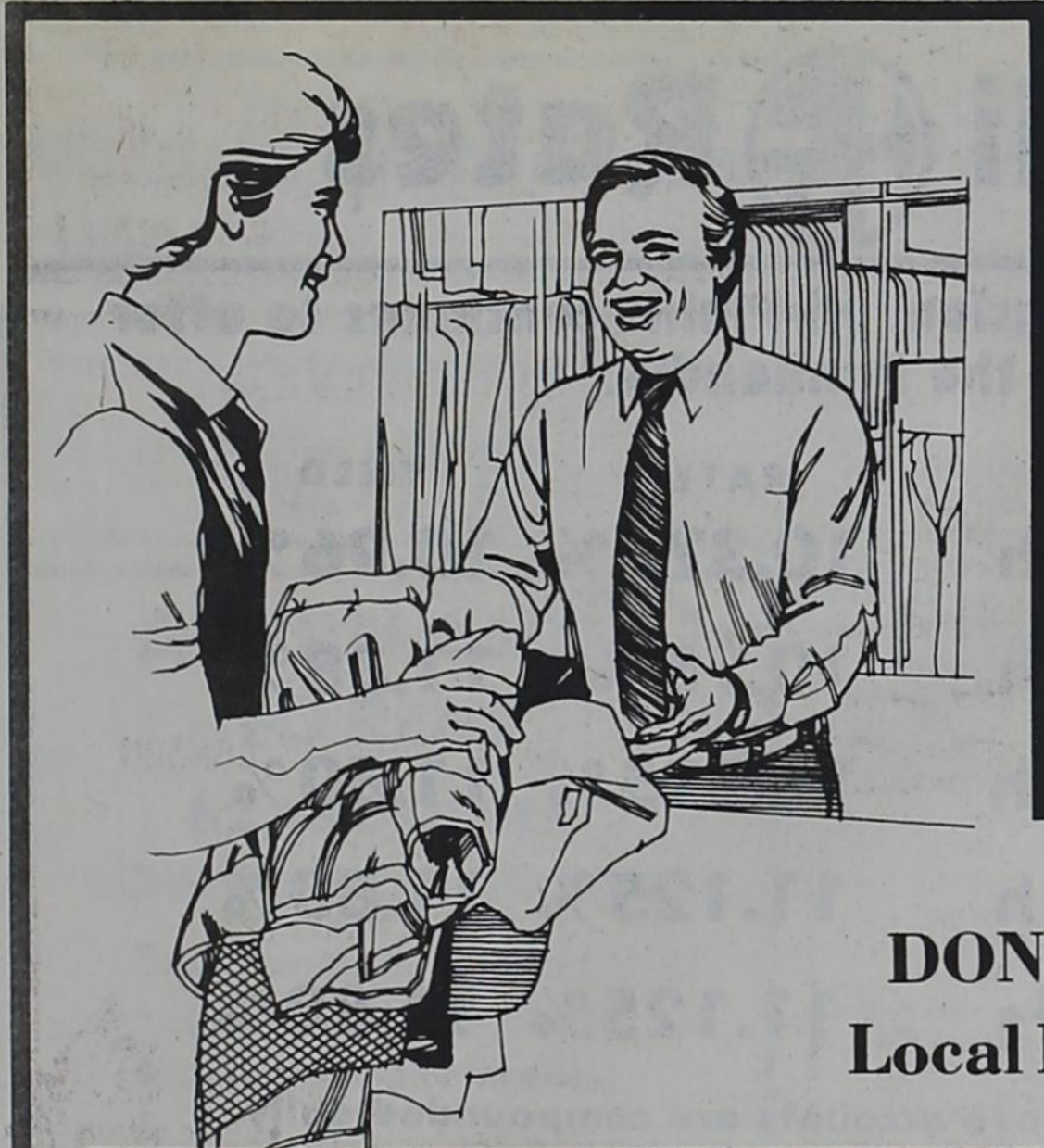

The class includes at least 25 scholarship winners, two all-state basketball players, state champions in industrial arts, regional science award winners, a Star Lone Star Farmer Award winner and several others who have earned the Lone Star Farmer degree, musicians who have received all-region honors in band and choral music, and others who have earned such honors as the US Band Award, JETS and NASA science awards, leadership awards in other academic areas, and listings in "Who's Who Among American High School Students," Academic All-Americans and the United States Leadership Academy.

Forty-seven percent of this year's graduating seniors (36 students) plan to go on to four-year colleges and universities, while 16% (12 students) will enter two-year colleges, according to DHS Counselor John Thomas. — Hired secretaries and aides for the 1984-85 school year, including Elsie Black, high school secretary; Shirley McLain, elementary secretary; Claudine Aven, superintendent's secretary;

Janice Clark, business office secretary; Cindy Davis, P.E. aide and tennis coach aide; and Lula Mae Hanes, library aide. Employment of other aides will be at a later date when federal funding amounts are confirmed.

— Agreed to renew services with the Region XVI Educational Service Center in Amarillo, including media services, Chapter II Block Grant services, and technical assistance for compensatory programs.

— Approved the 1984-85 school calendar.

— Heard a program from Cindy Davis on her elementary physical education and tennis coaching programs.

— Accepted one transfer student for the 1984-85 school year.

— Gave approval for the 1984 summer recreation program.

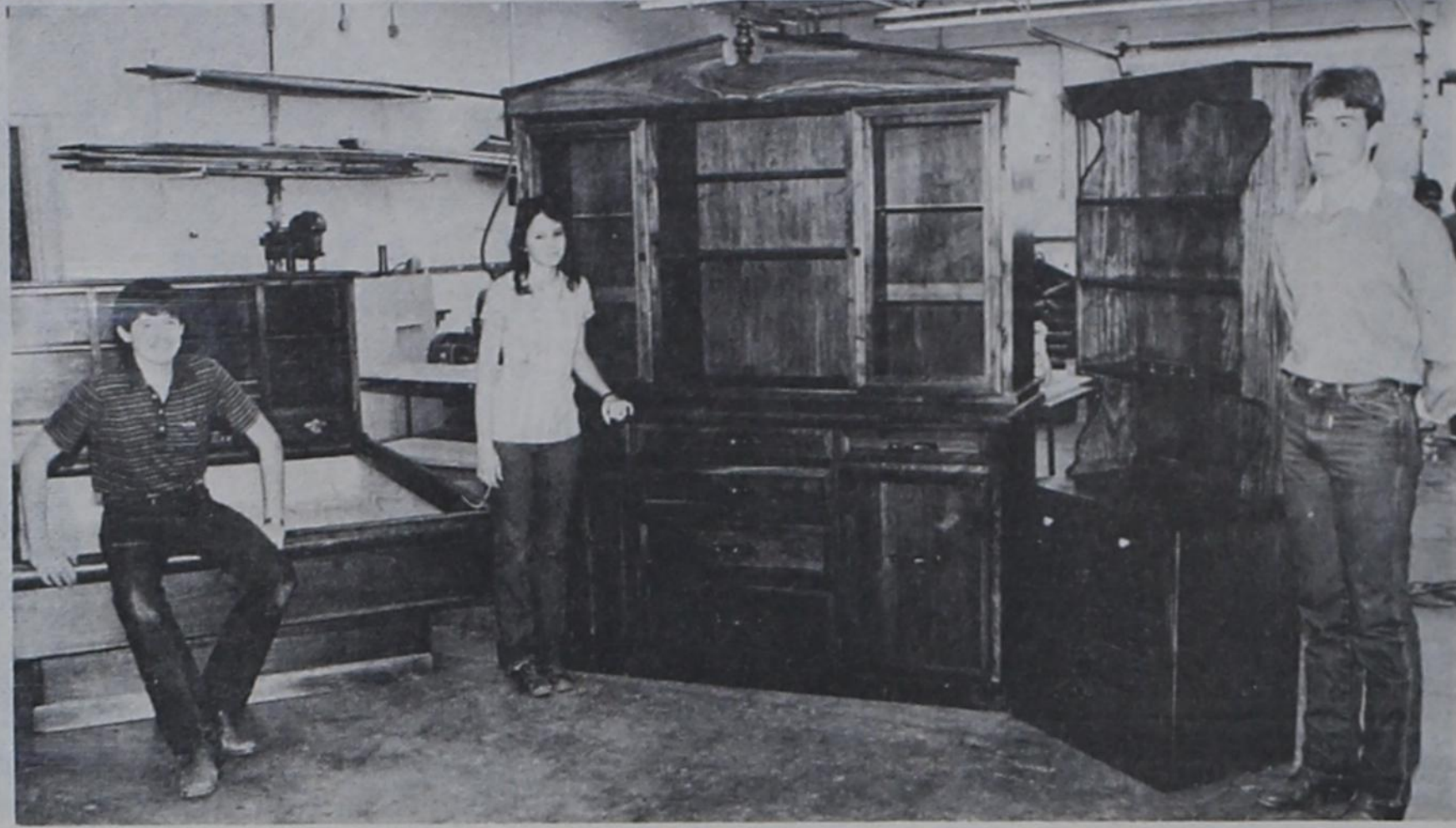

"Now if we can just equal our financial support by getting out to vote on June 2, we'll have a winner," King said.

"The key to the outcome of this election is pretty simple," Bennett told the crowd. "If Hance's voters get out and vote, we'll win. If we don't, we won't... They're looking for a low voter turnout June 2; I think they're projecting half a million (vs. the 1.4 million who voted in the May 5 primary). We've got to get a big vote in West Texas."

Neither Hance nor his wife Carol were able to attend Tuesday night's ice cream supper, but he was represented by his mother, Beral, and his uncles, aunts and cousins here.

Called on to speak, Mrs. Hance told the crowd "Kent is tired, but he's still going strong. He told me, 'Just tell everyone how much we love them. I know times are hard, but I need just a little more help if they can give it.' And Carol said, 'Be sure and say over and over — tell everybody and everybody's relatives to vote.'"

Fatigue, alcohol deadly to boaters

Persons who condemn drunk drivers on the roadway often figure drinking while operating a boat is permissible.

But US Coast Guard researchers have found that alcohol consumption, especially when combined with fatigue from long hours on the water, can have just as disastrous effects as drunk driving.

Officials said most boating accidents are operator-related and vision-related. "Drinking and fatigue cause the field of vision to become narrower," said John C. Bernhartsen in a Coast Guard publication. "In other words, several hours of boat operation can develop something similar to tunnel-vision or highway hypnosis."

In a Coast Guard study of boat operators who consumed controlled amounts of alcohol, researchers noted that with a blood-alcohol content of .10 the individuals often missed signals from either side of the boat.

"When fatigue and alcohol were combined, it became apparent that alcohol interacted with and increas-

ed the effects of fatigue," Bernhartsen said. "Operators who were fatigued and whose blood-alcohol content was .10 or more missed 10 or more times as many signals as operators that were merely fatigued."

Another finding of the study was that among the operators asked to rate their performance after the tests, those who had been legally drunk tended to over-rate their ability, while sober operators were more conservative.

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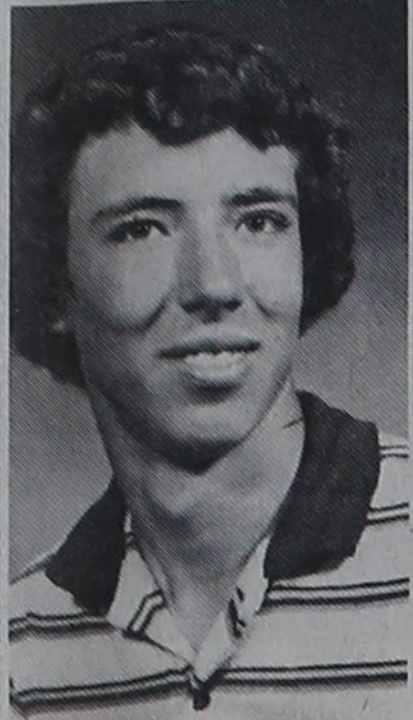

Aquifer Symposium II set

Through the combined efforts of the research community and the irrigation farmer, the life of the Ogallala aquifer may be extended far beyond current estimates. Significant advancements in scientific knowledge dealing with ground water and associated technology have been made during the past decade which have and will continue to decrease the yearly declines in the Ogallala aquifer, and who knows, future advances may some day even stabilize the aquifer.

Such scientific and technological advances will be the subject of the Ogallala Aquifer Symposium II to be held at the Lubbock memorial Civic Center on June 4-7, in Lubbock.

Symposium Chairman

Robert M. Sweazy, director of the Water Resources Center at Texas Tech University, said the symposium will focus on the Ogallala aquifer but will have applications for underground water supplies from California to New York.

"What pertains to the Ogallala may pertain to many other aquifers in the nation," Sweazy said. "A specific problem of the Ogallala may not be inherent in another area, but some information and technology stemming from Ogallala studies can likely be used in other areas."

Speakers representing the US Dept. of the Interior; the US Dept. of Agriculture; the Texas Dept. of Water Resources; the New Mexico Bureau of Mines and Mineral Resources; universities in

Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Colorado and Nebraska; and private engineering and consulting firms will participate in the program. Sessions include the USGS High Plains Study, Economics and Irrigation, Geology, Hydrogeology, Recharge of the Ogallala, Aquifer Interaction, Legal Aspects, and Mining of Water From the Unsaturated Zone (Secondary Recovery). A concurrent agricultural water conservation field tour and a geology field tour will wind up the conference.

National Service Life Insurance term policyholders over age 70 will have their renewal premium rates capped at the age 70 rate under a policy change announced by Administrator of Veterans Affairs Harry N. Walters.

Nearly 50,000 veterans are expected to benefit from the initial rollback action on Sept. 1, 1984. Another 25,000 veterans will be affected in 1985, Walters said.

"The action is being taken to provide financial relief for those senior policyholders who have continued their term insurance coverage in lieu of conversion to permanent insurance plans," Walters added. "Although premium rates are costly, we continue to experience a high renewal rate for older term policyholders."

At renewal age 80 in 1983, more than 78% of VA's term policyholders continued their coverage at a monthly rate of \$150.40 for \$10,000 coverage.

Under the new procedures, all term policyholders who have renewed their policies at age 71 or above will have their premiums rolled back to the renewal age 70 monthly premium rate of \$6.18 per \$1,000 coverage, effective Sept. 1. Policyholders below age 70 will

have premiums capped at their first renewal beyond age 70.

For example, a policyholder who renewed his or her policy at age 68 would continue to pay \$5.18 monthly for \$1,000 coverage for the five-year renewal period. At age 73 the policy would be renewed at the renewal age 70 rate.

The change requires no action taken by the policyholder, Walters stressed. "Renewal notices will continue to be mailed in advance of the effective dates and will reflect the lower rates for affected veterans."

Unlike many term plans issued by commercial insurance companies, VA's approximately one million term policies can be renewed indefinitely. More than 8% of the NSLI term policyholders are age 70 or older, despite the significant rate increases on each renewal to cover the higher mortality experience.

Funding for the premium capping will come from surplus funds contributed by term policyholders, Walters said. This will include \$63 million that will be accumulated by retaining the 1984 and 1985 term dividends at the 1983 rate. Another \$23 million will be transferred from a reserve for annuity payments since only 1% of insurance proceeds are paid as annuities.

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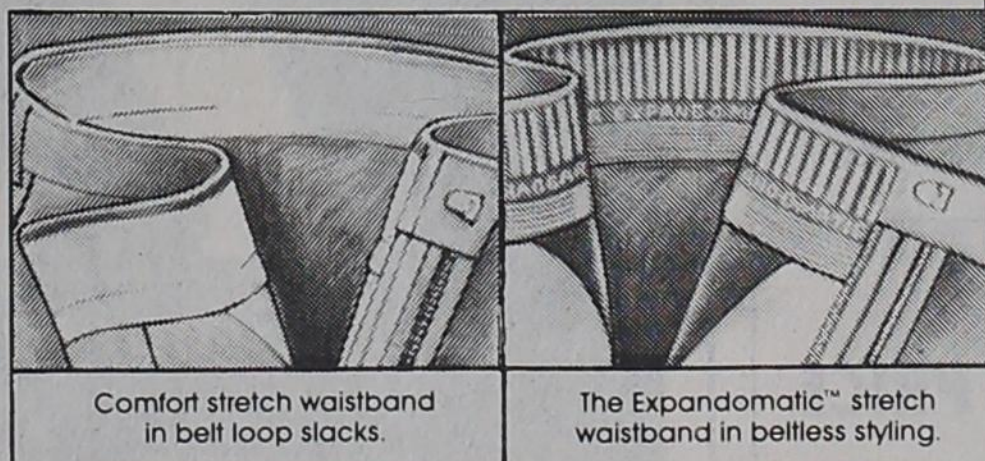

What's next for grads?

Dimmitt High School Counselor John Thomas reported this week that 79% of the Class of 1984 will attend college or trade/vocational school after graduation.

Of this year's 77 seniors, 36 plan to enter four-year colleges and universities, 12 will go to two-year colleges and 12 will go to trade or vocational schools, Thomas reported. Three will enter military service and 14 will

go directly into the job market or pursue other interests after graduation.

Texas Tech will get the largest group of DHS grads, 16. Nine plan to attend West Texas State, three will enroll in Texas A&M and two will go to Abilene Christian University. Four-year colleges and universities receiving one DHS grad each this fall will be Angelo State, Oklahoma State, Oral Roberts, Wayland Baptist,

Svenska Handelshogskolan in Finland and Massey University in New Zealand.

Grads attending two-year colleges are five to South Plains College, four to Amarillo College, two to Clarendon College and one to Dallas Community College.

Among the trade and vocational schools, TSTI in Amarillo will get five DHS grads, United Technical Institute in Houston four, barber-beauty schools three and the Travel

Academy one.

Of those DHS grads entering military service, one will go into the Army, one into the Marine Corps and one into the Navy, Thomas said.

In all, 47% of this year's DHS grads will attend four-year colleges and universities, 16% will go to two-year colleges, 16% will go to trade or vocational schools, 17% will go into "work or enter," and 4% will enter the military.

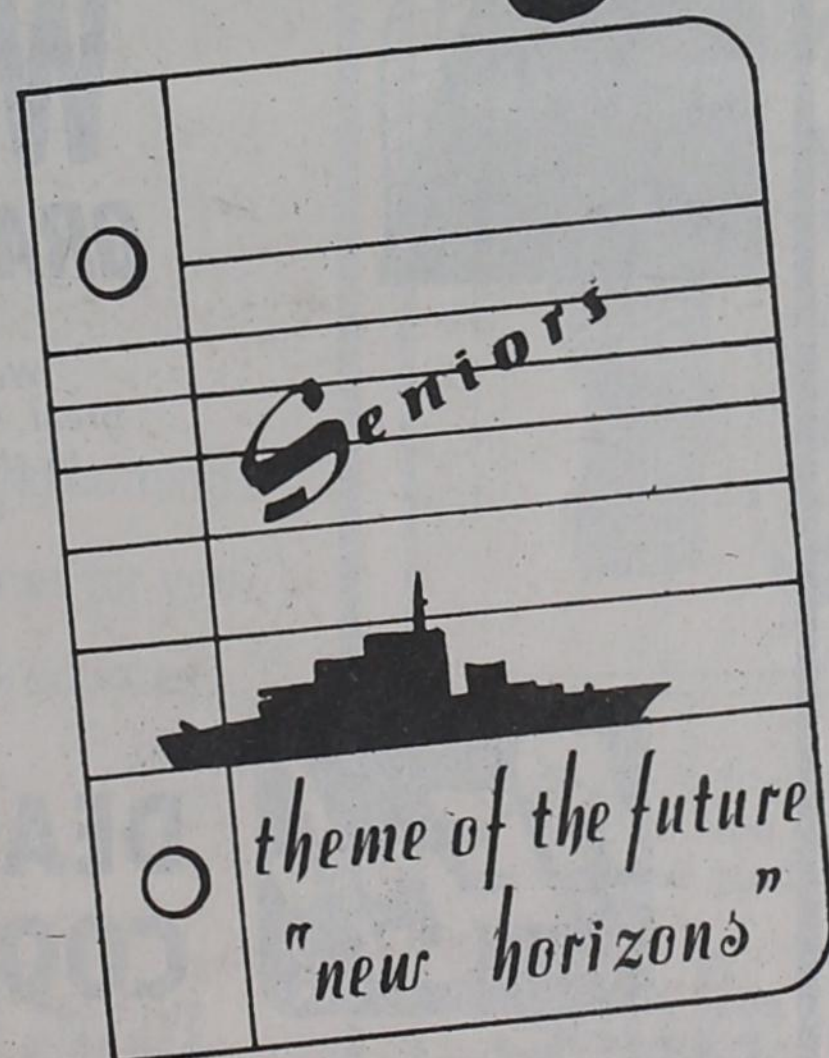

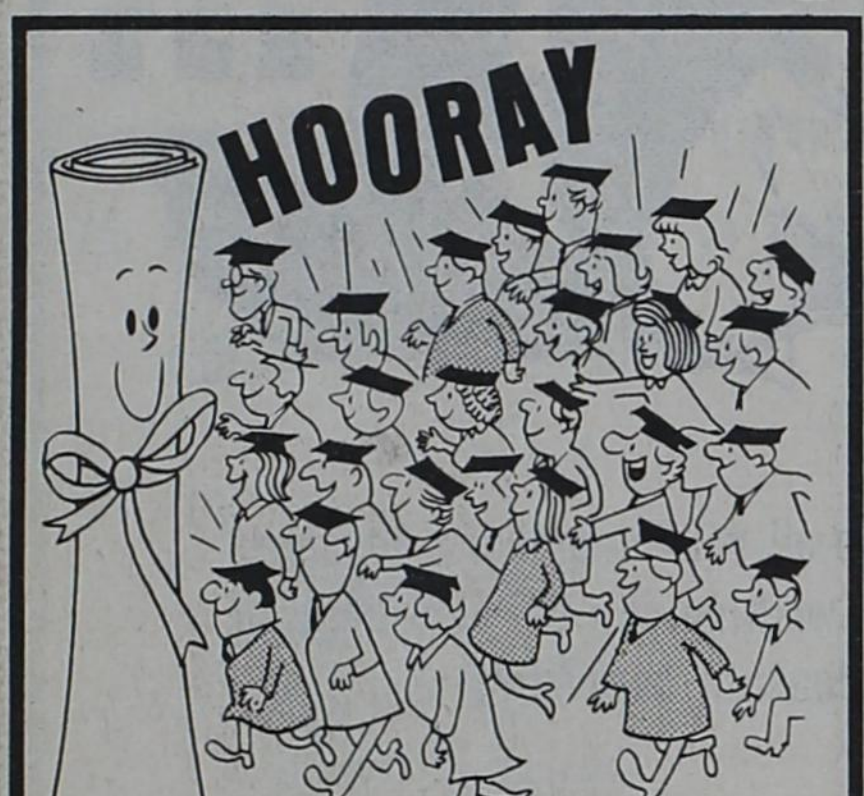
