## WAR

SAN FRANCISCO — Columbia broadcasting station picked up a Singapore radio broadcast today which said American flying fortresses had bombed and sank a 10,000-ton Jap freighter off the Dutch East Indies.

MELBOURNE—Communications with the British base at Rabaul on New Britain island, ceased tonight following reports that enemy airplanes and warships were operating near strategic islands north-east of Australia. Japanese bombers again blasted at Rabaul in waves of 40 planes, the dispatches from New Britain said, and a fleet of 11 vessels, including war ships, were seen off Watom island, near Rabaul.

RANGOON — British land and air forces inflicted heavy casualties on Japanese and Thailand troops attempting to drive westward from frontier to Moulmein, stopping the enemy wherever they met him, an imperial headquarters communique said today.

## TOM MORRISON PEARL HARBOR WITNESS, IS OK

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Morrison, 505 W. Ninth street, received a letter from their son, Tom Morrison, U. S. marine, Wednesday. The Ciscoan was present when the Japs swooped down on Pearl Harbor on December 7 and this was the first news from him.

Morrison said he was all right and had completed his two years on the sea and now awaits assignment for two years on land. The letter was brief, but among other things said: "Who knows but what I may get back to the states eventually?" In closing he said: "Mother, remember that your son is OK and hopes he will remain so."

Tom Morrison was born in Cisco and is a graduate of Cisco high school. He graduated with the class of '39 and soon after enlisted with the marines.

## RED CROSS CARRIES ON IN FINE WORK

"Standing orders have been placed with national Red Cross headquarters for supplies of yarn and materials to make garments and hospital supplies for the army and navy," said Mrs. W. W. Wallace, director of the work in the Cisco area, this morning.

"The Cisco unit has been disappointed in not receiving the quantities of material asked for," Mrs. Wallace stated, "but by reason of the magnitude of the work and the far-reaching extent of the organization, the supplies have been limited. We still hope for the remainder of the yarn for sweaters, helmets and socks. The local unit pays for the yarns.

"Some individuals have purchased yarn from local mail order houses and are making garments for sons and friends in the service. Anyone wishing to donate the price of a garment will be interested to know that the actual cost of sweater yarn is \$2.05; cost of sleeveless sweater, \$1.35; helmet, 60 cents; socks, 30 cents. Donations will be gratefully received.

"The sewing room will be kept open until all quilts are finished. The quilts will be kept here, unless otherwise ordered, for local emergencies. The knitting classes are making afghan squares of wool yarn provided by the individual. The blocks are nine inches square.

"Local organizations of all kinds are requested to give luncheons and paid affairs to raise money with which to purchase wool yarns. Outlying communities and home demonstration clubs are planning to continue making quilts and are conducting knitting classes in order to keep up the necessary interest and, in this way, do our duty at home," Mrs. Wallace concluded.

## FORT WORTH ARRESTS 320 IN ONE RAID

FT. WORTH, Jan. 22.—Striking early Thursday, police rounded up 320 women and men in a series of citywide raids aimed at the elimination of vice in Ft. Worth.

The raids came as an aftermath of last week's warning to prostitutes to leave the city, and they will be repeated at intervals, Chief of Police Howard warned.

"Women who intend to come here after being forced to leave another town," Howard said, "will save themselves trouble by sending their trunks prepaid to the city jail."

The raids Thursday morning were executed after careful planning. The plan worked with such efficiency that the underworld "graveyard" could not pass along a warning before the officers arrived.

The arrests included 85 women—known and suspected prostitutes. Among the men were nine ex-convicts arrested in one small downtown hotel, a youth wanted for stealing a police car and attacking a woman here, and a number of petty thieves.

Howard estimated that at least 35 percent of the men would show criminal histories. Records on those arrested were being checked Thursday, but Howard estimated the job would require most of the day.

Eleven pistols, a dagger and a washbasin handle (to be used as "knucks") were taken from the men.

More than 60 officers took part in the raids.

## AUCTION SALES REACHED TOTAL OF \$5,560.50

Top sales was accredited to C. A. Waters, of Moran, on his offering of 17 cattle, which brought the net sum of \$677.15.

During the lively bidding M. M. Carey of Breckenridge, was the top buyer in the cattle ring. He paid \$1,380.50 for 30 head of cattle bid off to him.

## RAIL RATES WILL GO UP IN FEBRUARY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—The nation's railroads held official authority Thursday to raise passenger fares 10 percent to meet increased wages and operating costs. The Interstate Commerce commission, acting upon urgent pleas of the carriers, granted the increase which is estimated would yield an extra \$45,000,000 on the basis of last year's revenues.

The fares will go up 10 days after the companies file new tariffs with the ICC and they probably will become effective between February 1 and February 4.

The railroads' application for a jump in freight rates by the same percentage still is pending before the commission.

## MRS. BIBLE DEAD.

AUSTIN, Jan. 22.—Mrs. D. X. Bible died at her home here Wednesday night after a long illness. Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Friday, with burial in an Austin cemetery. Although she had been ill since last Summer, death came suddenly. Survivors included her husband, football coach at the University of Texas; two children, Barbara, 12 and Bill, 10.

## SIGNS HOUSING BILL.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—President Roosevelt Thursday signed a bill authorizing expenditure of another \$450,000,000 to relieve over-crowded conditions in defense areas throughout the country. The measure provides \$300,000,000 for housing and \$150,000,000 for community facilities in these regions.

## VENICE CANALS FREEZE.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—The canals of Venice are frozen over and temperatures of seven degrees above zero Fahrenheit have been reported in a cold wave in northern Italy, the Paris radio said Thursday, quoting Rome reports.

## E. HOOKS IN CHARGE OF ROTARY PROGRAM

T. J. McCarty, district manager of the West Texas Utilities, succeeding the late H. H. Monk, was introduced as a new member of the local Rotary unit and a hearty welcome was extended by each member present.

By unanimous vote of the club a resolution in memory and commendation of the service and integrity of the late Hiram H. Monk was adopted and the secretary was authorized to present the resolution to the members of the family.

Program Chairman Ernest Hittson introduced Rotarian E. Hooks of the telephone company, who was in charge of the luncheon program today. Hooks presented a motion picture—sound film arranged by the Southwestern Bell telephone system to illustrate their efforts in cooperating with the national program of defense. Something of the tremendous task of supplying the communication demands of the south and western part of these United States was clearly understood as a result of this picture, and a better understanding of the vital importance of communications in the present program of arming a nation was grasped by those present.

## BISHOP MOORE WANTS REICH TO REALIZE

DALLAS, Jan. 22.—Invasion of Germany and capture of Berlin "that the German people may know and feel the meaning of invasion," is the expressed hope of Bishop Harry T. Moore.

In an address to the forty-seventh convention of the Dallas Episcopal Diocese Wednesday, the bishop said:

"I have no patience with those who would draw a line between Hitler and the German people. The German people chose Hitler. They would be happy to see him and his principles victorious. The German people must be whipped and whipped thoroughly.

"I further hope that Japan and its people will be made to suffer much of the devastation their armies have visited upon an innocent China. I hope her cities will be made into masses of ruins and the massacre of Pearl Harbor avenged on a ten-for-one basis."

Bishop Moore said he wished for a peace of Christian brotherhood after the "whipping has been finished."

## 600,000 MEN INVOLVED IN DISTRIBUTION

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Japanese attacks—backed by the full power of the 14th Japanese army—battered Gen. Douglas MacArthur's lines today, but a high government spokesman made known the optimistic news that through redispersions the way has been paved for United States reinforcement of the southwest Pacific battle lines.

The spokesman said that some 600,000 troops are involved in the continental redistribution which has powerfully strengthened west coast, Hawaii and Alaskan defenses.

Simultaneously, steps have been taken to bulwark the southwest front, where the United Nations are meeting the full fury of Japanese attack. The spokesman did not reveal details of the southwest Pacific move.

However, he revealed that "considerable numbers" of bombers sent to the Philippines before the outbreak of war are "doing good work."

On the whole broad front of the Pacific, said the spokesman, American positions have been so powerfully reinforced that they now stand far stronger than before Japan's treacherous and damaging assault upon Pearl Harbor on December 7.

Reports from the far Pacific fighting front made it clear that every ounce of American aid is now needed there.

The official communique revealed that the 14th Japanese army, aided by additional troop units and a stream of heavy reinforcements, is hurling terrific attacks at MacArthur's lines.

OPEN WATER.

The steamer Adam E. Cornelius of Buffalo, N. Y., now holds the record for the latest passage through the Straits of Mackinac. She went through at 10:50 a. m., Jan. 4, 1942, having cleared light from Buffalo to lay up for the winter in Lake Michigan. This is the latest passage recorded for any freighter going through "the Straits."

Americans are beginning to talk learnedly about Marmansk and Arrhangal, about Oleska and the possibilities of Russia's getting a warm-weather, year-open port after the war is over, and what Persia might have to say about this. Few of them realize that not all the traffic which touches at all the ports of Russia, Siberia and Persia put together, warm weather and cold weather both, compares in quantity and value with that carried by our Great Lakes. The locks at the St. Lawrence carry more freight than Suez and Panama combined. They bring one and a half million tons of goods from the great ranges and farms of the northwest, they take coal and miscellaneous merchandise back up the water roads from Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Ohio and Kentucky to mining and agricultural districts. The value of this shipping is enormous. That is why it is so good to have late open water. The men will now get a good vacation, many of them making for the southern states. By mid-March they will be at work again, fitting out the freighters, hoping for early thaw on the upper lakes.

President Roosevelt reminds the nation, and himself, that he can fire cabinet members. Well, most wars have been won that way.

DOWN AT RIO.

It's always fair weather when Pan-Americans get together, with a speech on the table and the Spanish ringing clear. It is a beautiful language, in which oratory itself is music. Generally the Spanish orators

seem to lose themselves and their purposes in such vocal music, and in the courtesy and friendliness which accompany such gatherings. It is all very "simpatico." Blunt North Americans, with harsher utterance and more forthright statement, inject some reality into the proceedings, but generally the whole performance is what might be called social rather than diplomatic.

Something comes of that, to be sure. Friendliness grows. The cagey Latins slowly come to trust their Uncle Sam and warm up to a moderate degree of cooperation. Especially in times like these, when good-neighboring has more practical value than usual. The Latin neighbors need our strength, and we need their cooperation to fend off European and Asiatic molesters.

We feel a new glow of warmth, too, for our Latin neighbors in general, because of the courage and loyalty shown by their distant cousins in the Philippines. The effect of that is shown in the present gathering at Rio de Janeiro. This is, perhaps, the warmest meeting of Pan-American minds yet held. But it is terminating very nicely.

It never occurred to us, in those simple days of 1941, that we'd wake up and find ourselves fighting for Johnson, Doolittle and Seward.

BONDS WITH KITTENS.

The purchase of defense stamps and bonds so far has been very gratifying. But the cost of all this protection of our freedom is so immense that more and yet more savings for it will be required. The present system of stamps and bonds of various denominations is good. But to the small investor it leaves something to be desired. Most people like to see their bonds have kittens—those neat little coupons which can be cut off at intervals and which turn money into small sums of money at the bank counter.

Could the United States treasury take note of this universal human desire to have investments being returns—no matter how small—at regular intervals? Why not add a Victory Bond issue with the usual coupons and returns? Most people would like to buy both kinds. They thoroughly approve the present bonds, but ten years seems a long time to wait for visible dividends on all the investments a family can make out of current income.

A foreign correspondent, writing in Life, tells of a discussion he had with a high-ranking British officer in Singapore. From personal observation in the field, the officer declared, he was convinced that one British soldier was a match for ten Japanese. Unfortunately, he added, there were eleven Japanese.

NEWS.

The most important items do not always get into the papers. Don't

blame them, however. It isn't always possible to single out the really important items from the day's happenings. Thus our American journals of 1852 no doubt gave a great deal of space to the election of Franklin Pierce to the presidency. Did they give even a line to the introduction into this country of the English sparrow? We doubt it.

And we will bet any amount of hats that no paper anywhere in Europe dated April 21, 1889, gave any space at all to the birth of a son to Alois and Klara Hitler.
