TAMMANY HALL SEEMS TO BE ON LAST LEGS

NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—Tammany Hall has lost its No. 1 Tiger, Christopher D. Sullivan, who guided the city's famous Democratic committees since 1937. He was ousted Friday night by slightly less than a full vote after a bitter battle. The 70-year-old chieftain fought his foes to the end. Then, when the 12-1-2 to 11-1-3 vote was announced, he walked out. Sullivan was the second leader to feel the ax since the Republican-fusion organization headed by Mayor La Guardia swept the once-mighty Tammany forces from power eight years ago. John F. Curry was the first. Failure of the machine in recent elections plus Sullivan's inability to get patronage in Washington or Albany was blamed for his downfall. His ouster probably will mean abandonment of the 150-year-old name and removal of Manhattan Democratic headquarters from Tammany Hall. Practically all of this "patronage," a colossal sum, is dished out through the wily La Guardia.

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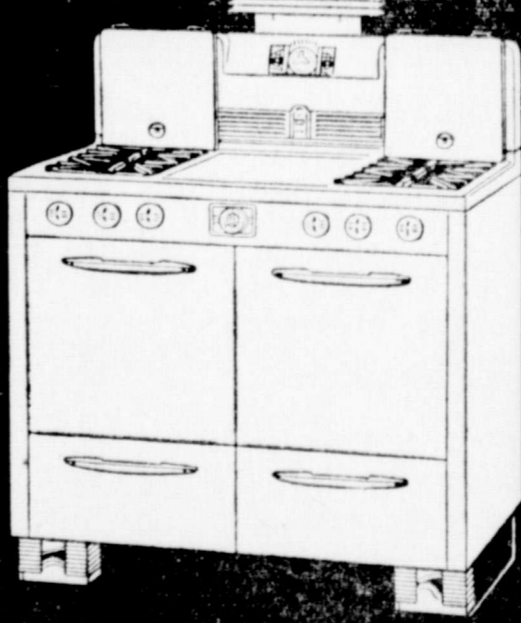
