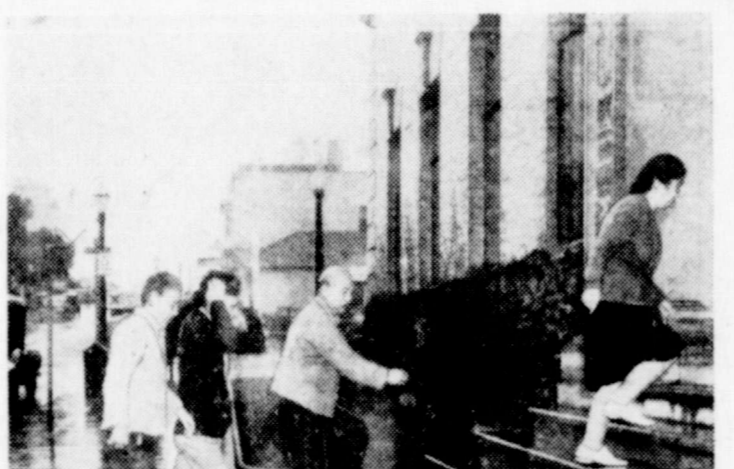

LANGOON, Burma, Feb. 12.—A British army reported tonight that Japanese attacks in the Pa-an area of the Salween river front had been defeated. The communiqué said the Japanese have abandoned operations in the Pa-an area for the time being as the result of setbacks. The situation is reported quiet.

## CLAIMED THAT FARMERS ARE SELLING HOGS

CHICAGO, Feb. 12.—A boom-hog market, which has carried prices to the highest February levels in 16 years, was attributed to livestock circles Thursday to ability of farmers to outmaneuver efforts to curb the advance. With a record number of swine farms, producers were believed to be withholding shipments to market. This has created an artificial scarcity, livestock circles said, and has forced buyers to bid higher.

## HALF MEASURES, HALF TRUTHS BUT BRITISH SAY FIGHT NOT FINISHED

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—"If this war is to be won, the American people must be shaken out of their complacency. We have lost heavily in the Pacific. We have lost the major part of the Philippines. We have lost the whole of Malaya. The Dutch East Indies are equally threatened. The American people must become hard and tough and strong of muscle and the necessary prerequisite to becoming hard and tough is to be told the truth—now! We are adults. We want the truth—not adulterated pap—and we are not getting the truth. We can and we shall win this war but we will not win it with half-measures or half truths and we can not have full measures unless we have full truth."

## BRITONS GROW RESTIVE

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The Singapore disaster rocked Britain today and brought demands that Prime Minister Winston Churchill establish a "government of national unions" in which the dominions and the empire would be represented. Political and parliamentary repercussions of Singapore were so far-reaching that Mr. Churchill was said to be contemplating a radio address to the nation Sunday.

Spreading revolt against the government, as presently constructed, and against the war policy which is blamed for the Singapore defeat, appeared in the ranks of the nationalist liberal party.

## \$4,475 WAS TOTAL SALES THIS WEEK

Auction sales at the Cisco Livestock Exchange this week totaled \$4,475. Entries of cattle were 150; hogs, 40; two horses and one mule. Bidding was lively, but there were no bulk sales of consequence. Pink Stafford of Ranger was top buyer, paying \$556 for 14 cattle. Highest sellers were J. A. Trigg of Cisco, who sold 14 head of cattle for \$661, with Jack Moberley of Albany, second—12 head of cattle for \$500.25.

DETROIT, Feb. 12.—Work was resumed Thursday morning in several divisions of the giant Rouge River plant of the Ford Motor Company, which were shut-down Wednesday night, throwing an estimated 5,000 to 10,000 men out of work.

The shutdown followed a protest by tool and die workers against the presence in their department of an employee who allegedly had struck a fellow worker, UAW-CIO union spokesmen said.


