## CANAL ZONE IS ON THE ALERT

### ENEMY SUBS MAY TRY TO FOOL THE U. S.

BALBOA, Canal Zone, Feb. 17. — American armed forces tightened Caribbean defenses today against the possibility of a German submarine attack in a West Indies feint preparatory to an enemy thrust at the Panama Canal.

Enemy submarines — one or more of which possibly have been sunk — shelled the Standard Oil refinery at Aruba and torpedoed from five to ten Allied oil tankers off the great Venezuelan oil center of Maracaibo.

Five ships were definitely reported torpedoed, with a heavy loss of life, in addition to two known dead, 22 missing and 18 injured.

Bombers from all United States Caribbean bases are converging on the Aruba area in search of enemy subs.

Army officials are checking and re-checking Canal Zone defenses to be on a constant state of alert in the event of enemy attack.

Lieut. Gen. Frank M. Andrews, U. S. commander in the Caribbean, who was at Aruba during yesterday's attack, reported that at least one of the Nazi submarines which torpedoed the tankers and shelled oil installations at Aruba is believed to have been sunk.

### JAPS SPEED UP ATTACKS ON BATAAN

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—Increasing enemy air activity over Gen. Douglas MacArthur's lines in Bataan and heavy artillery bombardments were reported Tuesday by the War Department in a communique which said that 23 women and children were killed and 22 others wounded in a bombing attack on Cabaena on the southeast tip of Bataan Peninsula.

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—Undersecretary of State Welles is convinced that Chile and Argentina soon will align themselves with the other 19 American republics which have severed relations with the Axis powers.

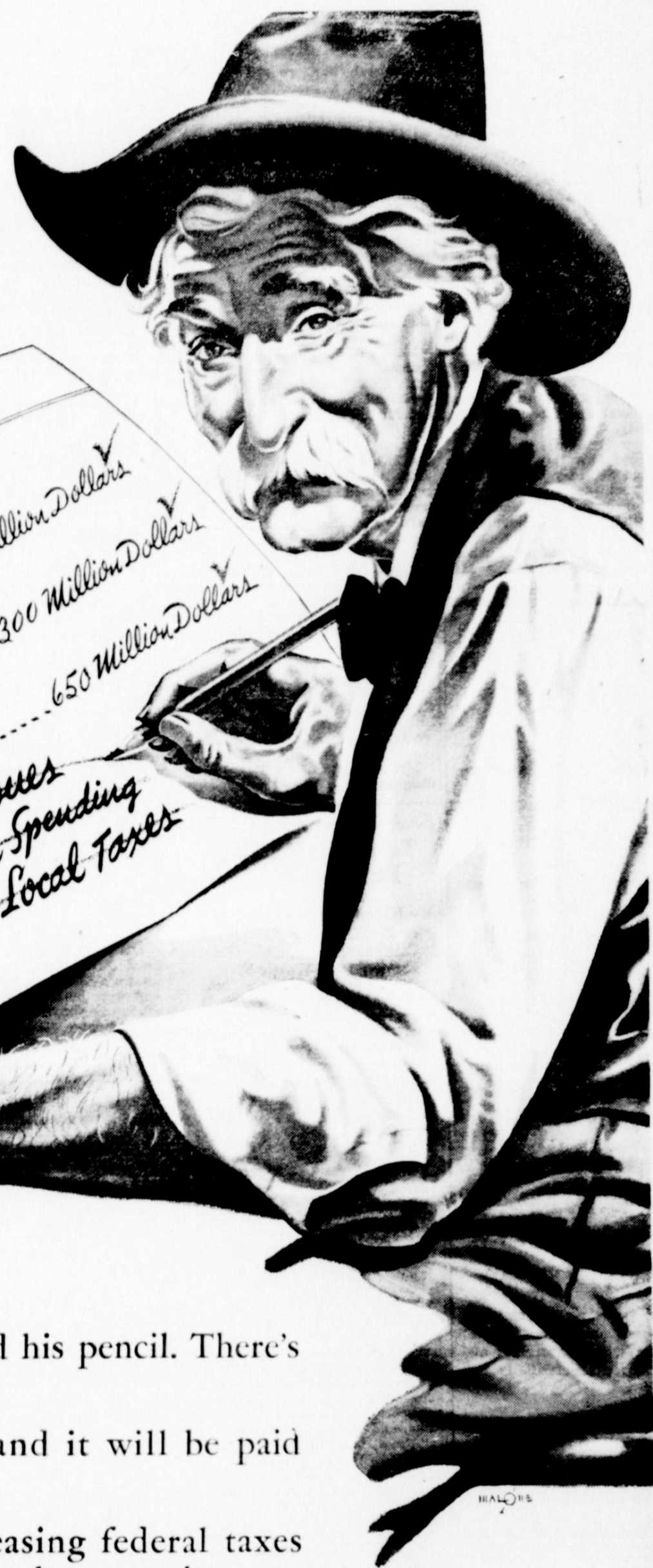
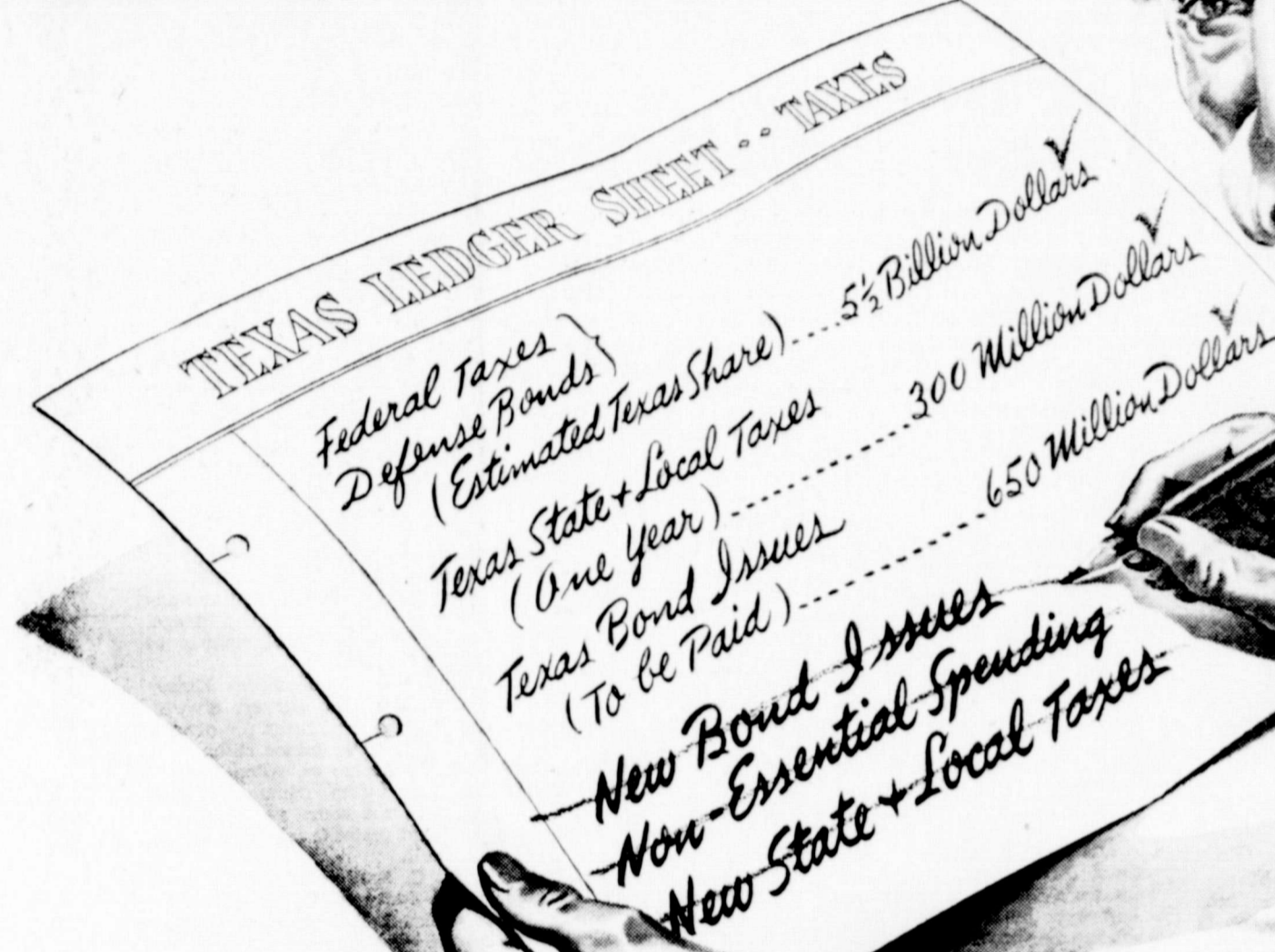
**Associational Meet Is Well Attended**
