During the hour-long, laughter-sparked style show, Mrs. Mary Bechtol won the prize, wearing a soft, wispy knee-length gown.



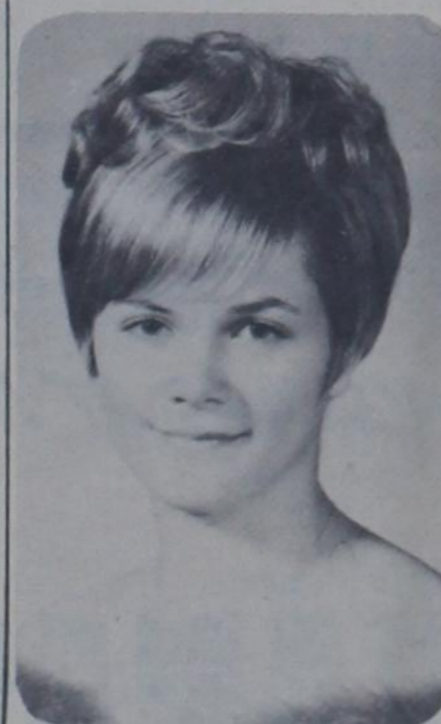

**1 bite in 8 is imported**

One-eighth of the things we eat comes from another land. This fact, says W. E. Black, Extension economist in marketing and policy at Texas A&M University, is based on the most recent US Department of Agriculture food imports figures.

SOME OF these imports, he adds, compete directly with foods we grow here. Among these are some meats, dairy products, and fruit and vegetable products. Such imports work some hardship on our farmers, but to our consumers it means competition and more attractive food prices, Black says.

However, a large proportion of our imported eating is items not grown in this country, yet are a part of nearly every meal. It's pretty hard to think of eating very many meals without coffee, tea or cocoa. Yet all of these beverages come from other countries — Asia, Africa, South and Central America.

Too, it's pretty hard to imagine meats without pepper, hot rolls without cinnamon, gingerbread without ginger, ham without cloves — you could go on and on. Cooking and eating would be very boring without the spices and herbs. Here again, we rely heavily upon overseas friends to help us out.

A very high proportion of our most popular and widely used flavoring agents come from other countries — pepper from the East Indies, cinnamon from Indo-China, cloves from Zanzibar, oregano from Greece, allspice from Honduras, poppy seeds from Holland — the whole world helps make our meals tasty and different.

Another favorite food for which we rely upon overseas friends is bananas. They come to us from South or Central America or the Carribean countries.

One bite in eight — that's how much of our food comes from overseas. While some of it competes directly with our own foods, much of it is so common to the American table that we hardly think of it as imported.

Milk marketing revised

The US Department of Agriculture has issued a final decision on the amendment of the Texas Panhandle federal milk marketing order. USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service officials said the decision proposes that dairy farmer cooperatives be paid under the order at the uniform blend price on their bulk tank deliveries of milk to other handlers in the market. ANOTHER amendment would provide for partial payments by handlers to cooperatives on the 26th day of the month when milk was delivered, and for final payment on the 13th day of the following month. Also, the shrinkage allowance to handlers would be increased from 1 1/2 to 2 percent on milk received from a cooperative acting as a bulk tank truck handler, if purchased on farm weights and tests.

'Glass house' now a reality with new fiberglass shingles

Glass, no longer a limited-use material in the building construction industry, now forms a new product — ceramic shingles. ONE OF the leading glass manufacturers has introduced and is testing currently traditionally shaped shingles of foamed glass, reports Jane Berry, Extension housing specialist who works with Texas A&M University. Because of the extreme durability of the new foamed glass shingles when handled and installed properly, the manufacturer offers a 30-year guarantee. The glass provides good insulation will not deteriorate in the sun and extreme heat, is unharmed by freezing and thawing and resists fire, the manufacturer reports. COLOR is an integral part of the foamed ceramic, so there is no fading or discoloration even in continuous sunlight, Mrs. Berry adds. The shingles cast heavy shadow lines much like those on a heavy weight wood shake roof, and they appear heavy. But the cellular glass is light weight and easy to handle and install. The wedge-shaped shingles are five inches deep and nine inches wide. Tapered ends are laminated to asphalt sealing strips. They are attached with nails like conventional asphalt shingles.

Airline hostess finds glamor and responsibility

An interview with TWA last year led Chris James, pretty 1968 graduate of Dimmitt High, into the glamorous world of an airline hostess.

MISS JAMES, a petite and pretty blonde, has been flying out of Kennedy and La Guardia airports in New York City as Trans-World Airlines hostess since April.

In TWA training school, she said safety rules, precautions and emergency procedure were the main points stressed for hostess trainees. Of course, cooking and serving meals and personal grooming were also part of the training.

After five weeks of classroom instruction and a week of in-flight training she made on her first flight — and made a mistake that she now recalls as her most embarrassing moment.

IT WAS a shuttle flight — two trips in one day to Chicago and back to New York. Three of the girls on the plane were new hostesses, and one was an eight-year veteran. As they landed after the short flight, many of the passengers had still not received their meal, and Miss James was a bit rattled. When they landed, she began making the customary announcements. "Ladies and gentlemen, we are at La Guardia Airport in New York."

The captain's voice came over the intercom — "Where are we?" And she repeated that they were in New York.

"ARE YOU sure" he asked her. The passengers were amused, but one nice person informed her that they were in Chicago. As the passengers left the plane, one of them commented that at least this flight wasn't boring.

CLOTHES are important to a flying hostess, and TWA uniforms are designed by Delton. Winter uniforms come in three colors, with a tri-color knit blouse which will blend with any of the suits. Shoes and bag match the color which the girl chooses for her suit. Summer uniforms are easy-care Dacron,



with a plaid skirt and coordinating blouse and jacket. Shoes are either white patent leather, or the color of the jacket.

The problem of weight was also discussed regularly. According to Miss James, if a girl is overweight during training she is terminated. After training weight is checked once a week and overweight hostesses who show that they are continuously shedding their extra pounds may keep their jobs but if no effort to take off the weight is shown, the hostess loses her position.

During her work with TWA, Miss James lived in Queens with four other hostesses, all of whom flew with International. While she traveled to all of the major cities in the United States, her roommates were flying to Europe and Asia.

TRAVELING is one of the most enjoyable aspects of an airline hostess' job, and it's the part Miss James will miss as she leaves her career to become a housewife. She voluntarily "grounded" herself this week for the higher calling of marriage. Monday she became the bride of Tommie Maples of Dimmitt. "I highly recommend an airline hostess job as a career," she said and noted that the airlines do like attractive girls, but personality and friendliness are also factors in the selection of flying hostesses.
