New enrollment record set

CASTRO GOUNTY

Dimmitt Public Schools seemed headed for another record enrollment Tuesday with 1,833 students - a dozen more than the same time last year - signed up for classes.

The

SCHOOL officials expect the enrollment to take another jump after Labor Day and to "peak out" in October.

Biggest class is the first grade, with 218. Smallest is the senior class, with 96.

Supt. Charlie White reported that 61 pupils were enrolled by 42nd Year - No. 46 Tuesday for Head Start and preschool migrant classes, and that 50 students are enrolled in special education classes throughout the school system.

NOT COUNTING the special education classes, enrollment by buildings is 450 in Dimmitt High, 287 in Dimmitt Junior High, 445 (See "New enrollment" Page 14)
