Sturdy Dutch, Indonesian soldiers, aided by American, British and Australian fighting units, smashed the Japs back in one sector of the three main fighting fronts that threaten to submerge Java under the enemy offensive in the Far East.

The Dutch communique the Japs have failed to gain since Sunday on any of three invasion fronts they established on the north coast of Java, and the United Press correspondent, W. H. McDougall, reported from the front that the enemy had been driven back seven miles at one

But McDougall's dispatches emphasized there was lack of definite news concerning the central Java front, where the enemy has been endeavoring to cut the island n half, and that some areas of the fighting lines are so fluid that accurate reports of the trend of battle is impossible.
