Gen. Douglas Mac-Arthur met renewed Jap offensives in the Philippines and in Central Burma today with a pledge that "we shall win or die" in a mighty crusade against the Axis.

The promise of the supreme commander of the Southwest Pacific sector was made at Australia's parlia-

ment house. In the Philippines, enemy bombers again bombed the Corregidor fortress for six hours, losing four planes. It was the third straight day of intensified at-

Fifty-four bombers participated in the effort to break the defense of American and Filipino troops who had scorned a Jap ultimatum to surrender.

In Central Burma, the Japs are using paratroops and increasing numbers of infantry and planes in two main drives toward the Prome oil fields and Mandalay.

On the Prome front the Japs advanced to within about thirty miles of their objective, passing Kyangin, and are believed to be massing for a thrust at the o i l fields. Chinese fighting in the Toungoo area, on the railroad leading from Rangoon to Mandalay, are units, but are putting up a bitter fight to break the Jap encircle-

## IN THE UKRAINE

Ukrainian resistance to the Nazis German difficulties on this front. It is the result of the prudent policy that the Soviets have purued there in the last 20 years. Under the czars Russification

was the government watchword. The Ukrainians were to be turned into Russians, whether they liked it or not. The exercise of the Ukrainian language and observation of Ukrainian festivals were strongly discouraged. Naturally such treatment led the Ukrainians to welcome the German invasion of 1918, even though they soon afterwards changed their minds.

The Soviet government has pursued just the opposite policy. The use of the Ukrainian language was not only encouraged, but fostered, being taught to all non-Ukrainian dwellers in the region. The publication of Ukrainian books has risen from 600,000 in 1914, when only original Ukrainian literary works were allowed, to fifty million copies annually now, comprising both original works and translations. Every encouragement has also been given to Ukrainian films, songs, folk-lore, dances, embroid-

ery and pottery. Naturally the Ukrainians take kindly to this treatment. When they contrast it with the German theory of the "master race," and the practice of slavery for all who do not belong to it, no wonder they have chosen the free side






