LONDON, March 31. --- British and Soviet naval forces protecting a convoy of British and United States war supplies to Russia, sank or damaged five Nazi warships and U-boats in the Arctic ocean in a three-day running battle, the admiralty announces.

Two British warships escorting the convoy were damaged but made port.

The Germans, who admitted loss of one destroyer in the battle. claimed earlier in a broadcast that another four ships of the convoy had been sunk --possibly a total of eight purportedly sunk or damaged


