# WAVE TERROR-ISM FOLLOWS PIERRE LAVAL

WASHINGTON, April 16. --- The initial sugar ration next month will be one pound per person for a two-week period, the office of the price administrator said today.

The amount to be allotted after that has not been determined, the OPA said.

Laval prepared to assume full power over the Vichy government with a cabinet of his own choosing. Two anti - German attacks occurred in Paris shortly after Laval's departure from the city and his return to Vichy to set up a new cabinet. Two other attacks were reported in the northern industrial region and troop trains carrying German troops on leave were derailed by saboteurs and 40 persons reported killed.

San Francisco-A daytime air aid alert was ordered today in the San Francisco Bay-Northern Caliornia area because of the approach of an unidentified fleet of airplanes. The alert was cancelled in 17 minutes, the planes having been identified as friendly.

WASHINGTON - Navy announced today that a medium sized U. S. merchant vessel had been torpedoed off the Atlantic coast and that all survivors were landed at an east coast port.

WASHINGTON-The big guns of Corregidor blasted Japanese troop and truck concentrations on Bataan yesterday, blowing up ammunition dumps and inflicting 'numerous' casualties on the enemy, the war department said oday in its first communique from he beleagured fortress in Manila Bay in two days.



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
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
