

DUMB DRIVING

It is probably well-known that automobile mishaps are seldom inevitable. They seem to come nearly always from carelessness and dumbness, in about equal parts. For a shining example, consider the series of events in a recent Ohio catastrophe.

A woman driving on a cold night, with her husband as a passenger, stooped over to turn on the heater without first stopping the car. It was in a brightly lighted area and on a three-car lane. The car, lacking proper control, hit a light pole and fell over on its side. Other cars stopped, one after another, and jammed the road. Soon one of them rammed another. A police ambulance car was called and was side-swiped. A third collision occurred when a municipal employe rushed up to look at the damaged light pole. He parked and another driver hit his car. Spectators grew confused and other pile-ups resulted one after another, for no apparent reason. Everybody seemed to be banging into everybody else. 


