MASONS WILL AID MEMBERS IN U. S. ARMY

Frank R. Leach, district deputy grand master for the 73d Masonic district—Eastland and Stephens counties—spent last Sunday in Waco at a special meeting of grand officers of the grand lodge of Texas.

All grand officers and 92 district deputies were present. The meeting was for the purpose of working out a concrete program to look after all Masons in the armed forces of the United States government, including those employed on war projects.

Deputy Leach stated Saturday that he would call a meeting soon of representatives of all Eastland and Stephens county lodges, for the purpose of setting the far-reaching program in orderly motion.

This meeting will be held in the city of Eastland, Mr. Leach said.

YELLOW DEVILS WONDER HOW IT WAS EFFECTED

Growing United Nations' aerial offensive against Axis nerve centers carried the war to Japan for the first time Saturday with disclosures by Tokyo radio that American planes had bombed four big Japanese cities.

The capital of Tokyo, with its millions of flimsy buildings, the big port of Yokohama, the shipping center of Kobe and the factories of Nagoya were blasted by high explosives and incendiaries that started fires, the Japanese broadcast said.

News of the attacks on enemy nerve centers were reported for the time being only by Tokyo, which said that nine planes were shot down in Saturday mid-day raids, and that the attackers swept low enough at some points to machine gun their targets.

The Japanese air alarm lasted from five to seven hours, according to the Axis broadcasts, and extended to all principal parts of the main islands.

The Japs were apparently completely surprised and mystified as to the bases from which the planes came.

The enemy's efforts to learn something about the operations base took the form of propaganda broadcasts, suggesting falsely that the U. S. aircraft carrier Yorktown was used, and that—according to the Axis—had been sunk off Japan.

The Tokyo report that machine gun fire was directed at targets also suggested that the planes were small craft from a carrier, rather than long distance, heavy bombers.

Earlier speculation that flying fortresses had flown from bases in China, however, was strongly discounted.

NEPHEW OF DR. GRIFFIN A LUCKY MAN

Weldon Pounds, son of D. F. Pounds of Ranger and nephew of Dr. J. E. Griffin and Mrs. T. H. Purvis, of Cisco, has notified his relatives that he is now in San Francisco with his wife—safe and sound—after grueling war experiences.

Pounds, a gun captain on the USS Langley, which was sunk on February 27 in the Indian ocean, was picked up by the U. S. tanker Pecos several hours after his ship went down.

Later the Pecos was bombed and sunk by Jap destroyers, south of Java, on March 31, but Pounds landed in Australia eventually.

When he arrived in San Francisco on Furlough it was to learn that his wife had been totally unaware of the fate of the Langley and Pecos.

FORMER CISCO GIRL MARRIES LUBBOCK MAN

Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Whitehead, former Ciscoans, but now located at New Braunfels, where Mr. Whitehead was recently recalled to again head the chamber of commerce, this week announced the marriage of their daughter, Alice, to Staff Sergeant Claude H. O'Neill.

The wedding took place in Lubbock, where Miss Whitehead was a student in Texas Technological college. She will be remembered by many of Cisco's younger set during her early school days, and later because of her dancing career.

She was in the 1939 Casa Manana and has appeared at numerous Texas conventions and on other occasions.

SHORTAGE OF LABOR FACES CO. FARMERS

Approximately 100 farmers and their wives met at the high school building in Scranton Wednesday night, the occasion being the April meeting of the Food for Freedom Campaign of the Scranton area.

A program had been arranged to discuss the labor problem, which will soon be a serious matter with many farmers, especially those who are responding to the government's call to increase the peanut acreage to practically double the size of last year's crop, said M. F. Starr of Scranton.

With even a normal crop, farmers are always short of labor when peanuts are ready to hoe, said Mr. Starr. Last year, on account of a shortage of labor, thousands of bushels of peanuts in Eastland county alone were lost. These would be a valuable contribution to England and Russia now.

Mr. Starr said it had been arranged to have a number of prominent Cisco people address the Scranton meeting, as well as a representative of the WPA office. For some reason, Starr said, the Cisco delegation failed to show up. He added, "we hope to hear from them later."

THE WEB OF CONQUEST

It is a wonderful spider web that Japan is spinning. And it is fascinating in a way, to watch Tokyo, the mother spider, expanding that web of empire. Already it spreads over the Pacific and the rich and lovely islands of the South Seas. Slowly the strands are drawn westward over Burma, and beyond the Bay of Bengal into India itself. There will be fat living there, for Mother Spider and her brood, if she succeeds in bringing that great, fruitful land into her web.

The free world knows well the fate of nations that become the prey of the Spider of Nippon. They are bound hand and foot, paralyzed by the spider's poison. They are held in a living death while their riches are sucked out of them for the sustenance of the Mother Spider and her children. When only empty shells are left, the Spider moves on to spin new webs and entrap new victims.

There are, however, ways to overcome even human spiders in their empire-building. They can be burned with fire and sprayed with lead. Such remedies can be applied increasingly until the world is cleansed of them.

UNUSED RESOURCES

Old emery mines, long disused, are being reopened in the Berkshire hills of Western Massachusetts. Imports from Turkey drove out the domestic product, forcing the closing of the mines. Now war necessities have brought attention back to these disused shafts. As the mining process calls for a special technique, it is lucky that a few old-time emery miners are still alive to direct the younger men.

DUMB DRIVING

It is probably well-known that automobile mishaps are seldom inevitable. They seem to come nearly always from carelessness and dumbness, in about equal parts. For a shining example, consider the series of events in a recent Ohio catastrophe. A woman driving on a cold night, with her husband as a passenger, stooped over to turn on the heater without first stopping the car. It was in a brightly lighted area and on a three-car lane. The car, lacking proper control, hit a pole, lacking proper control, hit a light pole and fell over on its side. Other cars stopped, one after another, and jammed the road. Soon one of them rammed another. A police ambulance was called and was side-swiped. A third collision occurred when a municipal employee rushed up to look at the damaged light pole. He parked and another driver hit his car. Spectators grew confused and other pile-ups resulted one after another, for no apparent reason. Everybody seemed to be banging into everybody else. Ambulances came, a fire rescue squad was summoned and first aid was applied to the victims. With the confusion cleared, one motorist was dead, two others were seriously

injured and half a dozen automobiles were badly damaged. A little more attention to the job of driving, a little less speed all round, and sensible avoidance of a crowd on the highway, would have prevented all that trouble.

ABSORBING THE JAPANESE

To hear some people talk, you would think that the attempted Japanese conquest of China would not vital. "The Chinese will eventually absorb them all," we are told. But will they? In the past, China has been repeatedly conquered by barbarian tribes. The Manchus, who ruled up to the establishment of the republic in 1911, were the latest. Such tribes eventually were absorbed, largely through their desire to adopt Chinese ways. This was in part because they knew themselves to be inferior. Even more so wanderers from the steppes and the forests, they were unequal to organizing, taxing and administering a civilized state. They had to learn Chinese ways to survive. This is not true of the Japanese. Whatever we may think of them, their government is equal to modern conditions and the competition of the rest of the world. There is no necessity for their merging with the Chinese order. If they conquer China, they will remain apart from the Chinese for a long, long time just as the Germans remain apart from their victims.
