1.00.000 SAW SHUT OUT NAB THE KY. DERBY. LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 2.—A great crowd—at least 100,000—today watched the 68th running of America's favorite horse race, the Kentucky Derby. And when Shut Out owned by Mrs. Payne Whitney and ridden by Jockey W. Wright, romped away from the 17 contenders and immortalized his owner, the great crowd went wild. Devil Diver, stablemate of Shut Out, was the favorite. MARINE CORPS RAISES TO 33 AGE MAXIMUM. WASHINGTON, May 2.—The Marine Corps today raised the maximum enlistment age from 30 to 33 and relaxed height and weight requirements to make more men eligible for service. Men who have not attained their 34th birthday will be accepted if physically fit for combat duty. They may range in height from 63 to 75 inches. This represents reduction of one inch from the previous minimum and addition of one inch to the maximum. Overweight applicants will be accepted if there is a reasonable chance for reduction at camp, provided they can wear stock-size clothing. Underweight men will be enlisted if they scale at least 123 pounds and are not more than 20 pounds under the age and weight standards of the Navy.

JUDGE QUOTES BIBLE AND DENIES DIVORCE. HOUSTON, May 2.—District Judge Kenneth McCalla turned to the Bible for his judgment in a negro divorce case. A negro Baptist preacher for 23 years railroaded during the week and led his flock from the pulpit on Sundays, but he couldn't convert his Methodist wife to his beliefs. So he sued for divorce. One witness said the marital-religious dispute once resulted in preacher threatening his wife in open church with a chair and the wife counter-threatening with a "Texas jack" knife. After hearing evidence, McCalla entered his decision: "Judgment—St. Mark, 10, 9; St. Matthew, 19, 6." This scripture reads: "Whom God hath joined together, let no man put asunder."
