## PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND COLLEGE OPEN MONDAY

### TO ALL MEN 17 to 50 NOT YET IN UNIFORM

### FACULTIES OF BOTH INSTITUTIONS COMPLETE; LITTLE LOSS IF ANY EXPECTED IN ENROLLMENT

School children from Cisco and the 23 communities adjacent who have transferred to Cisco Independent School District for educational purposes will assemble at the various school buildings at 9:30 Monday morning to be registered and classified, said Supt. R. N. Cluck, Saturday. Classes will begin Tuesday.

All teachers thought to be needed at present have been secured and are ready to begin their work. Despite the scarcity of teachers over the nation, Cisco has been fortunate enough to fill her vacancies with men and women fully qualified for the work they are expected to do, and to comply with all affiliation requirements, it was stated.

Cisco usually requires about 54 teachers for its system. Some falling off is expected since so many people have moved to war-project centers for employment, yet a number of families have moved to Cisco for the benefit of her widely-heralded, efficient school system.

Superintendent Cluck emphasized that no close estimate of this year's enrollment can be made for several days. It usually requires about 10 days to reach the peak of enrollment, he stated.

**Cisco Junior College.**  
Cisco Junior college has been enrolling students all this week and is ready to begin its third annual term as a state institution Monday. A faculty of 11 teachers has been secured to teach the course, which covers two years of junior college work, fully accredited by the state department and association of colleges. Graduates are accredited without examination in all other institutions of learning, or if they have finished the required courses in Education, they may receive teachers' certificates for the public schools of Texas.

The Cisco Junior college has been approved for a second glider course and a quota of 10 men has been allotted by the war department. This course will begin about October 12.

Persons desiring further information concerning this course are directed to consult Haywood Cabaness or P. R. Warwick. The age limit for this course is 18 to 36.

The college is now negotiating for at least two new war courses to be approved by the federal government, which pays the expenses, making them free to adults, and with no age limit.

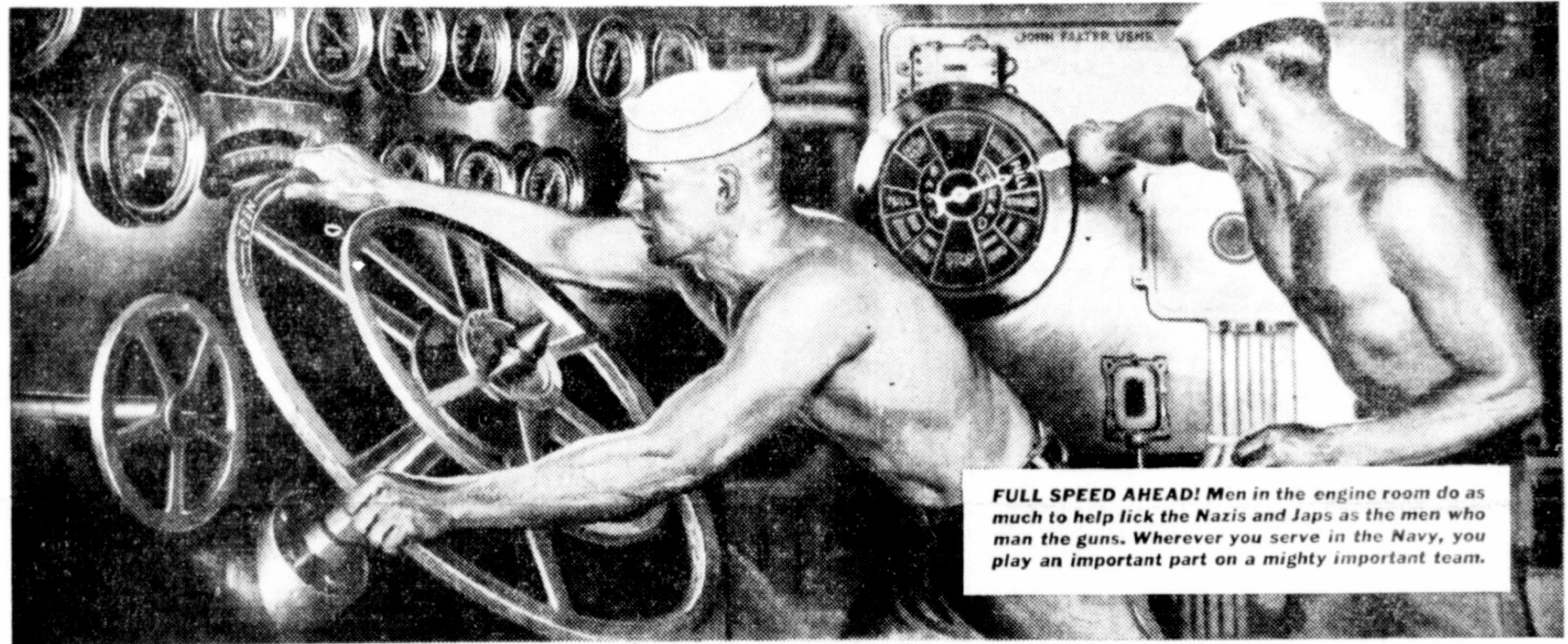

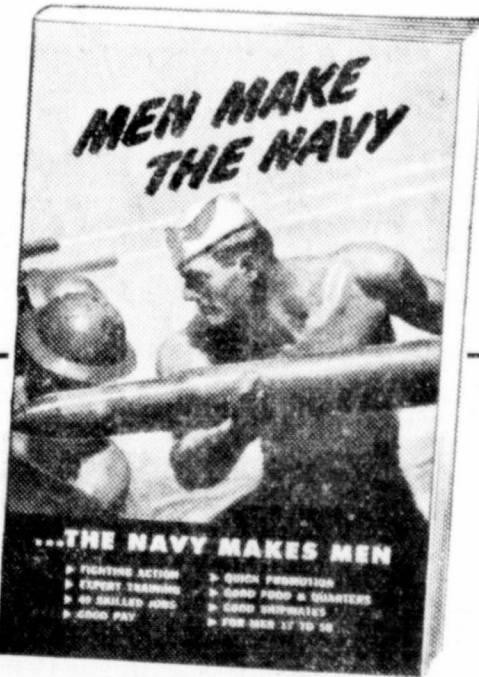

MacARTHUR HEADQUARTERS, Australia, Sept. 12.—Allied Flying Fortresses and Lockheed Hudson medium bombers left one Japanese destroyer sinking, its crew struggling in the water, and probably damaged another off the
