GREAT EFFORT OF NAZIS IS VERY COSTLY

Dispatches from the front emphasized that Russian withdrawals were orderly and comparatively short, and that at no point had the Germans attained their objective—a break through to the Volga river.

KATY RAILROAD TRACKS AT THE WEST END OF GREAT RESERVOIR NOW UNDER 14 INCHES OF WATER

In a flood of rain Friday night and Saturday morning that added 4.1 inches to that which had already fallen this week, Lake Cisco stands at 92 ft and 9 inches, which is an all-time high, and the water is 14 inches above the M. K. & T. railroad tracks which cross the western edge of Lake Cisco.

SIX-INCH RAINFALL EASTLAND

The city of Eastland was hard hit by the flood of seven inches which fell this week, almost six inches of which fell between late Friday afternoon and 9 o'clock Saturday morning.

SCREEN HERO.

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 17.—Errol Flynn, Hollywood movie hero, went through his paces on the sound stage today under \$1000 bail, charged with criminal assault upon Betty Hansen, 17-year-old, movie struck waitress, who quit her job for the chance to meet him. She accused him of taking her upstairs after a dinner party in the Bel Air mansion of wealthy sportsman Fred McEvoy and there indulging in what District Attorney John F. Dockweiler called statutory rape. Three other studio workers, held with Flynn for arraignment on the same charges next Friday, admitted illicit relations with her. The curly-headed Flynn performing on the Warner sound stages as a heroic Norwegian fighting the Nazis, said Miss Hansen's story left him dumbfounded.
