# DRAFT OF ADM. DARLAN, HITLER STOOGE, IN HANDS OF THE ALLIES, AND THE YANKS ARE MARCHING ON

LONDON, Nov. 10. - American tanks pounded into Casablanca and Oran today, a high-speed mobile column raced out of Algiers toward the Tunisia border and dramatic moves which may bring Admiral Jean Francois Darlan and other high French officers into the Allied camp appeared to be in progress.

(Vichy reported that U. S. forces entered Oran at 4:45 a. m. C. W. T.)

The U.S. offensive in North Africa was in high gear and reports both from Allied headquarters and the Vichy and Axis radio indicated it rapidly was nearing the mop-up stage.

Frantic efforts were under way by Vichy and the Axis to counteract the fast-moving Allied operations. Marshal Henri Philippe Petain assumed the supreme command of all French armed forces and Premiere Pierre Laval was reported attempting to negotiate a full peace with Germany, probably preparatory to an effort to take France openly into the war as a Nazi ally. One rumor circulated that Laval, Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini might hold a joint conference on ways and means.

An Allied spokesman said today that Admiral Darlan, vice-premier of the Vichy government and commander of its armed forces, was being entertained by an American general at Algiers.

"Darlan is in Algiers, being entertained by a United States general with all the dignity due his rank and record," the spokesman said. "I use 'entertain' advisedly.

The spokesman would not amplify his reference to his choice of words.




