YOU CAN AVOID BREAKDOWNS IF YOU PROTECT YOUR TRACTOR WHEN IT IS IDLE

In my last article I pointed out how breakdowns and expense could be saved by periodic "check-ups" of farm tractors. However, tractors in some sections are not used all year around and are "laid up" for at least part of the winter. Unless precautions are taken during these "lay-up" periods, costly damage to the engine can result to condensation inside the motor, etc.



A clean engine delivers maximum power. Change the oil regularly as recommended by the manufacturer. Use a high quality oil from which harmful carbon forming impurities have been removed.

- WHAT TO DO 1. Drain crankcase, flush and refill with the proper grade of motor oil. Run engine only long enough to warm and distribute the new oil.



Lubrication of all chassis fittings before laying up the tractor insures maximum protection during idle periods. It is important to use a good quality lubricant.

HOW TO USE GAS WISELY FOR HOUSE HEATING. 1. Avoid over-heating. Don't let temperature get above 72 degrees. 2. Keep all heating equipment in good operating condition; keep it clean and free from all dust particles. 3. Flame on radiant-type room heaters should not be allowed to lick out top of radiators. 4. If you have a gas heater in your fireplace, seal the flue to the extent that the chimney heat will not go up the chimney, yet leave sufficient space for venting heater. 5. For the health of your family, maintain an even heat not over 72 degrees throughout that part of house which is used for winter living. 6. Do not put metal covers on radiators. They absorb heat radiation and stop warm air circulation. Radiators should be painted with a thin coat of flat oil paint, not metallic paints. 7. See that windows and doors lock tightly; if possible they should be weather-stripped. 8. Window openings should be no wider than necessary for an ample flow of fresh air, otherwise they become heat wasters. Where unvented equipment is used, a small opening at the top of the window is recommended to help reduce "wall sweating." 9. At night when windows are open in bedrooms, shut off rest of house to prevent temperatures from dropping so low that more fuel will be needed to build up warmth during the morning hours. 10. Insulation reduces consumption of heating gas 20 to 25 per cent in one-story houses and 15 to 20 per cent in two-story houses of standard type construction. Insulation materials are plentiful and cheaper than ever before.

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
