WASHINGTON, Dec. 11. — The senate

committee investigating the war, reporting that nationwide gasoline rationing is "abundantly justified" and that fuel oil rationing in the east must grow more and more stringent, today called for elimination of pleasure driving and warned that compulsory conversion of oil burners to coal may be necessary.

The committee, headed by Sen. Harry S. Truman (Democrat, Missouri), investigated the oil and rubber problems last month when Western congressmen revolted unsuccessfully against gasoline rationing in their areas. Its report said:

"The Baruch report on rubber in September and the recent report of William Jeffers as rubber director have confirmed the recommendation of this committee last May that the rubber situation was extremely critical and that every possible measure of conservation should be immediately adopted.

"Pleasure driving should pass out for the duration. When Jeffers . . . advises the American people that only a miracle can produce the rubber essential to keep our military machine functioning and that any breakdown such as ordinarily is anticipated might mean the paralysis of our military and civilian economy it is high time for America to stop, look and lis-

Rationing of fuel oil in the East was said to be "absolutely essential." In the Midwest it can be justified only on the ground that essential transportation facilities will be released to help the hard-pressed East, the committee said.

"No Americans must freeze," it said. War production must not be impeded by epi-

It called for cutting of red tape by local rationing boards and said it was imperative that minimum requirements for home heating be satisfied. But it also called for public co-operation in accepting reasonable restrictions and in making conversions to coal, warning:

"Compulsory conversion wherever practicable may soon be essential."

The Truman committee said gasoline rationing should apply even to those areas where gasoline is plentiful because of the need to conserve rubber, but that such rationing should be administered locally by local boards that are familiar with local needs.

'Certain conditions exist in the West and Middle West, such as the great distances involved, that do not exist in the East," the committee said. "Full consideration should be given to those differences."

It stated emphatically that fuel for farm tractors should not be rationed, but that amounts used should be reported to local boards charged with correcting cases where abuses and excesses are discovered.

The report criticized "complicated" forms which farmers are required to fill out to secure permission to operate their trucks.




