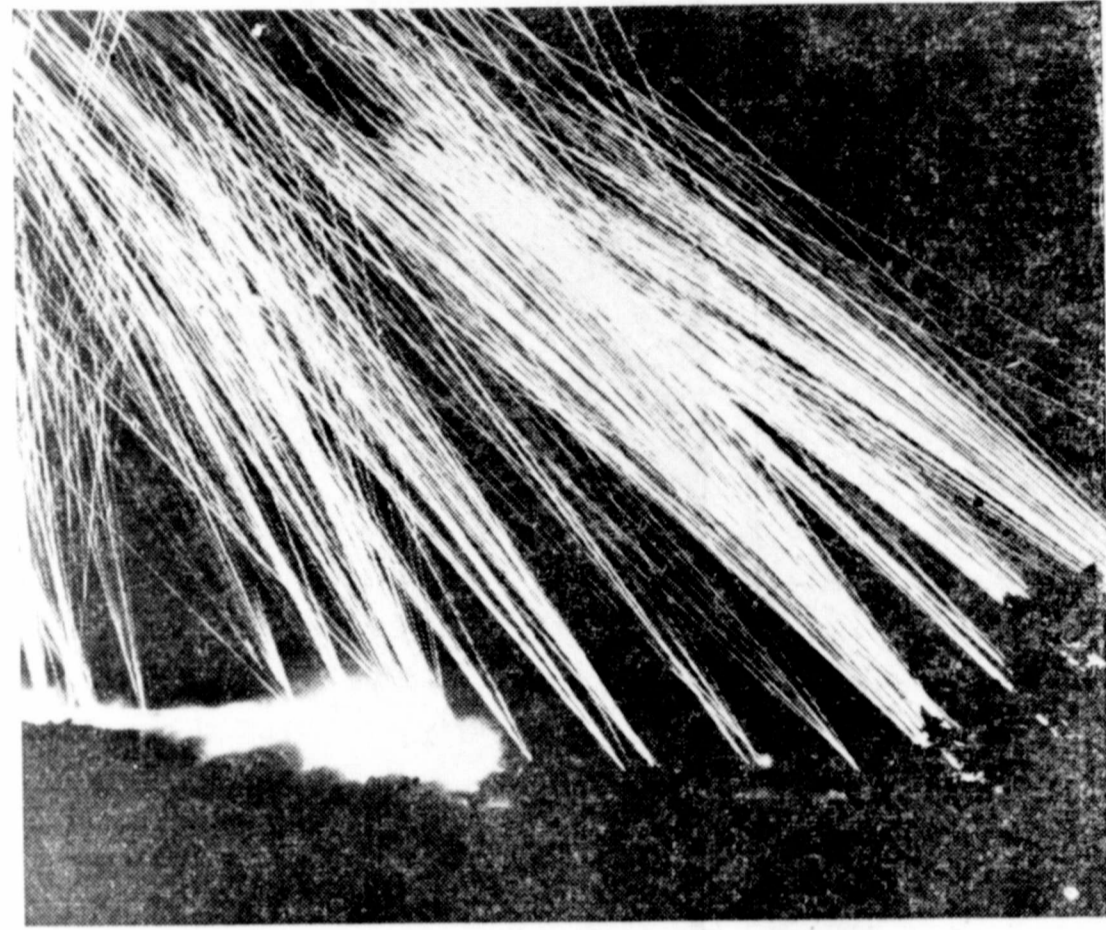
FEBRUARY WAR BOND PURCHASES \$100,000

MORE COFFEE

WASHINGTON, Mar. 11.—Federal Price Administrator Brown located the Nation's coffee reserves 16 per cent by announcing the next coffee rationing period would be cut from six to five weeks. Stamp No. 26 from war ration Book 1, will purchase one pound of coffee between March 22 and April 25, the OPA said. Prior to this time, one stamp had to last six weeks.

SHOULD BE LAW

AUSTIN, March 11.—The Dowdwood Mafford bill, to regulate labor unions has yet to run two hazards to become law in Texas. Its final passage by the house of representatives yesterday, sent it to the senate. It passed there, many questioned what Gov. Coke R. Stevenson will do. He might veto it, sign it, or let it become law by doing nothing.

MILLION HOMELESS

LONDON, March 11.—Air Minister Sir Archibald Sinclair told Commons today that the Royal Air Force has destroyed or damaged seriously about 2000 factories and industrial works in Germany and rendered more than 1,000,000 persons homeless. In addition to those left homeless, the intensity of the RAF's aerial offensive has caused the evacuation of many more persons, resulting in overcrowding of towns in Eastern Germany, Sinclair said.

GERMANS FORCED BACK

MOSCOW, Mar. 11.—Red armies hammered the Germans back to within 12 miles of their central front bastion of Vyazma today, while warping off three new tabs by masses of Axis tanks and infantry on the muddy plains south and west of Kharkov.

WINNING IN 1943.

It would be fine to get this war won by the end of 1943—but hardly by any responsible person in any place of high authority, political or military, is willing to predict it. Many of them will see the German menace can be put down by that time. They say that two or two to finish up with Japan.

It is likely, however, that when Germany and Italy make their unconditional surrenders, and the full force of Great Britain, the U. S. and the United States, together with such armies as are still intact from other United Nations, is then against Japan, all at once that nation cannot long continue the war.

So winning in 1943 becomes a theoretical possibility. But it requires something more of soldiers than they have given so far. More in sacrifice and in labor. More also of good will, and of faith in our allies and our united future. What would you give to have the war shortened to less than another New Year's Day would see all the boys and their families laying down their arms?

It's something to pray for, isn't it? And to work for, and to expect? What will you wish, a year from now, that you had done today?

THE HOARDING URGE.

Here is an incident reported from a paint store. A customer came in and wanted to buy a white aluminum paint for a few basement pipes. The store had some and the clerk started to measure it. It was essential for the job, the customer remarked. But then the little hoarding devil that lives in one corner of a fellow's head began to growl.

"Got any more?" he asked. Yes, the clerk admitted he had more in the back room. "Well, show me the customer," said the hoarding customer. His name? A white paint. Then he asked \$2.00. That's right, 100 cents a quart, about it, make it an even round. So he walked off with \$2.00 more aluminum paint than he needed, and he was glad to see customers that he could do with.

You can multiply that incident by tens of thousands. People who wouldn't think of buying things they don't need, but who will buy them because they are afraid of their neighbor's hoarding.

Sure, Canada's a good neighbor. Whenever Washington has a problem, somebody goes to Ottawa and looks what to do about it.

Swedish Meat Balls Spare Ration



Swedish Meat Balls
1 pound ground beef
2 eggs
2 tablespoons minced onion
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 1/2 cups milk
4 cups corn flakes
3 tablespoons fat
1 cup milk
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
Mix together meat, eggs, onion, seasonings, milk and cornflakes which have been rolled into fine crumbs. Form into balls. Fry slowly in melted fat about 30 minutes, turning only once. Remove from pan. Stir milk into meat drippings; heat; add salt to taste and parsley. Pour over meat balls. Yield: 12 meat balls 2 inches diameter (or 30 meat balls 1 1/2 inches in diameter).

Famed German Artist Warns America Through His Art



NEW YORK, N. Y.—William Sharp, the internationally famous Berlin newspaper artist and cartoonist, is proud of two important events which have occurred since his arrival in the United States in 1934 — his American citizenship and his widely-acclaimed "Third Horseman" drawings.
Sharp, who recently obtained his American citizenship, fled from Berlin in 1934, shortly after Hitler's assumption of power. His widely-heralded caricatures of the Fuehrer, Goebbels, Goering, and other infamous Nazis, precipitated his flight.
He was engaged to draw vivid illustrations for the publication, "The Third Horseman," which was adapted from "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse" — War, Famine, Disease and Death. "The Third Horseman," depicting Disease, dramatically discloses how war and disease traditionally march hand-in-hand, and describes the ravages of war-created epidemics that hazard and imperil both civilian population and armed forces. Sharp's illustrations have attracted favorable comment everywhere.
"The Third Horseman," published in cooperation with the Public Health Committee of the Paper Cup and Container Institute, was distributed by the Atlantic Coast Network which has broadcast a dramatization with the same title.

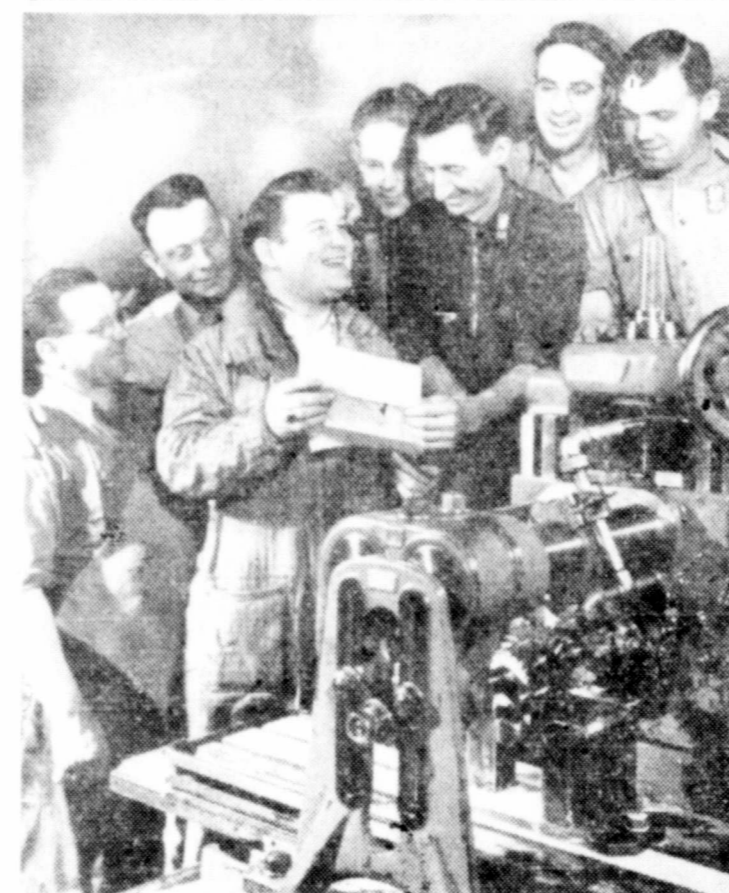

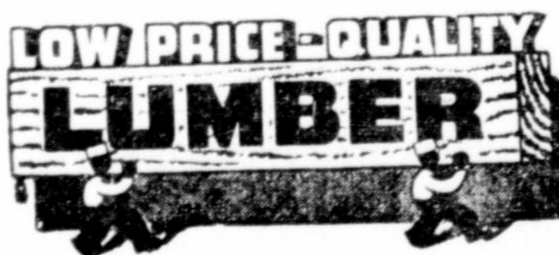
