FATHERS FACE ALSACE AND LORRAINE SECTORS DURING 1943 WILL LOSE 10 FRENCHMEN FOR EACH GERMAN KILLED, IS CLAIM

LONDON, March 20.—The Nazis have announced that they would shoot 10 hostages for every German soldier killed in the French provinces of Alsace and Lorraine, where sabotage and acts of violence against occupation forces were in the rise.

Swiss reports said a military court in Stras-DOBBINS - WIL- bourg had sentenced 13 Alsatians to death and 4 to prison for maintaining "United Nations connections" and plotting to overthrow the

> Radio Dakar broadcast a report that the Germans had mobilized 45,000 Frenchmen from Alsace and Lorraine and scattered them through several German regiments on the Russian front. Other Alsatians were said to have been forced into war industries in the Ruhr.

> Radio Morocco, reporting from Berne, said the patriots entrenched in the Savoy Alps still have not acceded to Vichy's demand that they lay down their arms. A great many youths, according to Morocco radio, have been arrested while attempting to join the patriots.

> German authorities have executed 300 strikers and ordered the deportation of the entire population of the city of Radom, in central Poland, the Polish government here revealed

The Polish statement said all except essential workers of the 75,000 Radom inhabitants YEAR RECEIPT were being deported. German settlers will replace them.

Polish resistance, particularly in the factory areas, was said to be increasing, with the Germans using starvation to force production. Workers who "go slow" or disobey lose the rations of their whole family.


