A RESOLUTION ORDERING AN ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS, ON THE 6TH DAY OF APRIL, 1943, FOR THE PURPOSE OF ELECTING A MAYOR AND TWO COMMISSIONERS FOR THE CITY OF CISCO.






