

rica, March 25.—The hardest fighting of the North African war is raging in the bloody breach that the British Eighth army has driven in the Mareth Line, and front reports indicated today that Marshal Erwin Rommel had been forced to split his armored forces into four units to oppose Allied columns crowding him toward The roar of big guns and the crash of bombs

from an all-out Allied aerial attack were heard along the northern end of the Mareth Line where the Germans were fighting desperately to stave off a British break through.

Meanwhile today's Allied communique reported that American patrols in south-central Tunisia carried out extensive operations and tightened the ring that is pushing the Afrika Korps eastward toward Gabes and Sfax.

Local gains in the Maknassy area enabled the Americans to push six miles east of the town and consolidate positions there.

The advance carried the U.S. troops to within less than 25 miles of the vital northsouth coastal road along which Rommel must bring supplies for his Mareth Line forces.





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
