RAF BOMBERS POUND MANNHEIM AND PILSEN

WORLD TO ROCK NEXT 60 DAYS

LONDON, April 17. — More than 600 British bombers raided the German armament centers of Mannheim and Pilsen last night in the biggest night operation of the year, the Air Ministry announced today.

Fifty-five bombers were lost in the twin raids, the largest British loss in a single night of the whole war.

"Preliminary reports indicate that both attacks were concentrated and successful," the communique said.

Striking into the heart of Germany, the main force, composed entirely of four-engined Halifax and Lancaster bombers, unloaded hundreds of tons of bombs on the sprawling Skoda works at Pilsen, one of the world's largest arms producers.

A smaller force of four-engined Stirlings and Halifaxes, with a number of twin-engined Wellingtons, simultaneously blasted Mannheim-Ludwigshafen.

(The announcement that 600 bombers participated in the two raids indicated that upwards of 1800 tons of bombs probably were dropped on the two targets. If true, the tonnage was the greatest ever dropped on Europe in a single night. Only 1500 tons of bombs were dropped during each of the three 1000-plane raids on Germany of last year.)

Hundreds of four and two-ton blockbuster demolition bombs were among the cargoes of destruction unloaded on factories turning out munitions and guns for the Axis armies in Russia, Tunis and Europe.

It was the first time the Royal Air Force has struck in such force at two widely-separated cities on a single night and served to emphasize Churchill's repeated warnings that British planes will fly over Europe in increasing numbers to pulverize and paralyze Hitler's European fortress as a prelude to an Allied invasion.

The Skoda factories cover 400 acres in Pilsen and rank with Krupps as one of the world's largest arms producers. The British bombers made a round trip of more than 1200 miles—one of the longest of the war—to bomb Pilsen, which is situated in what formerly was Czechoslovakia.

Pilsen has been raided four times previously, the last May 4, 1942.

Mannheim, second largest inland port in Europe, contains war factories of all kinds turning out tanks, motor vehicles, Diesel engines, explosives and a variety of armaments.

A German broadcast reporting that north-eastern Germany also was raided last night indicated that the Red Air Force made its fifth raid in a week on the Reich.

The loss of 55 planes exceeded the 52 which failed to return from the 1300-plane attack on Bremen, Germany's second port, last June 25.

The procession of bombers took more than an hour to pass over the southeast coast last night.

KINARD, EARLY SETTLER, WILL RAISE GARDEN

N. S. Kinard of 305 W. Sixteenth street is 74 years of age, but expects to have a first-class victory garden this year, just the same.

During a visit to the Daily Press office Saturday morning, Mr. Kinard discussed the paper with the editor. He expects to plant two acres of beans, onions, cabbage, peas, turnips, mustard, English peas, squash, carrots, radishes, cauliflower, okra, potatoes, tomatoes, lettuce, cucumbers, garlic, cauliflower.

Mr. Kinard, by the way, came to Eastland county in 1882 and lived near Romney at the time of the cyclone of April 28, 1893. There was no damage at Romney, but he and Mrs. Kinard, to whom he had just been married, saw the cyclone pass to the west of Romney. Three days later they came to Cisco, which had felt the full force of the storm.

Mr. Kinard's sisters—Mrs. T. M. Jones and Mrs. T. K. Jones—lived here then, but Mrs. Jones died here in 1905. However, Jim Jones, who lived in the Jones home, received severe head injuries last year and was pronounced a permanent invalid.

Mr. Jones was constant here for some time. He and Mrs. Jones live at Navarro, Texas.

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US. SOLDIERS DID THEIR JOB SAYS GENERAL

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, April 17.—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower disclosed Saturday that the 2nd U. S. Army Corps had captured 4,680 prisoners in recent fighting on the Tunisian front, destroyed or captured 693 Axis vehicles, destroyed or damaged 69 tanks and captured 139 guns.

At the same time he revealed that 2nd Corps casualties were 5,372 killed, wounded and missing.

"The 2nd American Corps accomplished what it set out to do, driving off the German troops from in front of the 8th Army and, when Gen. Montgomery's forces broke through, was holding against approximately 35,000 Axis troops in the El Guetar-Macknassy area," the commander declared.

NAZIS BOLSTER LINES BUT REDS STEM THE TIDE

MOSCOW, April 17.—The Germans are hurling thousands of men and hundreds of planes against Soviet forces that relentlessly crushed the Axis bridgehead in the northwest Caucasus, Russian reports said today.

In one sector alone, 6000 Germans and 50 tanks battered at the Soviet lines yesterday, the high command reported, but all attacks were thrown back with heavy enemy losses.

Axis troops in another sector dislodged the Red Army from a strategically important height, but a counter-attack restored the situation.

CITY FARMER HAS AN IDEAL PEACH ORCH'RD

J. E. Spencer of Cisco, who has 4,000 peach trees on his farm in the Romney-Long Branch community, has been busy recently planting 2,000 additional trees.

Last year's peach crop was very poor, but Mr. Spencer looks for a 50 percent crop this year, or about 2,000 bushels. Between the rows of peach trees, the Cisco man grows peanuts. Last year he marketed about 1,500 bushels of the goobers. At present he also has some 75 hogs.

There are numerous good water wells on the farm, an excellent supply of water being obtained at depths of 25 to 30 feet.

AID MACARTHUR

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Assignment of one of seven United States fleets to Australia prompted belief in Washington quarters Saturday that strong reinforcements may be sent to bolster Gen. Douglas MacArthur's campaign against the Japanese.

IN THE PACIFIC

MacARTHUR HEADQUARTERS, Australia, April 17.—The only two Japanese supply ships to escape the rain of Allied bombs than sank or damaged four other vessels in a convoy off Wewak, New Guinea, fled beyond the range of Gen Douglas MacArthur's planes today. Despite the heavy loss, however, a spokesman for MacArthur acknowledged that the convoy "possibly" succeeded in landing supplies for Japanese forces at Wewak, one of the main bases along a 2500-mile arc above Australia at which the Japanese have been reported massing strength for a new offensive.

YANK BOMBERS TAKE CHARGE RANGOON PORT

NEW DELHI, India, April 17.—Tenth United States Air Force bombardment squadrons have "practically denied" the port of Rangoon in Burma to the Japanese, Maj. Gen. Clayton L. Bissell, commander of air forces in India, said Saturday at a press conference.

He said this had been accomplished with negligible casualties, the Americans losing only four killed and nine wounded on bombing missions since last October, thanks to "protective armor and fine mechanical features" of their equipment.

Meanwhile Japanese railway supply lines were targets for bombers who struck at Mawla in Northern Burma, and for fighter planes that machine-gunned trains at low level in attacks Friday, a British communique said Saturday.

GERMAN SUBS.

HOUSTON, April 17.—Capt. Leiland P. Lovette, director of naval public relations, Washington, told members of the Gulf Coast Press association here that it is estimated the Germans have in the neighborhood of 400 to 500 submarines, of which about one-third are on patrol day and night at the crossroads of the world's sea traffic.

The Daily News which will issue its first number as soon as the new press arrives and is installed, is building up a subscription list rapidly. Porter Whaley, of Stamford, secretary of the West Texas chamber of commerce, was the first subscriber to the News. W. W. Bell was the second on the list, and Connie Davis was the third.

The funeral of Mrs. Nancy O'Neal who died Saturday night at the residence of her brother Joe Wilson, was held in the home of Rev. Holmes, pastor of Christian church, Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock and laid to rest in the Cisco cemetery. Mrs. O'Neal, "Aunt Nancy" as she is familiarly known to the older residents of Cisco, was born in Missouri June 11, 1822, died October 19, 1919, at the advanced age of 97 years, liking only three years of being a centenarian. With her husband

she came to Texas in 1844 and moved to Cisco when it was just developing into a little town with a few houses and many tents. They were active in the growth of the town and the development of the frontier country. Her husband has long since passed to his reward. She has since made her home with her mother, and has been an invalid for 20 years. Everything has been done for her comfort by those loved ones and she will be greatly missed.

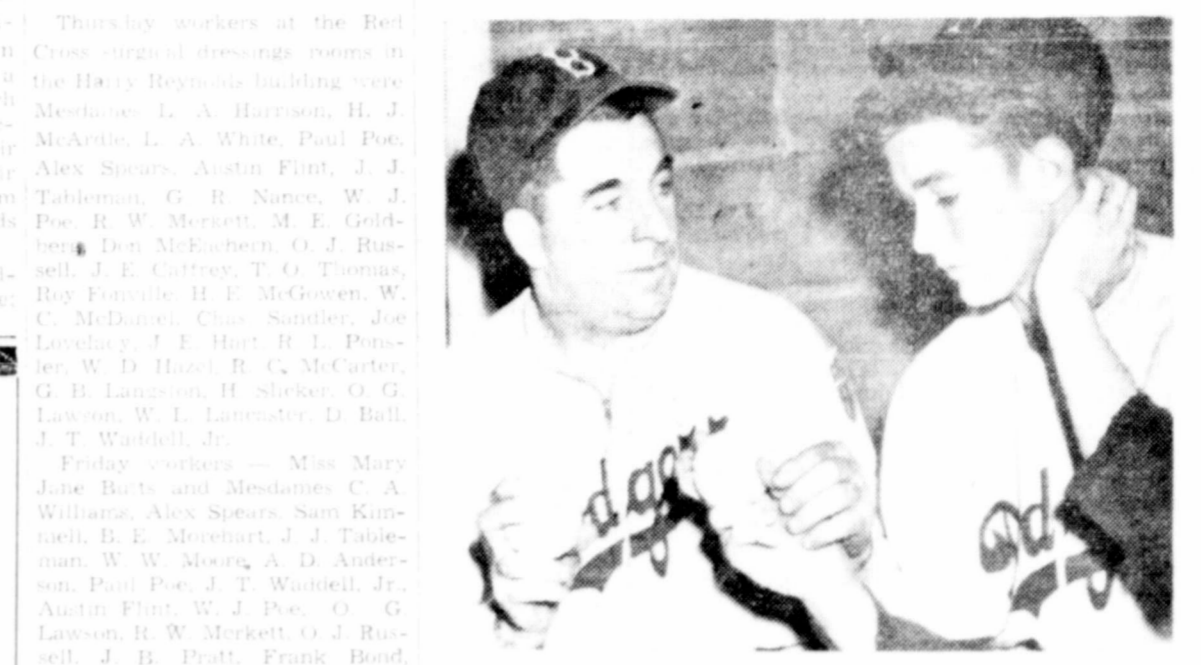

STEAKS, CHOPS AND ROASTS keep best of all meats. May be kept up to three days just below or alongside freezer. When buying roasts for later use, choose them well-covered with fat.

GROUND MEAT is highly perishable and should be cooked within 24 hours after purchase. When you wish to keep it for several days, freeze it as soon as you get it home.

POULTRY, unlike meat, should be cleaned and washed before refrigeration. Whole birds keep better than disjointed birds. Cut up birds just before using. Freeze chicken like meats.

VARIETY MEATS, such as liver, kidneys, hearts, sweetbreads and brains are very perishable. Cook them within 24 hours after purchase, or freeze them as soon as you get them home.

COOKED MEATS should be covered to prevent drying. Never cut or grind left-over meat until just before using. Caution: After 24 hours, heat left-over meats thoroughly before using.

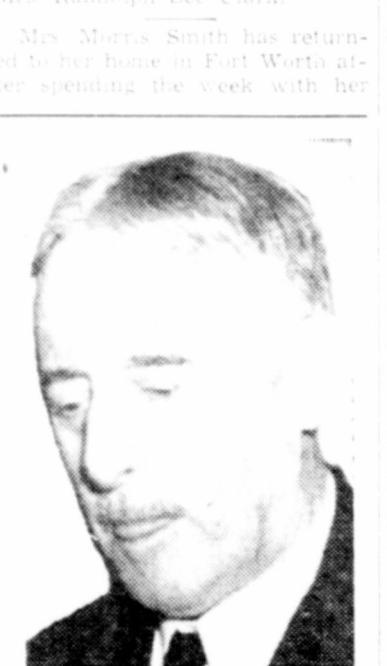
