ALLIES BREAK ROMMEL SUPPLY LINE TO TUNIS

SHOCKLEY NEW HEAD OF CISCO ROTARY CLUB

AUSTIN, April 23.—The senate late yesterday passed a substitute for the house bill that proposed removal of the ceiling on old-age pensions, the senate measure retaining the ceiling but increasing it to \$100,000 a year from the present limit of \$7,500. The bill will increase old-age assistance by \$1,800,000 a year, but nearly wipes out the economies already effected by this session, which are only a few days ago were \$3,000,000 under appropriations of two years ago. Vote on the bill was 22-2.

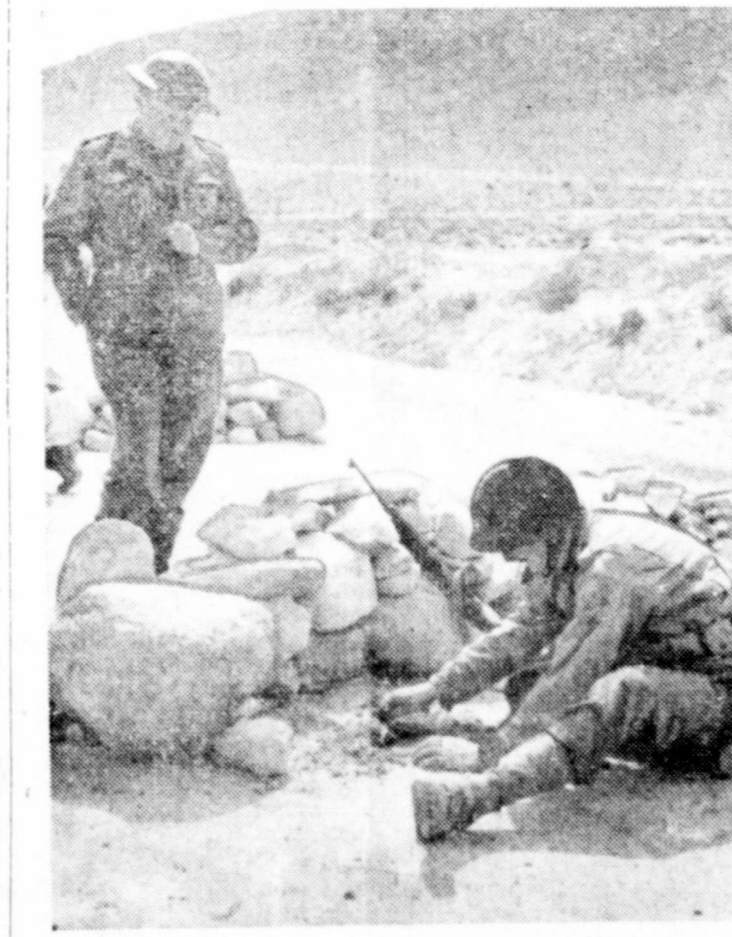
CHRISTIAN DENOMINATION IN STATE MEETING

FOOD MEET RUMOR IS HARMFUL

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Reports are current in international circles here that the food conference at Hot Springs will discuss more important business than something to eat, vital though that subject is.

Coming as it does on top of publication of the rival British and American plans to stabilize currency, plus the fact that several financial authorities—among them the Czech minister of finance—will attend many believe the conference will touch post-war financial matters of worldwide importance.

True or not, the report is arousing uneasiness among the uninvited nations, thus demonstrating from another angle the folly of too much secrecy about an international gathering of such magnitude.

The mere fact that reporters are to be barred from the hotel housing the conference, not to mention the 17,000-acre park surrounding it, has given rise to suspicions in foreign circles which, whether justified or not, are harmful.

20 SIX-ENGINE AXIS TRANSPORTS ENROUTE TUNIS WITH MEN, SUPPLIES, SHOT DOWN

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, N. A., April 23.—Allied fighter planes have shot down 38 more Axis aircraft including an entire formation of 20 six-engine Axis air transports en route to Tunisia, it was disclosed today, spilling enemy supplies and soldiers into the Mediterranean Sea.

The new aerial victory over the Gulf of Tunis boosted the five-day toll of enemy airplanes to 203.

The British First Army started a new offensive operation on the Axis flank by driving eastward several miles on a nine-mile front around Bou Arda, south of Medjez-El-Bab, and capturing all initial objectives in a range of hills about 44 miles southwest of Tunis.

On the southern front five miles north of Enfidaville and 45 miles south of Tunis, the British Eighth Army turned back new counter-attacks by Nazi Marshal Erwin Rommel and held all gains in the coastal hills.

(The Italian Radio acknowledged Allied offensives in Tunisia but the Germans claimed that attacks by superior numbers of Allied troops had been "frustrated" on the Enfidaville front).

The air victory over the Gulf of Tunis, where not a single enemy transport escaped, was scored by Spitfires and Kittyhawk fighters, which also downed 10 enemy escort planes of which nine were Messerschmitt 190's. (A Cairo message said that 21 giant Messerschmitt No. 323 transports were shot down in the battle, but only 20 were announced at North Africa headquarters).

The big planes, lumbering southward to Tunis, were seen to crash after being attacked by the Allied fighter pilots, who said that they saw dozens of soldiers tumble into the water. This was regarded as definite proof that Rommel still was rushing reinforcements as well as supplies to his hard-pressed Tunisian armies. It was believed that some personnel, not needed in the final siege battle, had been evacuated from Tunisia earlier.

Pilots said that the ME-323 transports also appeared to be carrying gasoline which is needed by Rommel's tanks. Each of the ME-323's can carry 120 to 140 fully equipped soldiers and 14 tons of supplies.

Although the smashing of the air transports was the most spectacular development disclosed in today's news from headquarters of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, there were important developments in the land battles now raging along both the southern and western fronts enclosing the northeastern Tunisia coffin corner. It also was disclosed that the Axis lost 33 (instead of 27) tanks and many men in the Medjez El Bab sector Tuesday night.

TWO SOLDIERS KILLED. CAMP BARKELEY, April 23.—Two soldiers were killed and 13 others injured today about 3 a. m. when a privately owned auto, driven by a soldier, mowed down a column of marching men. The accident occurred on Highway 158 southwest of Abilene. The soldiers were on an overnight hike. Names of the dead will not be given until next of kin have been advised.

Leading German papers stated yesterday that the executions followed "fair and impartial trials" before Japanese court martial.

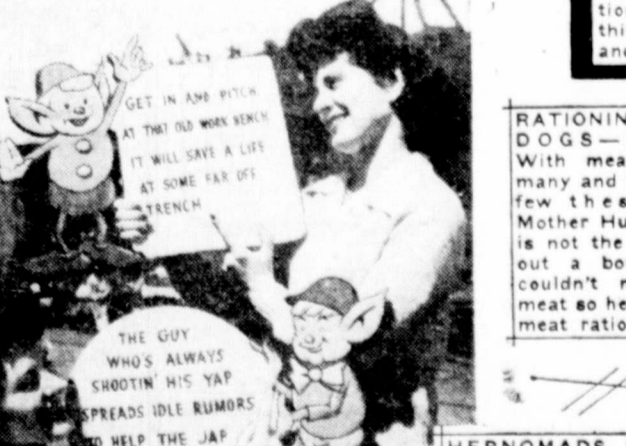

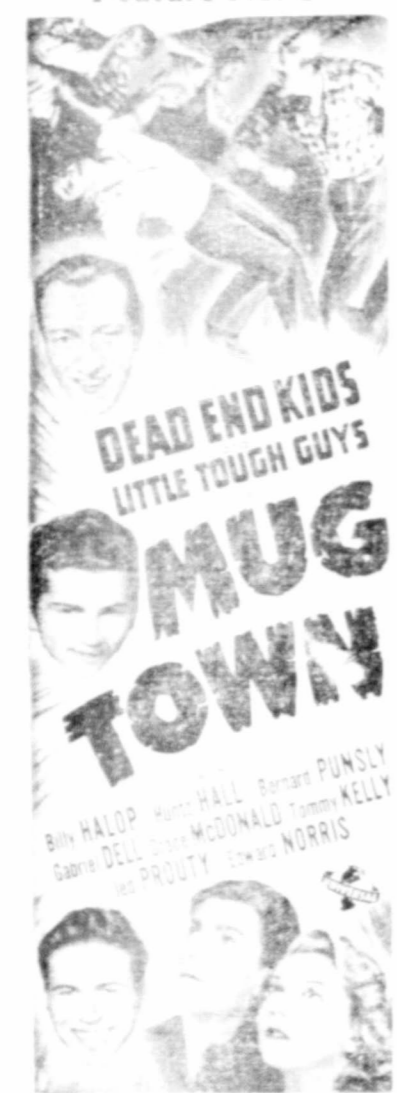
