## NAZIS PUSH BRITISH BACK; LOSSES HEAVY

### CISCOAN ATTENDED S. S. BOARD A BUSY UNDER GUARD ORGANIZATION

A. D. Anderson is back in his office at the A. G. Motor company after an absence of about 15 days in Adelaide, where he was foreman of the federal jury in a case relating to misuse of funds in the building of Avenger airport, Sweetwater.

Mr. Anderson said he didn't know how many changes could take place in so short a time. When he began the jury service, the members were just budding out and when he arrives back home he finds everything in full leaf.

The jury, which consisted of the usual 12 men and a 13th man for a spare, which they really used when one of the jurors became sick, was closely guarded all during the time, but was allowed to attend Sunday school in a body, in company with two U. S. marshals.

It was a valuable experience, Anderson said, to hear all the specifications of the case, but it would have been much more enjoyable could he have been able to see his home now and then and talk with his family, and know how business was getting along.

### STATE MEDICAL BOARD A BUSY ORGANIZATION

Dr. G. M. Stephenson, member of the state medical board, has returned from Dallas, where he attended the reorganization meeting of the board. Including the Cisco man, four new members were added to the board as successors to four whose terms had expired.

This organization, composed of 12 members, all of whom are nominated by the governor of Texas and then elected by the Texas senate, is composed of representatives of the various branches of medicine and is a very industrious body of men. While the board meets only at intervals, three secretaries are furnished full-time employment at Dallas headquarters.

Dr. Stephenson, who received a warm welcome by the eight board members, was much impressed with the businesslike methods of the organization, as well as the volume of work handled by it. Composed of such outstanding physicians as Dr. Will Watts of Austin, Dr. Bowen of Marlin and Dr. Connally of Waco, the state medical board of Texas serves ably and well and stands high in the medical circles of the nation. Dr. Brown of Mexia is the new president.

The next meeting of the board will be held the first Monday in June, when it will assemble in Dallas to examine medical graduates of Baylor College. Then, in late July or early August, the board will travel to Galveston for the convening of graduates from the Galveston medical school. Out-of-state applicants may appear before the examiners at either of these sessions.

Before war restrictions on travel, board meetings were always held in Austin.

### RED CROSS NEEDS KNITTERS, NOW

Mr. W. W. Wallace, co-chairman of the Eastland County Red Cross, says a shipment of wool yarn has just been received and that knitters are needed. Sixty garments, including turtle neck sweaters, sleeveless sweaters, gloves, helmets, mufflers and scarves must be ready for shipment by June 1.

The Red Cross work room at 409 W. Ninth street will be open Friday afternoon to hand out yarn to knitters willing to help make these articles.

Those unable to call for the yarn may call Mrs. Wallace at phone 435 or Mrs. J. E. Walter at 141 and the material will be delivered to them.

### LEGION HEAD DAMNS LEWIS AS TRAITOR

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 29.—Roone Waring, national commander of the American Legion, said John L. Lewis' order for a coal walkout is treason.

"There is no other word for it—it is treason, and by the eternal God it should be treated as treason," he said. "It is a stab in the back of the Americans fighting the war."

"The time has come in this America of ours when such action should be taken—no matter how drastic—to eliminate this Lewis, and everything he stands for, from public life. Until that is done we are not keeping faith with the American fighting man and we are not going to win this war."

### DIVINE INTERFERENCE.

The stirring messages of Rev. J. L. Knight at the Church of the Nazarene are drawing good audiences each morning and night. Wednesday night his topic was "Divine Interference," Luke xii. He stressed the words, "but God," and placed emphasis on the possessive "I" with reference to the Holy man. The speaker said God often interferes in the life of an individual, but that so many times it is too late, due to the individual's procrastination. These meetings will close with the Sunday night services.

### MARTIAL LAW IN U. S. COAL FIELDS LIKELY

WASHINGTON, April 29.—President Roosevelt is expected to proclaim martial law in the nation's coal fields unless John L. Lewis capitulates in his wage fight with mine operators and halts spreading "silent strikes" now threatening to strangle both wartime coal and munitions production.

Further, unless Lewis backs down or accepts a truce, Roosevelt was believed prepared to appeal to rank and file members of the United Mine Workers Union to repudiate the leadership of Lewis and return to the coal pits under full protection of army troops.

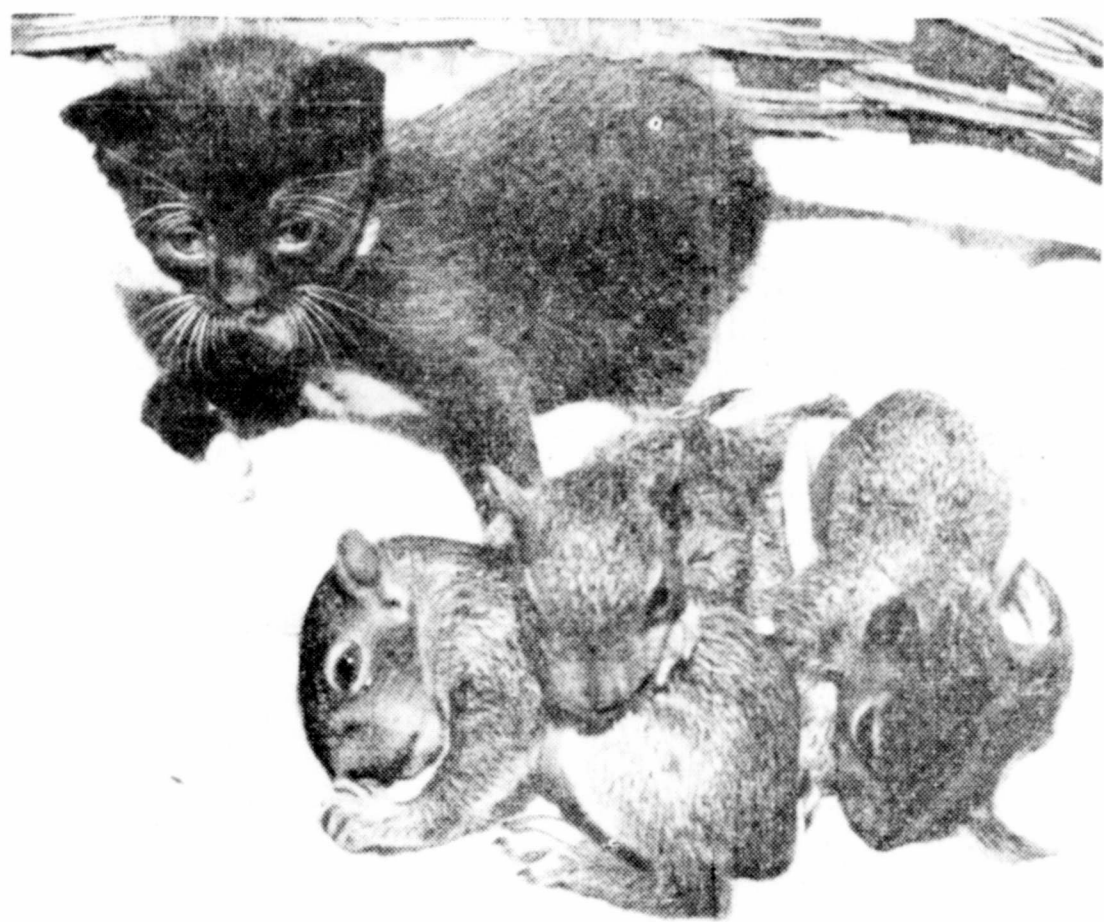
### REDS DESTROY 43 AIRPLANES IN 24 HOURS

MOSCOW, April 29.—Red Air Force planes set six large fires on an airfield and with Soviet gunners destroyed 43 enemy planes in the past 24 hours in an intensified offensive to wear down Nazi air power, the Russian high command announced today.

Russian bombers fired hangars and other installations at an airfield south of Balakleya in the Ukraine in a night raid, the Soviet midday report said.

Stormovik assault planes in a day light attack on an airfield in the same area yesterday destroyed 15 planes on the ground and shot down two others in combat.

### ROTARY HEARS REPORTS OF DISTRICT MEET

Today's Rotary program consisted in reports by those who attended from Cisco on the various phases of the program of the district conference in Adelaide last Sunday and Monday. Visitors present today were Max Bentley of the West Texas chapter of commerce; T. J. McCarty, superintendent of districts A and B of West Texas Utilities Co., also of Adelaide, and P. R. Warsaw, of the local chamber of commerce.

Lonnie Shockley introduced the program and gave some features of the conference. J. E. Hays came next with interesting reports on the Sunday evening and Monday morning features.

Ernest Hittson said he was embarrassed when the first thing they gave him after registering was a cane. He looked about to see any of his Lion friends were near, to comment on the appropriateness of the gift to a Rotarian. He also quoted one of the speakers in saying that it was a good thing for the man when he got into the Rotary club, but when Rotarianism got into a man it was a fine thing for his community.

Dr. Gary L. Smith, commenting on humorous remarks by members, said he was sure they were all sober, because on Monday morning everything was working smoothly. He commented at length on the fine points brought out by various club speakers and reports. Quoting, he said that community service was the visible results of Rotarianism. He mentioned problems of clubs that were brought out and said he found all clubs had these problems, that some solved them, while others let them more or less drift. ### AUTO TAX TO APRIL 18 IS \$82,501.70

Auto tax collected in Eastland county up to April 18 totaled \$82,501.70, according to a statement from the office of Clyde Karkalits, tax collector-assessor, today.

Of the above amount \$66,250.85 will be retained by Eastland county.

The latter sum is about \$1,274.92 less than the county's portion of the auto tax last year.

### JAPS EMULATE NAZIS' WHOLESALE MURDER

SAN FRANCISCO, April 29.—Japanese troops, emulating the Germans in the massacre of Lidice, slaughtered every resident to "the last harmless child," in Chinese coastal areas where many of Maj. Gen. James Doolittle's fliers landed after bombing Tokyo, Secretary of Treasury Henry Morgenthau said last night.

Morgenthau was notified of the slaughter by Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek of China in a cablegram arriving yesterday. He made it public in an address at the War Memorial Opera House.

### ALLIED BOMBERS STEP UP ATTACKS ON SICILIAN STRAITS SHIPPING; SINK SIX VESSELS

NORTH AFRICA, April 29.—British forces neared the rim of the Tunis plains in advances yesterday, but were thrown back slightly by the second of two heavy German counter-attacks, while American infantry gained important ground within 10 miles of Mateur, a communique announced today.

The Germans achieved limited successes after losing heavily in men and tanks in their first counter-attack against newly-won British positions northeast of Medjez El Bab, presumably in the Djebel Bou Aoukaz area, 21 miles west of Tunis. Djebel Bou Aoukaz is the last important hill west of the Tunis plain in this sector.

(A German communique broadcast by Radio Berlin said that the Germans beat back an enemy tank formation which penetrated their positions northeast of Medjez El Bab.)

Allied bombers and fight-bombers stepped up their attacks on enemy shipping in the Sicilian Straits and the Gulf of Tunis, sinking or damaging six vessels engaged in ferrying supplies and reinforcements to the shrinking Axis bridgehead.

Other planes bombed and strafed enemy positions and transport, starting fires and wrecking vehicles. Altogether, 18 enemy planes were shot down yesterday and the previous night, while Allied losses totaled only two aircraft.

(American heavy bombers from the Middle-Eastern Command attacked the harbor at Messina, Sicily, and the docks at Naples in daylight yesterday, a Cairo communique announced. Hits were scored on the ferry terminus installations and fires started in railway yards at Messina. Four enemy fighters were destroyed and one American bomber was lost.)

The communique gave no details of the American advance in northern Tunisia, other than that it carried into "some important ground." Front dispatches said the Americans were nearing the end of the stubbornly-held hills below Mateur and approaching flatter ground where more diversified types of attacks will be possible.

Another American column to the northwest has reached a point only six miles from Lake Garaet Achket southwest of Bizerte after capturing Djebel Dardyse.

French forces in the coastal sector at last reports were four miles from Lake Garaet Achket and 20 to 22 miles from Bizerte.

Other French troops hammering at the southwestern corner of the Axis bridgehead were nearing the edge of the Tunis plain. Further local gains were registered yesterday after Goumiers—native troops—had cut across the Pont Du Fahs-Enfidaville road southeast of Mt. Zaghouan on a wide front.

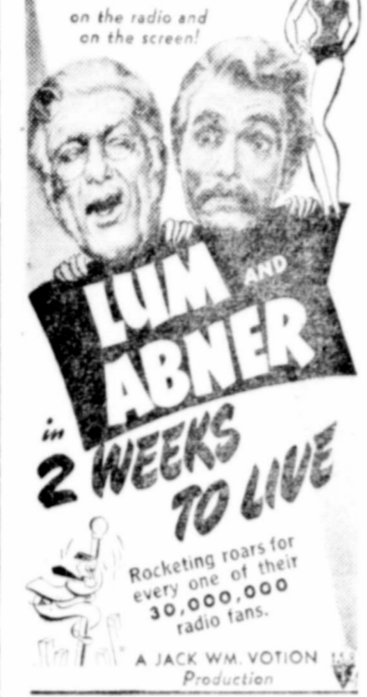
INITIATION HELD AT CHAPTER MEETING.

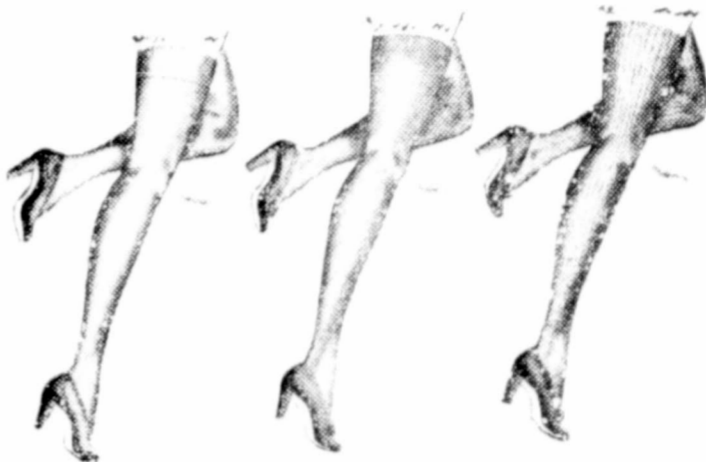

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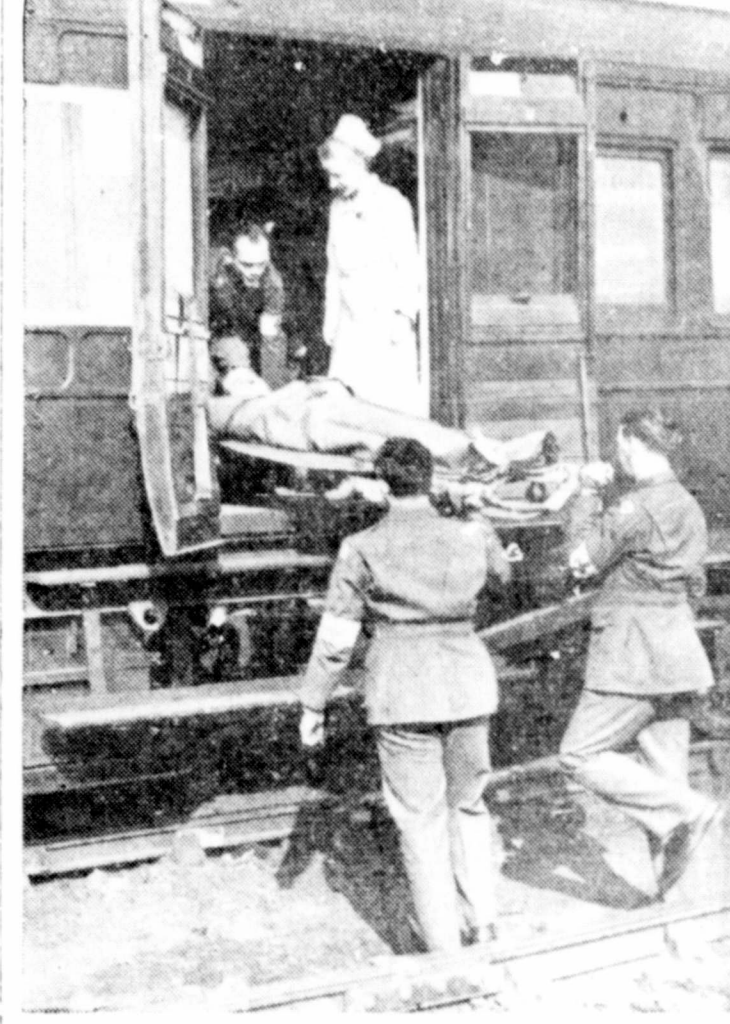
