AIRPOWER BRITISH LOST 43 PLANES IN GREATEST RAID EVER HURLED AT A. HITLER'S ARMED FORTS

British heavy bombers ever hurled against Adolf Hitler's European fortress smashed vital war targets in Dusseldorf and Munster and blazed a path of fiery destruction through Germany's Ruhr and Rhineland. Forty-three bombers were lost in the terrific assault, which followed by less than 12 hours a double-barreled American daylight

> of Wilhelmshaven and Cuxhaven. Refreshed by a 12-night lull in the Bomber Command's pre-invasion offensive, huge formations of RAF four-engined bombers loosed their main attack on the arms center and inland port of Dusseldorf while a smaller force attacked Munster.

A highly concentrated attack was crowded into one hour over Dusseldorf and preliminary reports told of great damage to the city, site of the huge Rhein metal, iron and steel works and other key war factories, the Air Ministry announced.

"Great results" also were reported from the raid on Munster, the Ministry said. Other targets also were blasted in the Ruhr and Rhineland industrial areas, but no details were given.

British Intruder patrols also were out over France during the night and one enemy aircraft was destroyed over Holland.

The Air Ministry described the bomber force engaged in last night's raid as of "very great strength."

The bombers ran into strong anti-aircraft defenses over Dusseldorf at the start of the raid, but the weight of the attack saturated the gun batteries and searchlight posts.




