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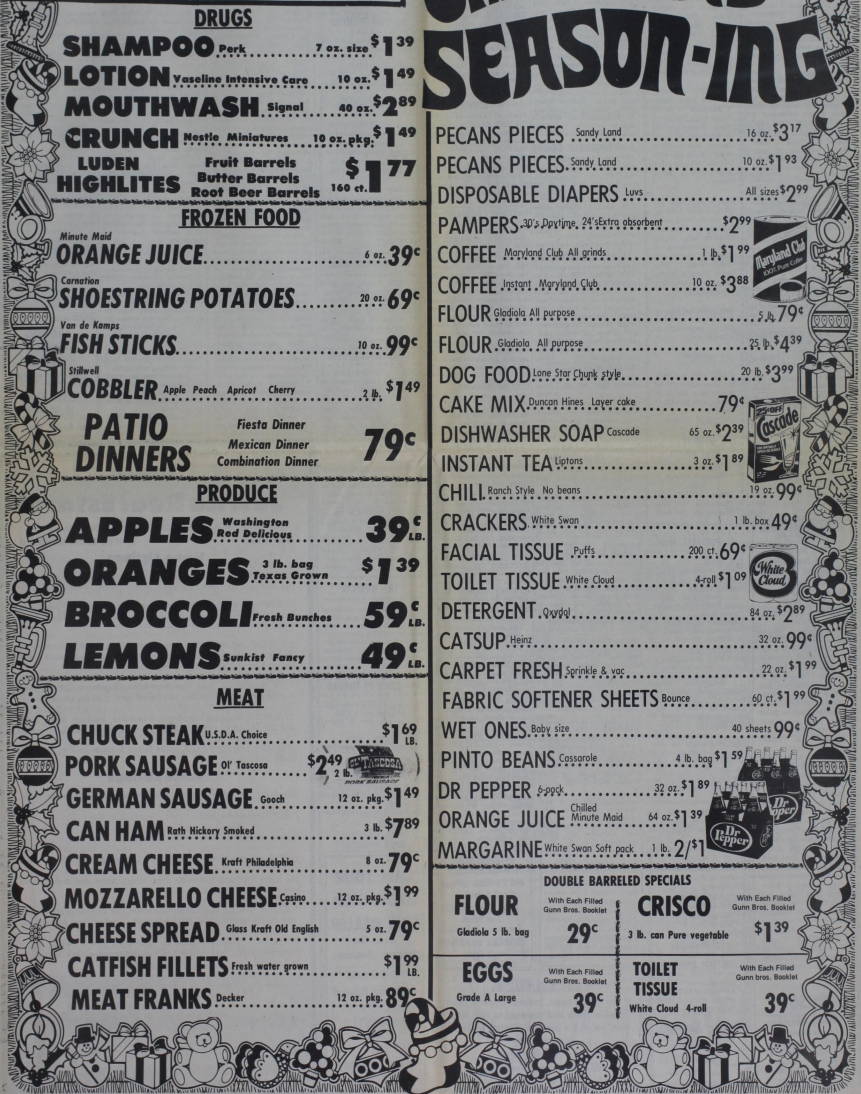

Now you can buy Christmas trees grown in Texas

Don't just buy any Christmas tree this year — buy a Texas-grown Christmas tree.

"While the supply of Texas Christmas trees is still short, more and more of them are coming on the market," points out James W. Chandler of Overton, area forester with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Some 30,000 should be ready for market this year."

"There are some 225 Christmas tree growers in Texas at present with about 1,350 acres in production. At 900 to 1,000 trees per acre, that's more than a million trees," he says.

Most trees are being grown in East Texas and are Virginia pines, notes Chandler. A few tree farms are also being established in central and western areas with the variety "Pinus eldarica," which is more tempered to drought conditions.

According to the forester, many trees were lost to drought this past summer, even where intensive management was carried out.

"Christmas tree plantations need plenty of care and management," emphasizes Chandler. "Trees usually reach market size in three to five years and may be sold wholesale to civic groups and other retail outlets or on a choose-and-cut basis."

Texas-grown Christmas trees offer a lot of advantages over those shipped in from the Great Lake States and the Pacific Northwest, says the forester. These advantages are mainly freshness, fragrance and novelty. Most trees shipped to Texas have to be cut about two months earlier while Texas trees can be cut only a short time before being offered for sale.

"Some five million Christmas trees are sold in Texas each year," says Chandler. "This represents more than \$50 million in sales. As Texas production increases, Texas-grown trees will take a larger portion of these sales."

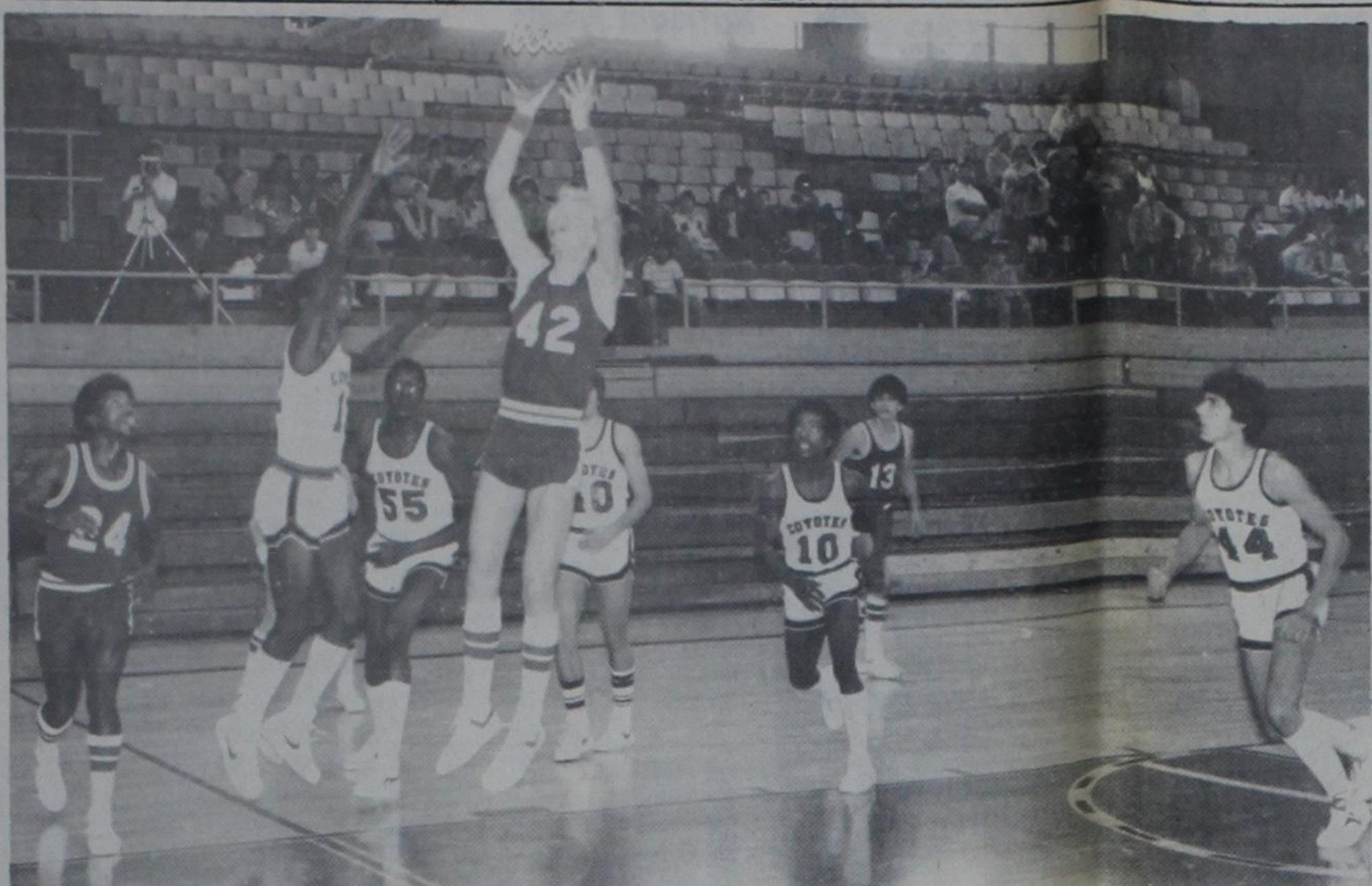

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How about those Bobbies?

You may have had your doubts about the Dimmitt Bobbies' chances as they went into the tough Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce Invitational Tournament last Thursday.

After all, they had drawn for a first-round opponent Amarillo Tascosa, which had just handed Lubbock Monterey, defending Class AAAAA regional champion, its first defeat of the year.

And Dimmitt was the

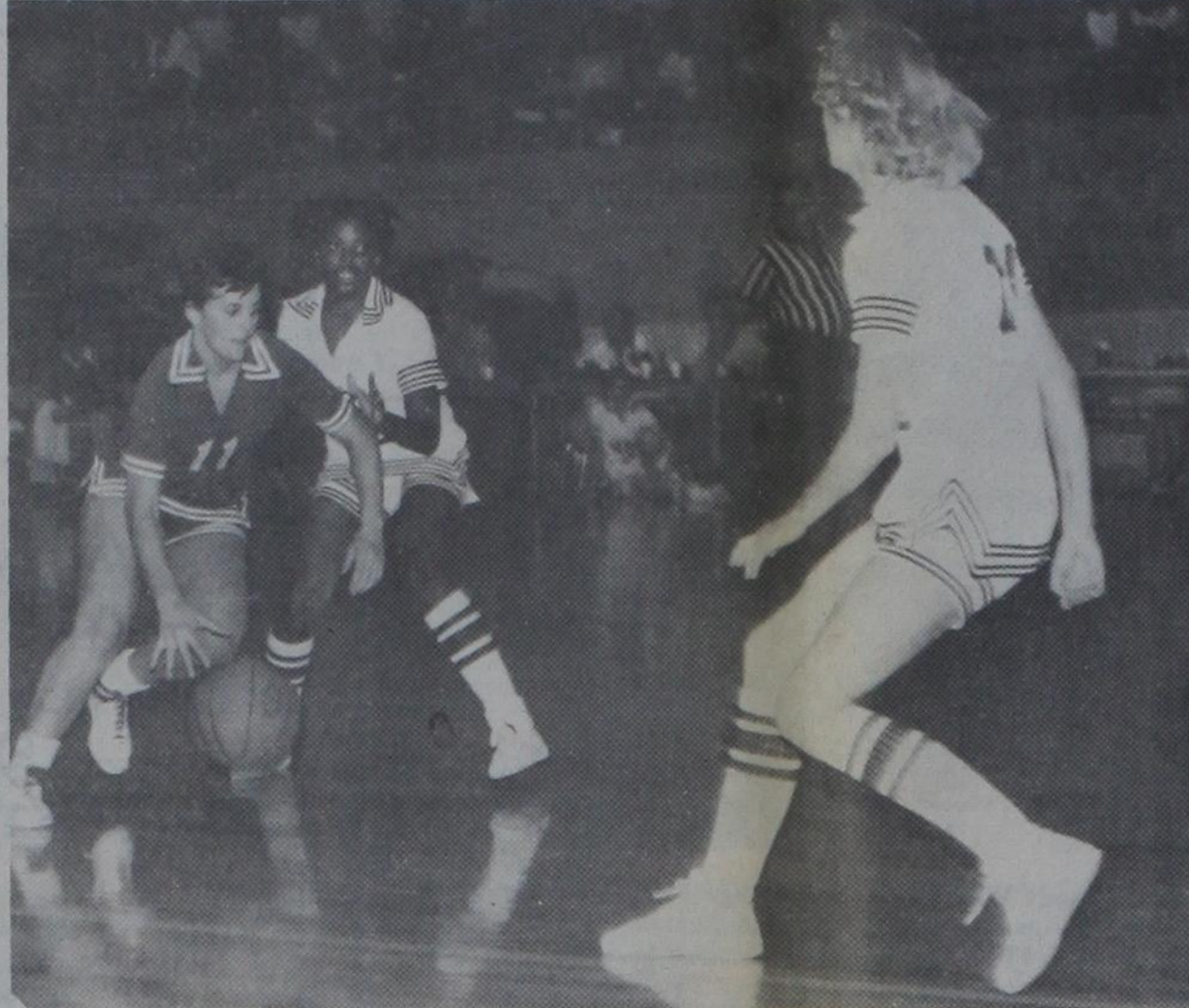
smallest school in the tournament. Every other team there had one or two more A's — Estacado, Pampa, Dunbar, Borger, El Paso Jefferson, Hereford.

But the Bobbies evidently weren't intimidated by size or press clippings. They raced through the tourney like a bunch of gazelles, and came within a basket of capturing the championship trophy.

The Bobbies proved they are definitely "coming around," as Coach Jimmy Hoyle puts it, when they blasted Tascosa 65-53 in the opening round. In the semifinals Friday they scored an equally impressive 56-46 victory over Lubbock Estacado.

And they turned the championship game Saturday night into the most exciting bout of the tourney before losing a 48-46 squeaker to Hereford, in a game that could have gone either way right down to the final seconds.

"Our girls really didn't know what to expect" against Tascosa in the opening round, Hoyle said. "We were

and layup that gave Dimmitt a 42-38 lead midway in the fourth quarter. But the Whitefaces came back in the final minutes to capture a 48-46 victory in the tournament's most exciting finish.

probably a little nervous; we let them go to the foul line early and they got 11 free throws in the first half."

Those charity shots helped the Rebels erase a big 23-15 lead which the Bobbies had earned in the first period, and knotted the score at 35-35 by halftime.

"But we settled down, and our defense was a lot better in the second half," Hoyle commented. "Our rebounding in the second half was a big factor."

"Also, we had a good shooting day," he commented. Dimmitt went 29/58 in field shots for 50% and 7/13 in free throws for 54%.

The Bobbies regained control of the game in the second half by topping

Tascosa 14-10 in the third and 16-8 in the fourth.

"Cris Salinas had a good game," Hoyle noted. "She hit several key baskets for us."

Salinas notched 14 points, while Becky Andrews led the scoring with 20 and Beth Benton netted 16.

The Bobbies displayed good teamwork in their victory as Salinas and Cindy Sageser earned nine credits each, Pam Nelson eight, Andrews seven and Jackie Anthony six.

Meanwhile, the tall Estacado Matadors had stomped Pampa 60-40 to earn a shot at the Bobbies in the semifinals.

Against Estacado, the Bobbies simply outran, outjumped and outgunned a taller team. But mainly, they outdefended the Matadors.

Hoyle was tickled pink about his girls' rebounding.

"That was the unique thing about this game, and probably the key factor," he said. "We were really outsized, but our girls rebounded them. I think the 44 rebounds we got was a high for us so far this season. We've been trying to emphasize how important rebounds are."

The Bobbies established a 10-9 lead in the first quarter, then pulled steadily away from the Mats, leading by 25-21 at halftime and by 40-31 after three.

"Estacado has some real talent, and I was pleased that our girls won," Hoyle said after the Bobbies' 56-46 victory.

Becky Andrews was the top rebounder with 14, and also led in scoring with 18 points. Pam Nelson accounted for 14 points and picked off four rebounds. Beth Benton came down with nine rebounds, while Jackie Anthony and Cris Salinas got five each. Floor leaders were Benton with nine credits, Salinas and Cindy Sageser with seven each and Sonya Andrews with six.

The title game Saturday night was close throughout, with the Bobbies trailing all the way until they decided to go for it in the fourth quarter.

Behind by eight points (26-34) going into the final frame, the Bobbies launched an offensive attack that chipped Hereford's lead to two points, then Becky Andrews notched a pair of free throws to tie the score at 36-all. Dimmitt went ahead on a Jackie Anthony layup, then Cindy Sageser pulled a steal and layup to give the Bobbies a 42-38 lead midway in the quarter.

The Bobbies started playing for safe shots, and Hereford responded by double-teaming the ball. The play worked as the Whitefaces intercepted and scored on a fast break to tie it at 44-44 with 1:30 left.

The final, furious 90 seconds — interrupted by several time-outs — ended with Hereford stalling and drawing fouls to protect a two-point lead.

"I think we missed some key opportunities early that could have made a big difference," Hoyle commented. "At the last, when we made a run at them, the kids started playing on emotion and got the old adrenalin going — and they

SHINY METAL cake pans give more even browning and heat distribution, says Rose Tinnal Postel, a foods and nutrition specialist. When using heat-proof glass pans, reduce the suggested oven temperature by 25 degrees, she adds.

High Plains UWC District to hold county election

Castro County residents within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District's service area will go to the polls Jan. 17 to elect four representatives, including a district director for Precinct 3 (in Bailey, Castro and Farmer Counties) and three Castro County committeemen.

Castro County's secretary, Garnett Holland, is now

accepting application-affidavits from candidates who are eligible to serve as district committeemen.

Any individual who is 18 years of age and who has resided within the district's election boundaries for six months preceding the Jan. 17, 1981 election date, is eligible to serve.

Any interested candidate must sign an application-affidavit by Dec. 28 to have his or her name placed on the ballot. Affidavits received by Dec. 11 will be presented at the December board of directors meeting, and these qualified applicant's names will be included in the legal notice to be published prior to the election.

Candidates are encouraged to submit their application-affidavits soon. Forms are available at the Castro County secretary's office, city hall in Dimmitt.

A committeeman may serve two consecutive four-year terms under the by-laws of the district. Directors are not restricted in the number of terms they may serve.

Three Castro County committeemen's terms expire in January. Men currently serving in those positions are Jackie Clark, elected to his first term in 1973 and again in 1977; and Frank Wise and W. A. Baldrige, all of Dimmitt. Wise and Baldrige are eligible for re-election, but Clark is not.

Two additional Castro County committeemen whose current terms will expire in 1983 are George Elder and Floyd Schulte, also of Dimmitt.

District Director A. W. "Webb" Gober of Farwell is currently serving as a member of the board. He was elected to his first term in 1973 and is eligible for re-election.
