Mr. Frank Lienen, Sr., 58 years old, died Thursday of a heart attack at 1 o'clock at the home of Mr. Ed Drerup. Mr. Lienen has been in poor health for nearly a year.

Funeral services were held at 9 a. m. on Saturday, June 5, in the Holy Family Catholic Church at Nazareth. Burial was in the Nazareth cemetery.

Mr. Lienen is survived by two sons, Robert Lienen of Dimmitt, and Frank Lienen, Jr., of Nazareth and five grandchildren.

Frank Lienen was born November 2, 1890 at Crownpoint, Indiana and was reared in that area. He came to Texas in 1906. He was married March 21, 1910 to Agnes Huseman at the Holy Family Church in Nazareth. Mr. and Mrs. Lienen moved to Indiana after their marriage and lived there until 1932.

The couple was then blessed with the arrival of four children, two boys and two girls, two of whom survive.

The Castro County farmer was a member of the Holy Family Church of Nazareth, a Forrester of Court No. 999 of Indiana, and a member of the St. Joseph's Society of Nazareth. He was always active in anything for the benefit of his community and country.

## WEST TEXAS GAS CO. ASSURES CONSUMERS SUFFICIENT GAS SUPPLY

An announcement of personal interest of every user of natural gas throughout the area served by West Texas Gas Company, has just been made by R. F. Hincey, Lubbock, president of the company.

Hincey disclosed that his company has entered into an agreement with the El Paso Natural Gas Company to purchase natural gas from that company at two points in west Texas. This new supply of gas, he said, should be available before next winter and will enable West Texas Gas Company to meet winter peak-day needs of its customers throughout the area.

After these two connections are made, West Texas Gas Company will be drawing gas from five sources of supply. Multiple sources of supply of course minimize the incidence of temporary gas shortages which may occur when pipe lines break or when there is mechanical failure of compressor station engines.

El Paso Natural Gas Company last year built a gas transmission line from Eunice, New Mexico, to California, and this year is extending a 24-inch line from Eunice northeastward to the Panhandle Gas Field. This new extension crosses West Texas Gas Company's transmission lines at two points; between Amherst and Sudan, and between Hereford and Umbarger. It is at these two points of intersection that natural gas will be purchased by West Texas Gas Company and fed into its transmission network. The gas so purchased will be natural gas from the Panhandle Gas Field and is expected to be available by November 1, subject to coal or steel strikes or other events which might delay completion of El Paso's Natural's line.

"There still remain some few local bottlenecks," the gas company president said, "because the towns have grown so rapidly that some sections of transmission line have become too small to handle the greatly increased demands. We are intensifying our efforts to iron out these local deficiencies. We believe all will be taken care of one way or another before snow flies. If it's humanly possible, we'll certainly do it, because we sincerely want to take care of the needs of our territory."

The gas company is operating, Hincey explained, under a long-range expansion program calling for the installation of added facilities year by year as needs are anticipated. This program, he said, has been accelerated due to the demonstrated inadequacy of transmission facilities under the severe weather conditions of last winter. This inadequacy of transmission facilities from the gas fields, of course, is now overcome by the signing of the agreement with El Paso Natural Gas Company.

"Facilities to be added in the immediate future," Hincey said, "will include enlargements to several compressor stations, replacement of sections of the transmission lines with larger-sized pipe, and constant extensions to and modernization of the distributing plants."

The toughest obstacle to be overcome by the gas company's organization at this time is the obtaining of sufficient steel pipe, even at premium prices. Hincey said, however, that his people are combing the markets throughout the Southwest and almost daily are buying pipe at widely scattered points. These purchases consist mostly of small stocks of assorted sizes, but occasionally a really substantial purchase is made. For instance, a company crew is now at Camp Bowie removing some 45,000 feet of pipe purchased there from War Assets Administration. Sufficient progress has been made in this manner that company officials are encouraged to believe enough pipe will be secured to extend service this year to a great many new customers who want gas service, and to remedy the bottlenecks mentioned.

**How to Save Gas**



A well-tuned engine and proper driving methods resulted in gasoline savings up to 70%, tests recently conducted by Plymouth Motor Corp. at Detroit showed. The testing team above checks recording equipment and notes results of the unusual experiment.

**Driver Tests Show Conservation Easy**

How to conserve precious gasoline and save money was recently demonstrated at Detroit when results of engineering tests showed savings as high as 70% possible through proper engine tune-up coordinated with correct driving techniques.

The tests were conducted by the Chrysler Engineering division at the instigation of W. B. Rice, director of service for the Plymouth division. They were made by technical experts with a 1948 Plymouth special deluxe sedan equipped with recording and measuring devices including a "fifth wheel" electric speedometer, gasometer, vacuum gauge, odometers, and batteries of stop watches.

No "trick" gasoline saving devices or special fuels were used. The secret of the savings obtained lay in (1) proper spring tune-up of the car, including ignition, carburation, cooling system, oil change and chassis lubrication, and steering and brake adjustments, and (2) employment of proper driving techniques in handling foot throttle and brakes.

A basic gas saving up to 10% may be secured by giving an out-of-tune car the approved dealer's spring tune-up, the tests showed. Past that point the driver himself holds the whip hand in achieving phenomenal gas savings.

The first test run was over a ten mile course in a section of Detroit where stop lights and stop signs were numerous. Here, reasonably moderate acceleration and braking showed a 60% greater gasoline mileage over the "quick stop and start artist."

Surprisingly, the safe driver who saved so much gas, arrived at the finish of the ten mile course only one and one-half minutes later than the "hurryup" man, made 50 percent fewer stops and spent 51% less of his time at those stops. He averaged only two per-cent slower speed and two per-cent greater elapsed time.

In a test run over the 165 mile highway from Detroit to Lansing, Michigan, the safe driver achieved a 50% saving in gasoline on the trip. The surprising difference in gas economy was achieved by maintaining a normal speed of 50 m.p.h. on open highway as against one of 70 m.p.h.

Added to the advantages of conserving the nation's fuel supply for next winter's heating use and the saving in money accruing to the individual is the fact that safety statistics prove the "moderate" driver involved in fewer and less serious accidents than the speed-seeker, Rice pointed out.

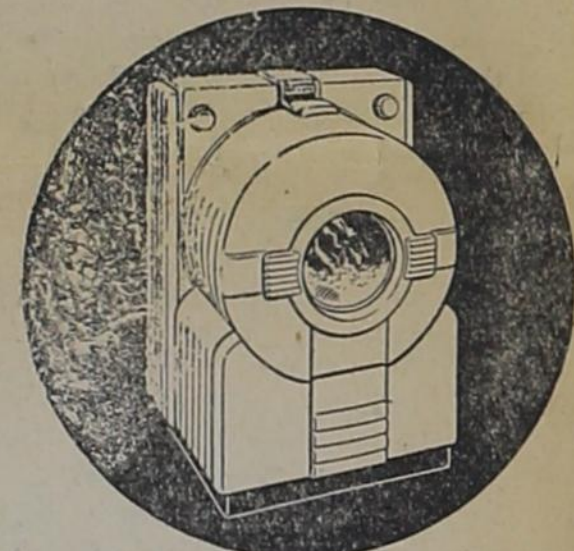

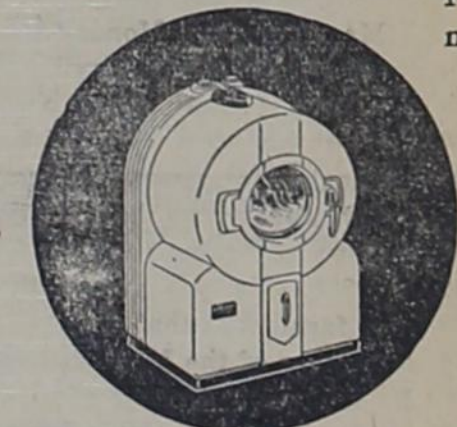

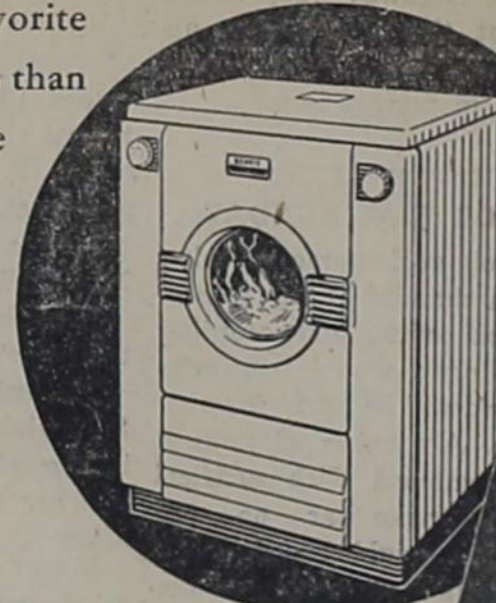

**Summer Diseases Are Becoming More Prevalent**

Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a warning to parents that this is the season for an increase in dysentery, diarrhea and "summer complaint."

"The chief causes of these intestinal diseases are contaminated milk; water or food; allowing the child to get overheated or exhausted; excessive sugar in the babies formula; and improper amount of food," Dr. Cox said. "All foods should be fresh and clean, and leftovers should be properly refrigerated to prevent spoilage."

Dr. Cox urged extreme care in the preparation of a feeding formula for infants. He said it should be prescribed by a physician, and that cleanlines and refrigeration were absolute essentials. Babies should be fed at regular intervals and on a definite schedule, since their stomach and bowels can be easily upset if fed irregularly or whenever they are fretful or restless.

The State Health Officer declared that dysentery is transmitted by flies and said every home should be well-screened and free of flies.

"If dysentery or diarrhea develops, consult your physician at once," Dr. Cox advised. "This so-called 'summer complaint' can be a very serious menace to your baby's health, if not an actual threat to his life."

But if they don't—well, once is enough for a bad accident! The best way is never to fly ANYTHING near any kind of lines. Then you'll be sure you won't tangle with them.

By the way: If you go in for "free flight," your plane may be hung up in the lines or atop a pole some time. Don't try to rescue it yourself. Call your Public Service office for a lineman or serviceman to handle the job. When you're flying model planes, be a careful pilot—always!

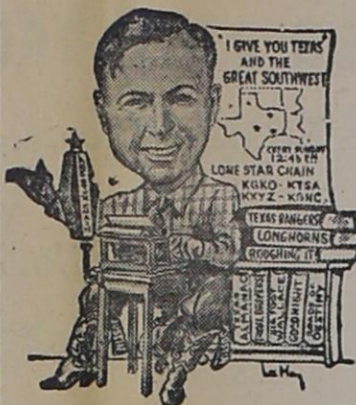

### Farm Income Now Exceeds Last Month

AUSTIN, TEX., June 8 — April farm cash income, totaling \$103,492,000, more than doubled the March level, The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

For the greatest source of income, cattle sales totaled \$49,319,000 in April. Fresh vegetables brought \$16,125,000, and milk products, \$10,389,000. All types of farm products except rice exceeded income levels of the preceding month.

South Texas Plains reported the highest farm cash income in April — \$19,310,000. Northern High Plains was second with \$11,375,000; Edwards Plateau, third, \$10, 809,000. All districts turned in gains over March farm income.

Compared with April 1947, farm cash income gained 26 per cent as all districts except the lower Rio Grande Valley turned in increases from 6 per cent in Southern High Plains to 90 per cent in South Plains.

Farm income from January through April 1948 reached \$290,715,000, or 1 per cent above a like period in 1947. During this period income varied from a 56-per-cent rise in Southern High Plains to a 33 per cent decline in Northern High Plains.

The Bureau's seasonally-adjusted index was 331 per cent of the pre-war base period in April, 207 in March, and 272 in April 1947.

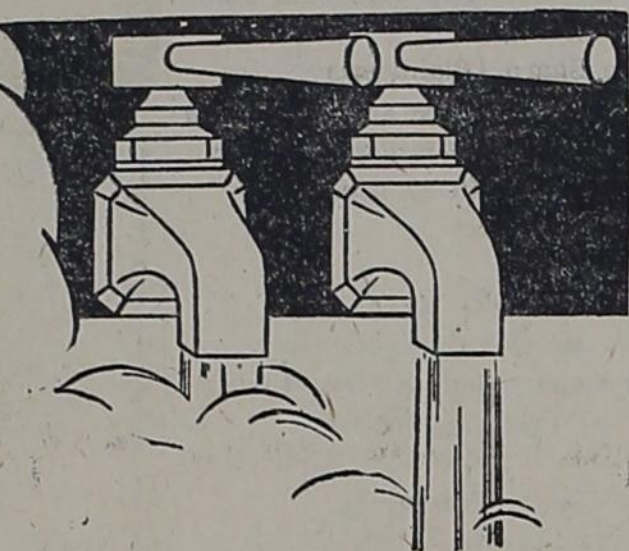

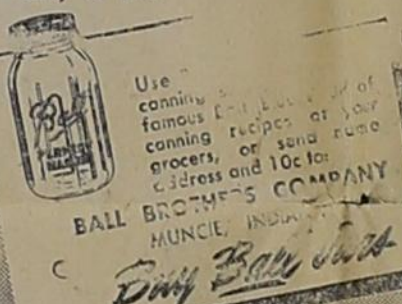
