COUNTY BOUGHT \$90,000 E BONDS IN JULY

FORMAN SOLD \$128,768.75, BUT ONLY \$4,848.75 WERE E BONDS; FACTORY DRIVE QUOTA BE HUGE

Editor:

Cisco takes the lead in the sale of War Bonds and Stamps July. Total sales for the month for the county are \$10,650.

This does not include employer-employee deductions, which will carry the total to perhaps \$90,000. Sales, broken down, are as follows:

These sales were of Series E Bonds and Stamps and only Series E Bonds and Stamps are credited against our regular monthly quota of \$50,400.

The town of Olden deserves special mention in this report, as it will be noted they had total sales of \$3,056. Considering the size of Olden and the further fact that many of these purchases are credited through the employer-employee purchase plan, the town is to be congratulated for the good showing.

Another special mention should be made in that the city of Forman sold \$128,768.75, but of this total there were only \$4,848.75 of Series E Bonds. So Forman really only contributed toward the monthly quota the Series E purchase of \$4,848.75.

Our August quota will be \$50,400 and we should move forward at a fast clip to make this subscription. However, since we are to be called on for an enormous quota for September, and which we will be expected to raise, it might be advisable not to try to exceed too much our August quota of \$50,400.

We do not as yet have our quota for the new Victory drive beginning September 9, but it will be many times more than the average monthly quota and each and all of us should begin to make preparations now to get ready to do our part in securing the new quota when it is announced.

The Allies are winning on all fronts. Progress in the war is in our favor and very satisfactory. This is being made possible by the men and machinery at the front and we must not fail to do our part as civilians here. Eastland county did not fail in World War No. 1. We have not failed at any time in World War No. 2 and I feel confident in saying that we will not fail at any future time to meet the demands made upon us!

RANGER WILL O'DANIEL WILL HAVE A FLY-SPEAK AT ONE SCHOOL P. M. SATURDAY

RANGER, Aug. 12.—Lawrence Boon, who operates a flying school in Dallas and one in Waxahatchie, flew to Ranger Tuesday afternoon for an inspection of the airport and for a meeting with city officials and members of the chamber of commerce with a view to establishing a flying school in Ranger.

Outcome of the conference was that the school will be brought to Ranger if as many as 12 students are enrolled for the courses. It was explained that this is civilian training for men and women and girls are eligible for the course. Persons taking the course are not required to be 18 years of age and no specific qualifications in education were mentioned. The school, though privately operated by Schell, is supervised by the civil aeronautics authority and in every way complies with government regulations. On completion of the course persons eligible for service in the air branch of the armed forces may go in as pilots, service pilots or instructors.

R. H. Boon, Cisco merchant, received a card from Senator W. Lee O'Daniel this morning stating that the senator would speak over WBAP, WFAA and WOAI Saturday, August 14, at 1 p. m., and asking Mr. Boon to spread the word to those interested.

Mr. Boon has been a consistent supporter of Mr. O'Daniel since his first race for governor in 1938, when O'Daniel wiped the platter clean by winning in the first primary over 12 opponents, receiving a total of 573,166 votes out of the 1,115,485 cast. It may be said further that O'Daniel has never lost a battle since he entered Texas politics.

Mr. Boon said he believed all Cisco and Eastland county people should hear the broadcast of Saturday and added that he was firm in the opinion that Senator O'Daniel is daily proving himself to be one of the most courageous, serviceable senators in Washington.

ROTARY HEARS THOUGHT-PROVOKING TALK

A good meal served by ladies of the women's council of the First Christian church today paved the way for an interesting program at the Rotary club which, according to President Lonnie Shockley, was a perfect attendance meeting. Shockley said July gave Cisco a 95 percent attendance, bringing it into the upper ten bracket where it has placed itself during the past year or more.

R. L. Woodfin of Kilgore and Geo. A. Blitch of Arlington were Rotary guests.

W. W. Fewell said he had tried to get a musical program and one or two other programs but all had faded him at the last moment, so he was bringing one himself. He said he didn't know just what it would be when he got through with it, but he took as his subject, "Are We Prepared for the Peace to Come?"

He said that in a recent Gallup poll in England asking who was most responsible for the victory against Hitler, 59 percent of the people said Russia, while only about 3 percent picked the United States. So it appeared to Fewell that we may have a hard time at the peace table.

Quoting from the Bible, the speaker said Cain replied to the Lord when asked regarding the whereabouts of Abel, "Am I my brother's keeper?" Down through the years men have answered that question in the affirmative, "Now, if that is true," Fewell said, "How are we keeping our brother?"

Reading from the Manufacturer's magazine, which is 61 years old, Fewell said that there are about 620 elective officers in the U. S. government, but there are better than 3,000,000 appointive offices. Again quoting to show the condition which our government has gotten into, he said that our code was seeking Freedom from Fear and Freedom from Worry, but according to that magazine, if we secured these two, we would also have Freedom from Work, since there would be no incentive to work. And of course this would be fatal to our government.

Again showing the condition into which our government has fallen, he quoted from a broadcast by Ken McClure, regarding how a threatened water shortage in Fort Worth was solved by a little appeal to the citizens, themselves. If it had been solved according to the way the bureaucrats of the government solve things, it would have required many weeks and thousands of experts sitting in on the job to have solved it.

Oil is an essential industry, Fewell said. Only recently, he and R. L. Ponsler went to see about getting a raise in salary for an employee. They went to a building, very modern, having hundreds of employees. After much waiting to see a certain man who had signed letters in reply to Fewell's efforts to get the raise in salary, he was told that he would have to see someone else who had charge of that, but that he could not be seen at that time. Finally the proper party was contacted, only to discover that he did not know the status of the case and would have to wait until it could be decided by some higher-up. And then it would be necessary to fill out a form of necessary based on a 12-page circular of instructions.

The speaker said he wrote Sen. W. Lee O'Daniel regarding this matter and others and he had a card from him today saying that he would go on the air Saturday to expose these bureaucratic set-ups.

Going further, he said that there was a very serious petting party going on in Washington. Union Labor is being petted to a ridiculous extent. In North Africa an electrician demanded and received the oke on a wage of \$1,000 per month for setting up a line at the front—more than the salary of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, himself.

MYRICKS WANT TO BUY SMALL HOME IN CISCO

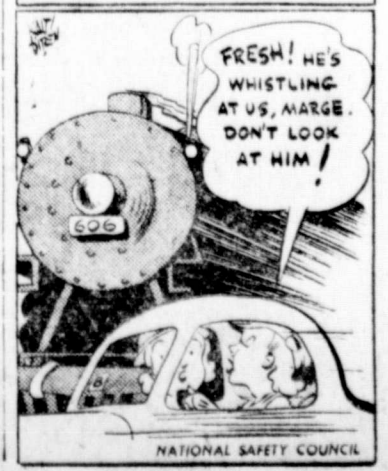

YANKS BOMB JAP ISLANDS AND TOKYO TELLS PEOPLE IT'S MERELY FORERUNNER

An American bombing raid on the northern end of the Japanese Kurile Island chain was reported by Tokyo Radio today and nervous enemy propagandists warned their people that it was another forerunner of U. S. attacks on the heart of Japan.

Tokyo broadcasts recorded by the Federal Communications Commission said the attack on the Kuriles was made at 7:20 a. m. today Japanese time (6:20 p. m. EWT Wednesday) by five B-24 Liberators and three B-17 Flying Fortresses based in the Aleutians.

It was possible the bombers had hit for the second time at the Paramushiru naval-air base 765 miles west of Attu, westernmost of the Aleutians. Paramushiru guards the northern approaches to the Japanese home islands.

A Tokyo broadcast designed for listeners in Japan warned that "further appearances of enemy planes from the north are to be expected" and the latest raid resulted from "positive measures" by the United States to strike "our mainland Japan."

According to the Tokyo version, the raids were repulsed by ground fire.

Meanwhile, American jungle troops on New Georgia Island fought through the Japanese on their left flank today to close in on the enemy garrison making a last stand at Bairoko harbor.

Soldiers and Marines moving up from conquered Munda met the enemy around Zieta village, about four and one-half miles southwest of Bairoko. There were no late reports on the Americans of the right flank, who were even nearer the objective. Bad weather hampered air activity.

A message reported that the continuous aerial offensive to smash Japanese supply fleets in the New Guinea area had netted 18 more barges destroyed, one cargo vessel sunk and three damaged.

A headquarters spokesman revealed the identity of units which participated in the New Guinea fighting that resulted in capture of Munda, once the largest enemy air base in the central Solomons. They were elements of the American 25th, 37th and 43rd Infantry Division along with units of the Marine Corps.

LONG-BREWING WINSTON MAY SHAKEUP HITS VISIT STALIN A. & M. MEN AFTER FD MEET

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 12.—H. H. Williamson, director of Texas A. & M. College's Extension Service for many years, who was notified by the college that he had not been reemployed, will vacate his office as soon as he receives written notification, he said today.

Williamson would not state whether he was happy or unhappy over the fact that the college regents did not re-employ him. "I'm not mad at anybody," he said, and added: "And I'm not in ill health."

He said his reference to his health was not prompted by the recent statement of Dr. T. O. Walton, who resigned as president of the college because of "ill health."

Williamson said he had heard that certain A. & M. ex-students over the state were saying that Walton's resignation may have been caused by factors other than ill health. But, Williamson said, "I know nothing of that."

A. & M. AUDIT SOON.

AUSTIN, Aug. 12.—State Auditor C. H. Cavness today had instructions from a joint legislative committee to audit as soon as possible Texas A&M College and its branches.

OPPOSE MILK HIKE.

FT. WORTH, Aug. 12.—The 2 cents a quart increase in milk prices proposed by producers Thursday drew opposition from the district OPA labor advisory committee. "The principle of the OPA is to keep prices down, not to raise them. There's no use to have an OPA if they are going to keep raising prices all the time," said A. L. Bailey.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Aug. 12.—Prime Minister Winston S. Churchill, accompanied by his daughter, Mary, arrived here today in a six-car special train.

Churchill and his daughter came here overnight from Quebec, where he is to hold his sixth conference with President Roosevelt soon.

It was understood that Churchill came here to rest and to show Niagara Falls to Miss Churchill who is making her first visit to the new world. The length of his visit was not known.

Broadcasting from Quebec a radio speaker said it was believed Churchill might go to Russia with a message for Stalin following his conference with President Roosevelt.

BOMB MAINLAND.

NORTH AFRICA, Aug. 12.—A strong force of Flying Fortresses ranged 40 miles north of Rome against only slight enemy opposition and bombarded the important Terni railroad junction Wednesday, nearly destroying one factory and hitting the royal arms plant.

"IN THE BAG."

MOSCOW, Aug. 12.—Red armies drove almost to the outskirts of Kharkov today, cut the next to the last escape railroad and narrowed the enemy corridor to the southwest to less than 30 miles. The semi-circular drive against Kharkov and the northern Ukraine was gaining momentum virtually by the hour and Soviet sources said the capture of Russia's fourth largest city was "in the bag."

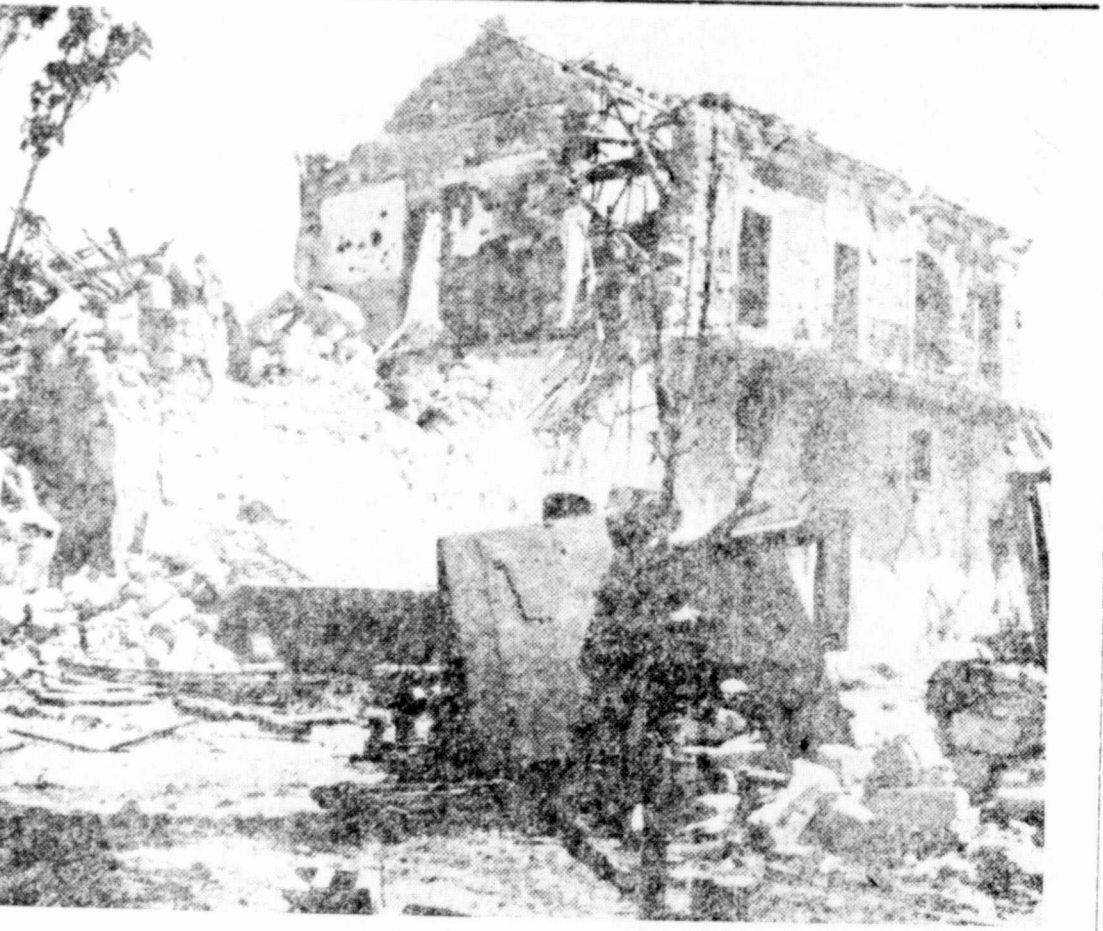

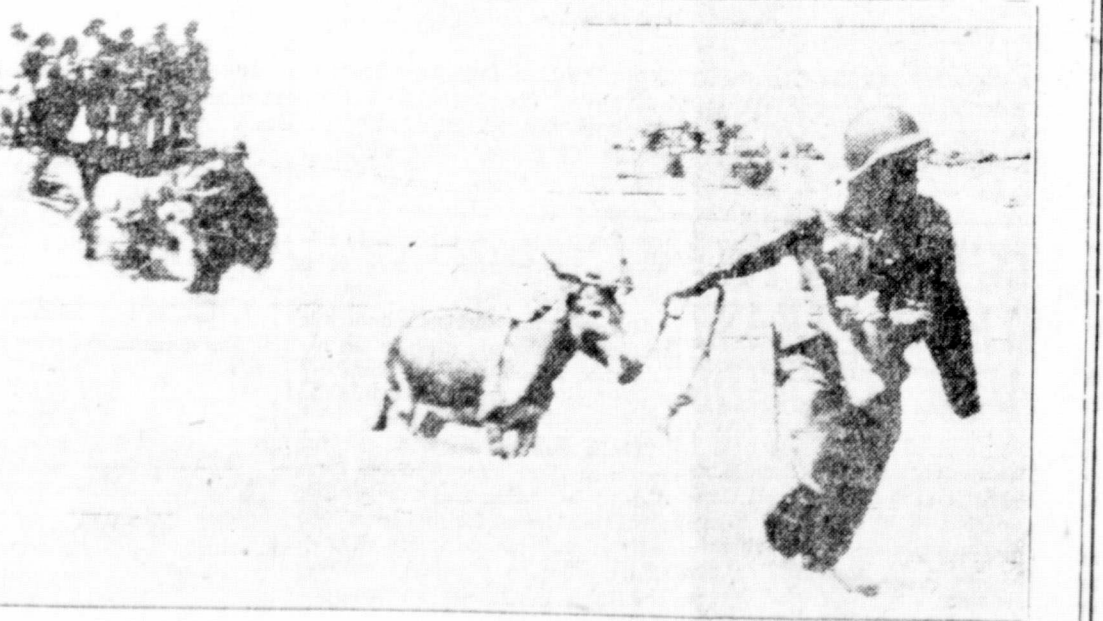
