Castro County Fair Attracts Large Crowd

Despite the fact that the Castro County Fair was postponed for a week, due to inclement weather, the showing of agricultural products, flowers and livestock, produced in the county, attracted one of the largest crowds Saturday in the history of the fair. Farmers and stockmen disregarded the muddy roads and brought in their exhibits in sufficient numbers to exceed those shown in former years, and, late in the season, the "flower show," sponsored by the Dimmitt Garden Club, ranks among the most beautiful shows ever conducted in this area.

An impromptu entertainment program was enjoyed by the Fair visitors. A parade consisting of horsemen, registered cattle, Ford, Chevrolet and Dodge demonstrators, various types of farm machinery, preceded a rodeo. The rodeo was under the supervision of Mr. Deroy Cates and Dirty Newton. An exceptionally good group of rodeo animals and performers furnished a program of excitement and entertainment.

Music for the fair and rodeo was furnished by bands from Tulia and Hereford, and in a brief contest conducted during the rodeo a beautiful trophy was awarded to the Hereford Band.

Fair officials, the various committees, and the ladies who conducted the flower show are to be commended for the excellent job of promoting, arrangement and conducting of the various phases of the County Fair.

Prize award winners for the Castro County Fair will be announced in next week's issue of the News.

I am sure Castro County will succeed in raising its quota in the state drive for \$800,000," Governor Stevenson said.

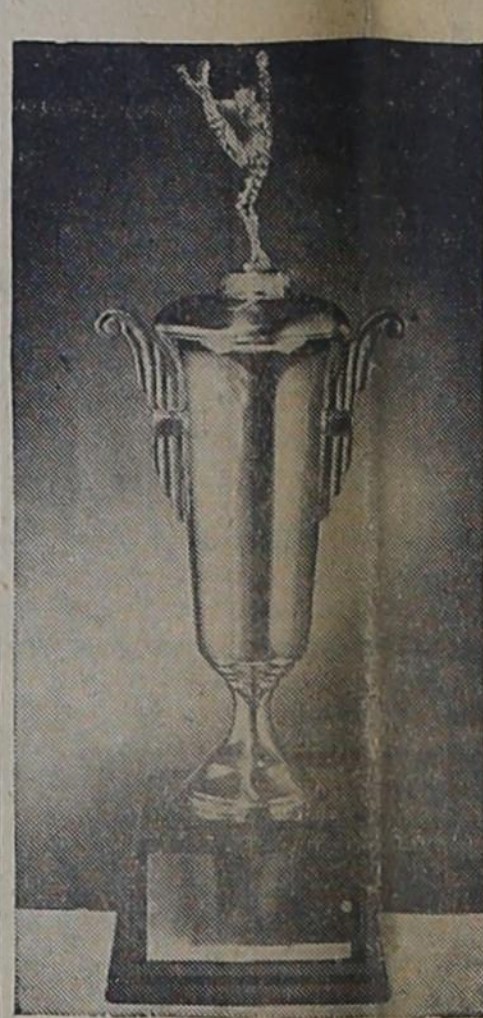
The week beginning October 21, has been designated USO campaign week by the local committee for raising the Castro County quota of \$400.

Headed by Colonel Carl L. Phinney of Dallas president of the 36th Division Association and State Campaign Chairman, Texas' 254 counties have been divided into six regions made up of 66 districts.

Mr. Robert B. Anderson of Vernon is chairman of the Southwest Texas region. These chairmen will work together in organizing and conducting the local campaign.

"There are about 125,000 Texas men still in service, overseas in hospitals or beginning training," said Colonel Phinney. "The combat phase of the war is finished, but the transition period presents fully as many morale problems. We must see to it that USO services are continued for those men who need and deserve a "Home away from home" now more than ever," the State Campaign Chairman said.

"I am sure that Castro County will fulfill its quota and help Texas 'See-It-Through' 1947 with the National USO Campaign."

Dimmitt Food Bank Opened Here Monday

Mr. Garnett Holland opened his Dimmitt Food Bank here Monday to a ready response from the trade of this area. The Dimmitt Food Bank is Dimmitt's newest, and one of its largest business establishments, and meets the need of this area for a slaughtering, processing and storage service for all types of meats and foods. Aside from slaughtering and processing meat for storage the new plant will operate a wholesale meat business, furnishing meat to retail markets here and other towns in this section of the panhandle.

Physical equipment of the new concern is housed in an insulated frame stucco building, 25x100 feet, and is divided into convenient departments to facilitate the handling of meats. A 12x25 foot space in the front of the building serves as office space, lobby, and housing for freezing equipment. In the center of the building a large locker room, 21x40 feet, is now equipped with 335 all metal Safe-Way Lockers, 30 additional lockers will be installed soon. The meat processing room, 12x22 feet, is equipped with a new Biro saw and Enterprise grinder, and has complete stamping equipment. Adjacent to the processing room is the cooling department 12x14 feet. To secure needed capacity the cooling room will be enlarged to 12x30 feet. The well equipped slaughtering room 25x25 feet is located in the rear of the building. A 10x10 foot room has also been provided for the curing of meats. The slaughtering, cooling, curing and processing rooms are all connected with overhead tracts to facilitate the movement of carcasses from one department to another. A new modern steam cleaner will insure sanitation throughout the plant. Freezing equipment for the plant was installed by the Nunn Electric Co. of Amarillo. Offal will be picked up daily by the Eads, Hide and Wool Company of Amarillo.

Holland, who began construction on the building to house his business February 4, returned home October 25, 1945, after serving with the Air Corps as glider pilot for one year in Alaska and 29 months in Europe. He is a veteran of the invasion of Normandy and four other major airborne invasions in the European theatre.

Other members of the personnel of the new firm are R. A. Green, who will be in charge of the processing department. He will be assisted by Mrs. Green. Mr. Soapie Holland will be in charge of the slaughtering department. Frank Martin and Frances Lee Jackson are employed as assistants in the various departments of the plant. Mrs. Soapie Holland will serve as checker and bookkeeper.

Elsewhere in this issue of the News is a formal welcome from the business firms of Dimmitt to this new enterprise.

George A. Schwen was born May 6, 1884 at Leavenworth, Kansas. While a small child his parents moved to Springer, N. M. In 1892 they moved to Amarillo, Texas, and from there they moved to Oklahoma in 1900. He was married to Miss Buna Martin on August 15, 1918. To this union were born two daughters, Mrs. Lola Schwen Standefer, and Mrs. Georgie Schwen Wall.

He and his family came to Castro County in 1925, and resided in the Bethel and North Edge communities. When very young he united with the Lutheran Church.

Deceased is survived by his wife of Dimmitt, two daughters, Lola of Portales, N. M. and Georgie of Dimmitt. Also two daughters by a former marriage, Mrs. Mary Young and Mrs. Annie Mae Young both of Yukon, Oklahoma. His mother, Mrs. Mary Schwen of Apache, Oklahoma, Theodore of Apache, and John of Durant, Oklahoma, and one sister, Mrs. Bell Masingale, of Hot Springs, N. M.

Commissioners Court Endorses Amendment

The Commissioner's Court of Castro County, Texas after careful study endorse for the favorable consideration of the citizens of Castro County, Texas THE GOOD ROADS AMENDMENT, the News has been asked to print their statement of their opinion of same. The amendment is also endorsed favorably by Governor, Coke Stevenson, Nominee, Beauford H. Jester and John S. Redditt, chairman of the State Highway Commission.

Your Commissioner's Court feels that it is one of the most important amendments that has been submitted in recent years because it guarantees,

1. The use of motor vehicle registration fees and gasoline taxes for school and road purposes.
2. Constitutional allotment of one-fourth of the gasoline taxes to the schools.
3. Funds for securing the rights-of-way, construction, maintenance and policing of all public roadways.
4. Retirement of county and road district bonds.
5. Continuation of legal refunds on non-highway gasoline.
6. Present share of motor vehicle registration fees to counties.
7. The ultimate construction of an adequate system of State and farm roads to meet the needs of the people of Texas.

The endorsement of the Governor and others follows:

"From my study of road building problems, as County Judge, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Lieutenant Governor, and Governor, I am convinced that the Good Roads Amendment should be adopted on November fifth."—Governor Coke R. Stevenson.

"The adoption of the Good Roads Amendment on November 5th will establish a sound financial policy upon which our road planning agencies may base their plans."—Beauford H. Jester, Democratic Nominee for Governor.

"It is my firm and considered belief, as a citizen and as Chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, that the passage of this Good Roads Amendment is to the best interest of all Texans, and for that reason, I am for it and advocate its passage."—John S. Redditt, Chairman Texas Highway Commission.

Sealed proposals for constructing 20.79 miles Farm-to-market road comprising grading, drainage, flexible base and asphalt surface located from a point 5 miles west of Dimmitt south to the county line and a 4 mile spur 15 miles south extending 4 miles west, will be received at the office of the County Judge of Castro County until 11:00 A. 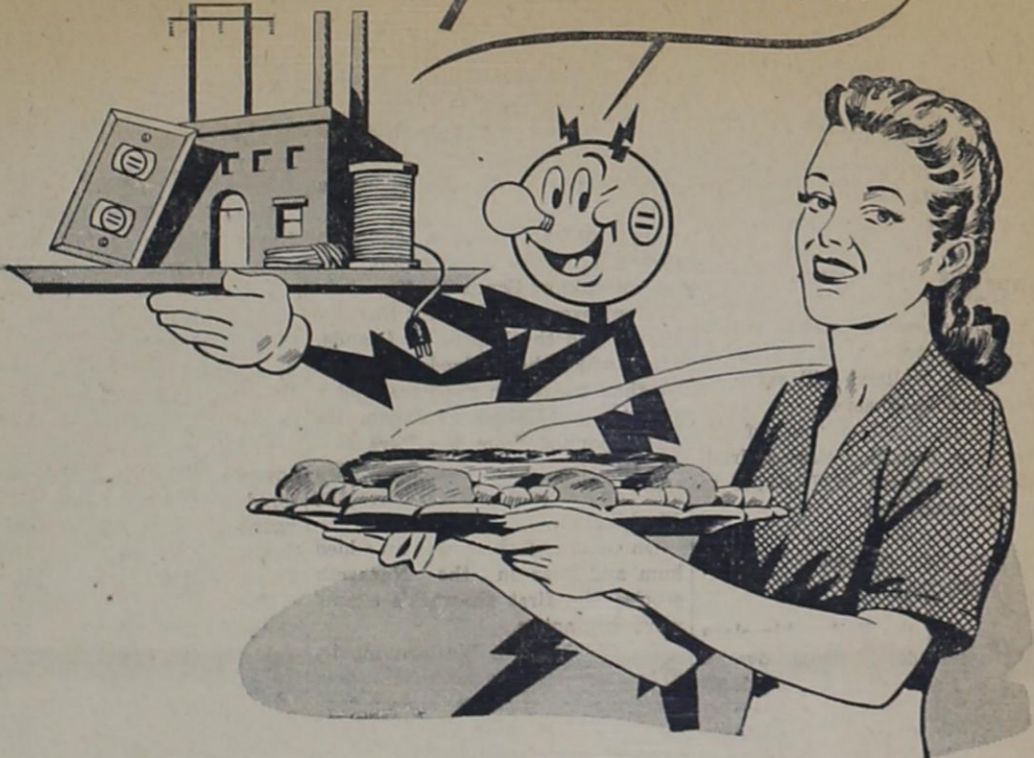

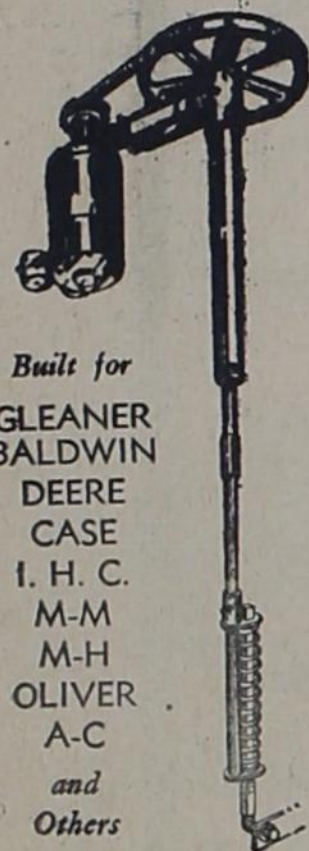

"Tillie the Tattler"



Since this month marks the completion of Mr. Blaine's fourth year as superintendent of the Dimmitt Schools, let's take a look back over his years of service to our school and our community.

Mr. Blaine has been teaching in the Dimmitt Schools for eleven years. During that time he has come up the D. H. S. teaching scale from teacher and assistant coach, through coach, and principal to the position of superintendent which he now holds.

Mr. Blaine received his B. S. degree at West Texas State Teachers' College in Canyon in 1935, where he majored in Agriculture and English. In 1941 he received his M. A. degree at the Colorado State College of Education, where his major was Education Administration.

In the fall of 1936, Mr. Blaine began his career in Dimmitt High School as assistant coach and English and Speech teacher. During that year he became coach. In the years that followed he taught math along with sports.

In 1940 Mr. Blaine became principal and served in that position until, in October, 1942, he succeeded Mr. McCollum as superintendent.

Mr. Blaine will be remembered by many boys and girls for his great coaching ability, and for the splendid way he has carried on the work of the school.

During these eleven years the Dimmitt schools have also made advancement. In 1936 the faculty consisted of 14 members; the school enrollment was barely over 300; and the Dimmitt District had an area of 122 square miles. Today the local school boasts a faculty of 22 teachers, an enrollment of almost 600, and a district with an area of 405 square miles.

HORNETS STING BOBCATS FRIDAY NIGHT

Northwest Dimmitt, including what was formerly Easter election

precinct No. 14, election No. 3; Election precincts Nos. 4, 5, and 6 remain the same as to boundaries and numbers;
Flag election precinct shall hereafter be known as election precinct No. 7;
Election precincts Nos. 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, and 13 shall remain as heretofore defined and numbered;
Frio election precinct No. 15 shall be known as Frio election precinct No. 14; and
Bethel election precinct No. 16 shall hereafter be known as Bethel election precinct No. 15.
