

# INSURANCE FOR ALL WOULD BE THE WISE WAY DATE NEW POSITIONS; HAVE NO THOUGHT OF EVACUATION

The Allied report today said Allied counter-attacks had offset previous losses around Salerno and that reinforcements were being landed.

A tremendous, see-saw battle raged on south of Naples, with American invasion forces yielding some ground but consolidating new positions under a record-breaking aerial umbrella along the 24-mile Salerno bridgehead.

Supported by the greatest aerial onslaught of the Mediterranean campaign, reinforced by sea and impressed with the idea that the Allies have no thought of evacuating the Salerno bridgehead, the Americans and British battled all outside day yesterday in non-stop attacks and counter-attacks against

The Allied aerial superiority was demonstrated by the fact that none of our aircraft was lost during a record day of operations, and that only six enemy planes were shot down, presumably because of the comparatively small number put

The communique, which also announced occupation of the little Isle of Capri, northwest of Salerno, said:

Bitter fighting continues between Salerno and Agropoli. Determined counter-attacks have been carried out by both sides. In some places our troops have been forced to yield ground but new positions are being consolidated and reinforcements continue to arrive rapidly.'

In southern Italy-where the British Eighth Army was racing northward to aid the Salerno battle-the communique said that new progress was made and that Belvedere had been occupied on the west coast road.

#### RULES FOR MAILING CHRIST-MAS PACKAGES TO SOLDIERS **OVERSEAS**

TIME OF MAILING-Gift packages may be mailed to American soldiers overseas without presentation of a request from the soldier during the period from September 15 to October 15.

SIZE AND WEIGHT-Packages must not exceed five pounds in weight, 15 inches in ength and 36 inches in length and girth

LIMITATIONS—Only one such package will be accepted for mailing by or on behalf of the same person or concern to the same addressee during any one week. It should be indorsed "Christmas Gift Parcel". Perishable matter will not be accepted.

ADDRESSING-Write legibly and give full name, Army serial number, service organization and unit, APO number of addressee and the post office through which parcels are to

PREPARATION-It is absolutely necessary that articles be packed in substantial boxes or containers and that various gifts in a combination be securely fitted. Pointed or sharpedged instruments should be protected. Candies in thin pasteboard boxes should be enclosed in wood, metal or corrugated paste-

POSTAGE-The rate on parcels of fourth class matter (exceeding eight ounces) is the zone rate applicable from post offices where mailed to the post office in care of which parcel is addressed. The third class rate of one and one-half cents for each two ounces applies to package not exceeding eight ounces. Parcels containing only books are acceptable at the special rate of three cents a pound. Inscriptions such as "Merry Christmas" or "Don't Open Until Christmas" may be placed on the covering but should not interfere with the address.



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
