## MIDWEST TEX-AS FIREMEN CONVENE HERE AFRICA; FIFTH U. S. ARMY IS NOW 17 MILES NORTH NAPLES

NORTH AFRICA, Oct. 7.—The Allied Fifth Army neared Capua, 17 miles north of Naples, on Hannibal's ancient oad to Rome today as the Eighth Army, reinforced with tanks and aided by a naval bombardment, smashed the heaviest German counter-attack yet launched on the Adriatic

American Flying Fortresses carried the war to the Venice area of northern Italy for the first time yesterday, flying 1200 miles round trip from North African bases to pound railway targets at Mestre. 10 miles to the west, an important relay point for German military supplies moving between Italy, Jugoslavia, Hungary and Austria.

Lieut. Gen. Mark W. Clark's Fifth Army already was within artillery range of Capua following the capture of Aversa and Maddaloni, 10 miles to the southeast and south first respectively, but flooded lowlands were slowing the advance.

The army was approaching the Volturno river, the first natural Axis defense line above Naples, on a broad front, and an official announcement said the Germans were holding the north bank in strength, though apparently only a delay-

An announcement yesterday said the Fifth Army already had crossed the Volturno at one point but this was retracted diremen's ball will be held in the today, and officials said the river actually crossed was the pavilion at Lake Cisco, starting Calore, a tributary to the east, in the vicinity of Benevento. The Calore first was crossed at Benevento last week.

The main crossing of the Volturno is at Capua.

The Germans attacked the Eighth Army in force yesterday for the first time since Gen. Montgomery's forces swarmed across Messina Strait into the toe of Italy, nearly a month

Shifting fresh troops across the mountainous peninsula from the Naples front, the Germans swung over to the attack and almost cut the road running south from the Adriatic port of Termoli and thus isolate the British amphibious force there from the main Eighth Army column.

British tank reinforcements rushed across a bridge which heroic sappers threw across the Biferno river under a heavy bombardment of Japanese-held German artillery barrage, and swung the tide of battle at the critical moment. The attack was repulsed, but the Germans continued to exert pressure all along the Eighth Army line, which extends southwest from Termoli.


