MIDWEST TEXAS FIREMEN CONVENE HERE

The Midwest Texas Firemen's convention is being held in Cisco today and approximately 125 firemen from Snyder, Colorado City, Merkel, Baird, Rotan, Hamlin and Albany were expected to participate. The convention met at the fire department and the visitors were welcomed by Mayor Edward Lee, who extended them the freedom of the city in his most gracious manner. The invocation was by Chaplain H. H. Black of Colorado City.

MANY RESERVES IN SICILY AND AFRICA; FIFTH U. S. ARMY IS NOW 17 MILES NORTH NAPLES

NORTH AFRICA, Oct. 7.—The Allied Fifth Army neared Capua, 17 miles north of Naples, on Hannibal's ancient road to Rome today as the Eighth Army, reinforced with tanks and aided by a naval bombardment, smashed the heaviest German counter-attack yet launched on the Adriatic coast. American Flying Fortresses carried the war to the Venice area of northern Italy for the first time yesterday, flying 1200 miles round trip from North African bases to pound railway targets at Mestre, 10 miles to the west, an important relay point for German military supplies moving between Italy, Jugoslavia, Hungary and Austria.

Segt. Donald Archer, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Archer, 300 W. Seventh street, arrived yesterday to spend thirty days in the town of his birth. The young man, a member of an army tank battalion, has been in the service three years and is recovering from head injuries.

AIRMEN HIT JAP SUPPLY BASES HARD

SOUTHWEST PACIFIC, Oct. 7. Australian ground troops have driven down the Ramu river valley to within less than 50 miles of the Japanese supply base at Madang, on the northeast coast of New Guinea, an Allied communique said today. Supported by a furious aerial bombardment that ripped and burned Japanese communications all along the southern approaches to Madang, the Australians pushed swiftly through light enemy patrols Monday in a seven-mile advance over rugged jungle terrain.

ALLIED NAVAL ATTACK IN PACIFIC MOUNTS

PEARL HARBOR, Oct. 7.—The shattering American sea and air bombardment of Japanese-held Wake island Tuesday dawn pointed today to a mounting naval offensive designed to roll back the enemy from his Pacific outposts. Striking with dramatic speed only 24 hours after the disclosure that American naval chiefs have just concluded a Pacific war council in Hawaii, warships of a powerful U. S. task force raked the tiny islet with shell fire while planes from an accompanying carrier bombed and strafed the enemy.

CHURCH OF GOD FOUNDER DEAD; 76 YEARS OLD

CLEVELAND, Tenn., Oct. 7.—Members of the Church of God, many of them sobbing openly, paid their last respects to their general overseer of 40 years, A. J. Tomlinson, in three-hour funeral services Wednesday. The church leader, 76, was buried in the Fort Hill Cemetery following rites attended by 1,500 followers at the faith's big assembly tabernacle.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Oct. 7.—Seven of Arkansas' 75 counties, 14 townships and five towns have voted out the sale of liquor, beer and wine under the impact of a local option elections drive sponsored by the Anti-Saloon league.
