RUSSIANS THREATEN KIEV, NOW

MOSCOW, Oct. 9.—Russian forces, bolstered by an almost ceaseless flow of troops and tanks across the Dnieper, were said today to have seized a number of German strongholds and strategic highways on the west bank in a developing pincer drive against Kiev, Russia's third city and capital of the Ukraine. Kiev is a German stronghold and important base.

FIFTH ARMY PATROLS CROSS VOLTURNO RIVER, 97 MILES SOUTHWEST OF CITY OF ROME

ALGIERS, Oct. 9.—Allied patrols have crossed the Volturno river, the Germans' last line of defense below Rome and the Fifth and Eighth armies have advanced two to three miles at key points all the way across the Italian peninsula, it was announced today.

BARUCH MANPOWER PLAN IS WORKING

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Baruch's manpower plan on the west coast is getting results. Airplane production has increased 12 percent and reports from Boeing, home of the Flying Fortress are most encouraging.

PLAQUEMINES PARISH, La., Oct. 9.—Gov. Sam Jones of Louisiana today declared martial law in Plaquemines parish and ordered the state guard into the area to end a condition of "insurrection and open rebellion to law and order."

GERMANS SINK U.S. HOSPITAL SHIP, ITALY

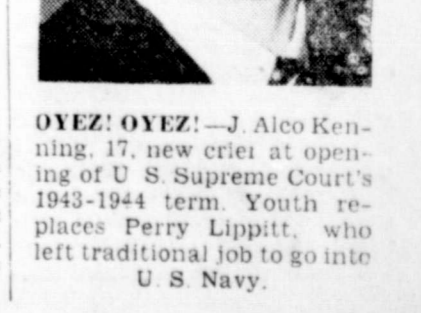
