

U. S. Liberator bombers carried out the Norwegian raid, the second on that occupied country this week.

The two -way Allied aerial assault was climaxed last night by a hard RAF blow against the Rhineland chemical center of Ludwigshafen, site of the largest chemical plant in Germany. In their first raid in almost a week, RAF's fourmotored bombers dropped hundreds of tons of explosives on the city and probably wiped out most of the repairs made ince Ludwigshafen last was attacked on Sept. 23. Speedy RAF Mosquito bombers joined the attack with diversionary aids on Berlin and western Germany, and only one bomber was lost in the night's operations.




